


- The focus of next week's study is to read about God's adoption of us through the justification and freedom found in relationship with Christ.

WEEKLY SCRIPTURE Galatians 3:23-4:7

Children of God

23 Before the coming of this faith,[a] we were held in custody under the law, locked up until the faith that was to come would be revealed. 24 So the law was our guardian until Christ came that we might be justified by faith. 25 Now that this faith has come, we are no longer under a guardian.

26 So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, 27 for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. 28 There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. 29 If you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise.

Context - Before studying the passage, it is important to understand the context of Galatians.

• Paul wrote this letter to the Galatians to address **false teachings** that had infiltrated the church, specifically the idea that salvation comes through obeying the law instead of faith in Jesus Christ.

Galatians 3:23-25

Galatians 3:26-29

26 So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, 27 for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. 28 There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. 29 If you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise.

- · Paul emphasizes that our status as children of God comes through faith in Christ
- This passage shows that salvation is not limited to a particular group of people
- Paul argues that our status as children of God is not based on external factors such as race or social status

Galatians 4:1-7: Heirs through Adoption

1 What I am saying is that as long as an heir is underage, he is no different from a slave, although he owns the whole estate. 2 The heir is subject to guardians and trustees until the time set by his father. 3 So also, when we were underage, we were in slavery under the elemental spiritual forces[b] of the world. 4 But when the set time had fully come, God sent his Son, born of a woman, born under the law, 5 to redeem those under the law, that we might receive adoption to sonship.[c] 6 Because you are his sons, God sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, the Spirit who calls out, "Abba,[d] Father." 7 So you are no longer a slave, but God's child; and since you are his child, God has made you also an heir.

- We were under the authority of the law until the time of Christ.
- Through faith in Christ, we have become sons of God and are no longer under the authority of the law.
- Through faith in Christ, we have received the full rights of a son and have become heirs of God.

How does Galatians 3:26-29 describe unity among believers?

- Paul describes the unity among believers by emphasizing that our identity in Christ transcends any social or cultural distinctions.
