Pastor's Sabbatical

A sabbatical is a rest or break from work, an extended period of time intentionally spent on something that's not the routine. It originates in the biblical practice of sabbath keeping, a weekly break from work and also the *shmita* (Hebrew for the sabbatical year), which is related to agriculture. In Spanish we refer to Saturday as *Sabado*; this reminds us of that biblical understanding of a day set apart to rest.

The Sabbath is a day apart, a day to keep holy. Christians often think of Sunday as the Sabbath, a day to worship, but the commandment is about a day to rest. The day of rest is also a day to reflect, to pray and to nurture a wider perspective and deeper gratitude.

Also, according to Leviticus, chapter 25, God commands a year-long break from working the fields every seven years.

"The LORD spoke to Moses... saying, ² "... When you enter the land that I am giving you, the land shall observe a Sabbath for the LORD. ³ Six years you shall sow your field, and six years you shall prune your vineyard and gather in their yield, ⁴ but in the seventh year there shall be a Sabbath of complete rest for the land, a Sabbath for the LORD.

St. Paul's, at our last congregational meeting, approved a budget for a three-month sabbatical for me which I will be taking from September thru November. During this time, we will have four different preachers on rotation and one Pastor who will be on call for emergencies and to be present at meetings of the council. Rev. Lena Warren, who has preached for us on multiple occasions, will be on-call for emergencies and will also preach three times.

We have an amazing crew of volunteer leaders in our congregation, and they will step up to see to some of the day-to-day operation of our congregation.



Our scripture tells us that the seventh day is for rest, just as it was after God's work of creation, and the seventh year marks rest for the land. A sabbatical, as I said, is a biblical concept. God resting on the seventh day is meant as a model for us. We are reminded of this in the third commandment:

"Remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy. ⁹ Six days you shall labor and do all your work. ¹⁰ But the seventh day is a Sabbath to the LORD your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. 11 For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and consecrated it.

In this story of creation there is an even more frequent sense of stopping and reflecting. Each day of creation, God takes a moment to consider the work of that day, "And God saw that it was good." This shows us a daily cycle of sitting back, looking over the work of the day, taking stock and, if we follow God's lead, declaring that creation and our

work with it is good. So, the seventh day is rest after the work of that week, the seventh year requires rest for the land. But I also see how at sunset, once every twenty-four hours, we, like the Creator, can stop to reflect and perhaps to give thanks.

Last year I started to work on a degree at United Lutheran Seminary, one or two classes a semester. It's important to make time for reading and writing and to spend time with other students and teachers, to learn new things and refresh lessons from long ago. This will keep me busy during my sabbatical. I may also make some small trips, you know how much I enjoy historical travel or travel as a modern pilgrimage.

I am grateful that I am fortunate enough to have a call to a congregation that can and wants to provide a sabbatical and I know it will be beneficial to our mission and ministry.

I will be taking a break from ministry in many ways but not a break from my faith. My hope is that my faith will be renewed and refreshed. Faith needs ongoing examination and growth. I will not be taking a break from prayer, I expect to be growing in prayer and I will be praying for all of you, giving thanks to God for each of you.
