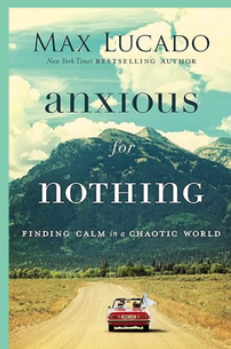

"Finding Peace in Anxious Times"

This study thoughtfully addresses the anxieties of our modern world through the Apostle Paul's pastoral words of comfort to the church in Philippi. Rooted in Philippians 4:4–8, the study invites participants to exchange worry for prayer, fear for gratitude, and anxiety for "the peace of God, which passes all understanding." Through Scripture, conversation, and reflection, we will explore how God's peace can steady our hearts and minds, even in our uncertain times.

STAFF REFLECTION

Grace and peace,

As I write, the meteorologists are predicting double-digit snow fall this weekend. The timing of the storm's arrival on a Saturday causes us to rely on our Inclement Weather Policy to prepare and care for our congregation. In addition to weathering storms, we experience various storms of lives. Katherine May refers to these times of life as wintering. In her book, *Wintering: The Power of Rest and Retreat in Difficult Times*, she writes,



“Wintering is a season in the cold. It is a fallow period in life when you’re cut off from the world, feeling rejected, sidelined, blocked from progress, or cast into the role of an outsider. Perhaps it results from an illness or a life event such as a bereavement or the birth of a child; perhaps it comes from a humiliation or failure. Perhaps you’re in a period of transition and have temporarily fallen between two worlds... However it arrives, wintering is usually involuntary, lonely, and deeply painful.”

We all experience winters in our lives, times when we are lonely, sad, or withdrawn. Most, if not all of us, are currently experiencing wintering on a personal, national level, and/or global level. Some of us weather the storms of life better than others due to prior experience and the tools to navigate the season. When we witness someone else reach out for help, it can give us the courage to reach out for help.

God created us to be in relationship. The Trinity is a relationship, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and we are called to participate in the Divine Dance. We are created to rely on God during our wintering and to rely on our connections to other people during these seasons. I pray you have people to rely on, including members of your church family. This can be difficult and take time to learn. If you don't feel you have the skills to journey well through your wintering, Katherine May offers you hope.

“If happiness is a skill, then sadness is, too. Perhaps through all those years at school, or perhaps through other terrors, we are taught to ignore sadness, to stuff it down into our satchels and pretend it isn't there. As adults, we often have to learn to hear the clarity of its call. That is wintering. It is the active acceptance of sadness. It is the practice of allowing ourselves to feel it as a need. It is the courage to stare down the worst parts of our experience and to commit to healing them the best we can.”

Scripture reminds us to rely on God and on one another. Speaking from the voice of God in Psalm 50, the psalmist writes, “Call on me in the day of trouble; I will deliver you, and you shall glorify me.” And then Paul encourages us in Galatians 6, “Bear one another's burdens, and in this way, you will fulfill the law of Christ.”

If you are enduring a wintering season in your life, please reach out to someone you trust. I hope you know that Pastor Eddie and I are always here to talk. You are loved by God and your church family, and we are here to walk alongside you, relying on God to guide us.
