Aha! Epiphany!

The feast of Epiphany first appeared on the church calendar around the same time as did Christmas. As the church split between West and East by the mideleventh century, the feast came to carry two different meanings.



In the East, the church gathered into one day the commemoration of Jesus' birth, childhood, baptism, and the visit by the Magi. In the West, the day had a single focus—the revelation of the Messiah to the Gentiles. The weeks following January 6 in the Western Church calendar continue the themes introduced on Epiphany (the life of Jesus through his baptism, the miracle at Cana, Jesus' signs and wonders, and the call of the disciples).

Epiphany reminds us of how Jesus fulfilled the mission God had given the Jewish people by seeking and saving those who were labeled as "other." He sought those outside the community, people to whom his own people had failed to reflect God's light. The magi present us with a powerful image of what it means to be a seeker, and Epiphany demonstrates the wonderful "aha" of discovery. The journey of the magi is just a beginning and only part of the focus of Epiphany. Connecting with Jesus' mission to seek and serve is the larger theme. Author Robert Webber puts it in this way:

The Epiphany marks the turning point of prophecy. The glory of God that has become incarnate in Jesus is now manifested to the magi, who represent the peoples of the world beyond Israel. From them the manifest glory of God will extend through the church to the whole world.

Perhaps Epiphany calls from us a twofold response. First, as an invitation to worship as the magi. They demonstrated the essence of worship by giving up (following a star) and giving (offering gifts = ourselves). Second, Epiphany is an invitation to join Jesus in ministry. We live into Epiphany as we show and tell the world that God is still seeking each one of us.

"As they offered gifts most rare at they manger rude and bare, so may we with holy joy, pure and free from sins alloy, all our costliest treasures bring, Christ, to thee, our heavenly king." (As with Gladness Men of Old)

Church Office Closed THROUGH JAN. 2


