

TEKTON LOST IN TRANSLATION TEKTON

Perhaps the most wonderful thing about diving deep into the Bible is the fresh information that always comes from this ancient text. However sometimes what we have been taught needs to be reassessed and my most recent "aha" moment came from a comment made by Ray Vander Laan regarding Joseph, Jesus's earthly father. For centuries Christians from the West have associated carpentry with Joseph, and a ton of mental images are engraved on my brain, Joseph teaching Jesus how to saw, hammer nails and create wooden joints; our children's Bibles were full of these snapshots of Jesus as a young boy. A closer look at the book of Matthew might just hold the key and it is possible that the Greek word tekton in Chapter 13 was misinterpreted

Jesus had returned to his home town of Nazareth, teaching in the synagogue and the crowds grumbled, "He's just a carpenter's son, and we know Mary his mother..."And within that verse is the word that launched a thousand illustrations and it is where centuries ago the misunderstanding began. While tekton could mean carpenter, it is more accurately rendered as craftsman or builder. So let's check the landscape and see where that leads us. In Northern Israel trees are scarce and a carpenter would be hard pressed to find work. Hebraic scholar James W. Fleming notes that the majority of the homes in Israel are constructed of rock and nine out of ten projects were chiseled or carved in stone. And what I find to be intriguing is the proximity of Nazareth

to the ancient city of Sepphoris, now Zippora. And this is interesting because in the first century Herod Antipas was developing this area at a rapid rate. The Jewish historian Josephus referred to the city as the "Jewel of all Galilee". Halfway between Nazareth and Sepporis lay an ancient quarry and while Jesus may not have been a mason, he most certainly visited and would have watched as the stones were cut.

Now before you declare me a heretic this translations' accuracy, or not, has no bearing on Jesus's work as the Savior of the world. Robby Gallaty puts it this way,"...but what it does do is help us when we look at this background knowledge and it gives us fresh eyes when we read in the 118th Psalm and again in Luke 20:17-18, the stone that the builders rejected, the cornerstone... this concept would have been familiar to those building with stone" And aren't we all living stones built up to be a spiritual house? So imagine with me; the Master Craftsman, holding you in his hand as he chisels and shapes you to the image of Christ. I imagine one of our beautiful dry stack walls that are so prevalent in the Hill Country, each stone chosen for its' perfect spot in the wall. Stones that by themselves are nothing but gathered together become living stones crafting a spiritual house, a temple to the glory of God. I hope that you will re-read some of these verses with a fresh perspective and open yourself up to become a living stone being used by your Creator to transform this world!

- 2. Do you have unanswered questions about prayer, study, and sharing your faith?
- 3. Do you understand that being a Christian involves responsibility?

- 5. Do you hold positions of responsibility in the church and in the world?

Stephen Ministry

We now have four new Stephen Ministers. So, what does that mean to you the members of Bandera UMC? A Stephen Minister comes alongside a hurting person and meets with that person on a weekly basis to listen, care, encourage, pray, and provide emotional and spiritual support. Over the years, well over one-and-a-half million people have benefited from the one-to-one, Christ-centered care of a Stephen Minister. This care is entirely confidential; no one knows the identity of a care receiver except for his or her Stephen Minister and the pastor and Stephen Leader who paired the two together. Some examples of the types of hurts where a Stephen Minister helps are:

- the loss of a loved one
- hospitalization, serious illness or terminal illness
- divorce (before, during, and after)
- change in the number of children at home (birth, adoption, or empty nest when kids move on)
- new to our area or church
- disabilities such as being homebound or in a nursing care center
- significant financial setback or lost jobs
- moving out of town, downsizing to a smaller home or retirement
- affected by natural disasters or acts of violence.

This is not a complete list, but it can give you a starting point for thinking about what needs for care your Stephen Ministers can meet which is basically any critical needs or major life transitions where having someone walk with them would be helpful.

Grace in This Place – Sunday School for all ages

Come, find your small group home for learning, love & connections.

- Nursery: Did you know that we offer a Sunday School class for preschoolers? Our nursery staff is prepared every Sunday with preschool-level Methodist curriculum which they would love to share with your child from 9:45 10:30 in the nursery. This not only will begin your little one on his/her life-long journey of faith but will also allow you to attend a Sunday School class of your choosing!
- **Kindergarten** Grade 2: We focus on our very own star "test". We use the Methodist curriculum to teach our faith through all the familiar Bible stories. Over these important years of attendance your child will learn, not only the stories, but also how faith looks in their lives. Each lesson is accompanied by activities and games that support the message. An overriding goal is that children will love to come to church. Taught by Jean Darling in Room 105.
- Grade 3 Grade 5: The use of the Methodist curriculum is continued through these years. As children study the stories that they may have heard before, they explore a little further to understand how to apply their learning to their lives. Each week has a new story focus that is reinforced by watching a DVD, doing worksheets, crafts, various games and activities. One goal is to make learning fun! Taught by Sheila Antenen and Shawn Morrison in Room 101.
- Middle School, Grade 6 Grade 8: The Middle School Sunday School class, led by Bonnie Bevers, begins each week with fellowship and a time of "catching up" from our busy week. The class then delves into the Scripture, studying different books of the Bible on an age appropriate level, looking at how the different stories, lessons, and topics apply to the youths' everyday lives. We close each class with Prayers & Praises, a time of silent reflections, and a closing prayer.
- **High School**: We are currently studying "Big Questions: Developing a Christ-Centered Apologetic". We are delving deep into why we believe what we believe. Questions throughout the study include: What Do I Do with My Doubts? Does God Really Exist? Is There a Conflict Between Faith and Science? What About Other World Religions? Why is There Evil and Suffering in the World; and, How Do We Become Effective Christians in the World Today? We are attempting to show our kiddos that unless our faith is grounded in something more than emotion we will struggle when doubts come. Led by Elizabeth & Larry Scott.
- Foundation Class: A new study will begin on March 18. The DVD by Adam Hamilton on "Half Truths" will be followed by discussion. We meet from 9:45 10:30 in the church office. Any and all adults welcome. Coffee provided! Class facilitated by Conrad & Nancy Nightingale along with other class members

- Adelante Class: This "young" at heart group of couples and singles continues their journey through the Bible by beginning the New Testament this month. Whether it's the first time to read the New Testament or a desire to read it again like any journey it's pleasant to have traveling companions to discuss the sights along the way. As we explore and discuss the scriptures we'd love to have you join us in Room 103 any Sunday at 9:45. Y'all come and bring a friend! Facilitated by Carol Wolf and other members of the class.
- The Walk: Our class consists of people 50 and older. Our discussions stem from our life experiences and our walk with God. On March 4 we began a new series entitled "Finishing Well" by Bob Buford. It will make you think about what's important in the second half of your life (age 45 and on). Come join us in Room 104. Facilitated by Lloyd Norris and Marilyn Dawson.
- The Journey: The Journey is a class for all ages. We are a group that range in age from our 20's to our 70's. We tend to study things that are relevant to today's issues. We are currently studying Half Truths by Adam Hamilton it talks about things we think the Bible says but that it may not mean what we think. When we are done with this study we will move to Rob Renfroe's new study "The Joy Stealers". Please come join us in Room 102 for fun and fellowship as we go through our studies. 
