



5 Day Devotional: [Watch- Profile of a Servant](#)

Day 1: Who Is Really in Charge?

Devotional

We live in a world that tells us to be our own boss, to trust ourselves, and to answer to no one. It sounds freeing, but if we are honest, that kind of life is exhausting. The pressure to have it all together, to never need help, to always figure it out on your own... it wears you down. Here is the truth: every one of us is already serving something. Maybe it is the approval of others. Maybe it is financial security, ambition, or comfort. The question was never whether you have a master. The question is who that master is. Psalm 123 opens with a simple, bold declaration. The psalmist lifts his eyes upward, not inward. Not to his own strength or wisdom, but to God enthroned in heaven. That is where this five-day journey begins. Not with a to-do list, but with a direction. Look up. When we stop pretending we are in control and start looking to God as our true Master, something shifts. The weight of self-sufficiency begins to lift. You were never meant to carry it alone. This week, let these devotionals be an invitation to reorient your gaze. Not to a God who is waiting to catch you failing, but to a God who is worthy of your trust and ready to meet you right where you are.

Bible Verse

"I lift my eyes to you, the one enthroned in heaven." - Psalm 123:1

Reflection Question

What area of your life are you still trying to control on your own, and what would it look like to genuinely surrender that to God today?

Prayer

Lord, I confess that I often act like I am in charge of my own life. Help me to lift my eyes to You and trust You as my true Master. Amen.

Day 2: The Art of Looking Up

Devotional

There is something beautiful and humbling about the image in Psalm 123. A servant watching their master's hand, not distracted, not wandering, but fully attentive. Waiting for the slightest signal. Ready to respond. That kind of attentiveness does not happen by accident. It is built through time, through relationship, and through trust. You do not watch someone that closely unless you believe they have your best interest at heart. So what does it look like to look to God that way? It starts by being honest about how we actually approach Him. Sometimes we come to God with our own agenda already set, hoping He will sign off on our plans. Sometimes we treat His Word like a starting point for negotiation rather than a word to obey. But a true servant does not look God eye to eye as an equal. A servant looks up. That posture is not about shame. It is about recognizing who God actually is and choosing to trust His direction over our own instincts. The good news is that God is not looking for perfect servants. He is looking for willing ones. People who are honest enough to say, "I do not have this figured out, but I am looking to You." That posture, humble and attentive, is exactly where transformation begins.

Bible Verse

"Like a servant's eyes on his master's hand, like a servant girl's eyes on her mistress's hand, so our eyes are on the Lord our God, until He shows us favor." - Psalm 123:2

Reflection Question

In your daily life, what tends to compete most for your attention and pull your eyes away from God?

Prayer

Father, teach me to keep my eyes fixed on You rather than on my own plans and distractions. I want to be attentive to Your voice and responsive to Your leading. Amen.

Day 3: You Can Trust His Heart

Devotional

Here is a question worth sitting with: when you picture God, what do you see? Is He distant? Disappointed? Waiting for you to mess up again? Many of us carry a picture of God that does not match who He actually says He is. And that picture quietly shapes everything. It affects whether we pray, whether we trust, and whether we believe His help is even available to us. God revealed Himself to Moses in one of the most direct self-descriptions in all of Scripture. He is compassionate. Gracious. Slow to anger. Abounding in faithful love and truth. That is not a God who is reluctantly tolerating you. That is a God who is genuinely for you. This matters deeply when it comes to surrender. The only reason to say to a master, "Direct me, guide me, I will do whatever You say," is if you trust that master's heart. And God's heart toward you is good. He is not holding out on you. He is not setting you up to fail. He loves to show mercy. Whatever you have done, whatever you are carrying, you are not too far gone. His love is not something you earn. It is something He freely gives to those who come to Him with open hands.

Bible Verse

"The Lord is a compassionate and gracious God, slow to anger and abounding in faithful love and truth." - Exodus 34:6

Reflection Question

How has your picture of God shaped the way you approach Him, and does that picture actually line up with how He describes Himself?

Prayer

God, forgive me for the times I have believed lies about who You are. Help me to see You clearly as a compassionate and gracious Father who loves to show mercy. Amen.

Day 4: Honest Enough to Cry Out

Devotional

There is no polished language in Psalm 123. The psalmist does not wrap his prayer in neat, spiritual-sounding words. He is worn out. He has had more than enough of hard times, of contempt, of being looked down on. And he says so, plainly and urgently, to God. That kind of honesty is not a lack of faith. It is actually a sign of it. You do not cry out to someone you do not believe is listening. You do not bring your exhaustion to a God you think does not care. Maybe you are in a season right now where you have had more than enough. More than enough of the struggle, the uncertainty, the feeling of being misunderstood or overlooked. If so, you are in good company. The psalmist was there. And so was Jesus, who cried out from the cross in the middle of His deepest suffering. God is not asking you to clean yourself up before you come to Him. He is inviting you to come as you are, with all the weight and weariness you are carrying. Bring it honestly. Bring it urgently. He is not put off by your desperation. He is moved by it. Your honesty is not a barrier to God's presence. It is often the very thing that opens the door.

Bible Verse

"Have mercy on us, Lord, have mercy on us, for we have had more than enough contempt."
- Psalm 123:3

Reflection Question

Is there something you have been holding back from God because it felt too raw or too messy to bring to Him honestly?

Prayer

Lord, I am tired of pretending everything is fine. I bring You my honest, worn-out heart today and ask for Your mercy to meet me right here. Amen.

Day 5: The Master Who Serves

Devotional

Everything we have explored this week, looking up, trusting God's heart, crying out honestly, finds its fullest expression in one person: Jesus. He was the perfect servant. He kept His eyes on the Father. He trusted the Father's heart even when the path led to suffering He did not fully understand. He cried out honestly, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" And He kept going anyway. And because He did, everything changed. Through His death and resurrection, sin was defeated. The hardest things you are

facing do not get the final word. Evil does not win. Mercy does. This is the God you are invited to serve. Not a distant ruler demanding performance, but a Master who loved you enough to become a servant Himself, to carry what you could not carry, and to make a way when there was no way. You are not too far gone. You have not wandered too far. His love and forgiveness are available to you right now, not because you earned them, but because He freely offers them. So look up. Trust His heart. Cry out honestly. And rest in the truth that the Master you serve is the same One who gave everything for you.

Bible Verse

"I lift my eyes to you, the one enthroned in heaven." - Psalm 123:1

Reflection Question

How does knowing that Jesus Himself modeled humble, trusting servanthood change the way you think about surrendering your own life to God?

Prayer

Jesus, thank You for being the perfect example of what it looks like to trust the Father completely. Help me to follow Your lead and find rest in serving a Master who loves me this deeply. Amen.
