

5 Day Devotional

This five-day devotional will be taking a deeper dive into the sermon from this weekend. We will explore themes of renewal, joy, and the fresh work that Jesus wants to do in our lives, as well as the call to step out of spiritual ruts and embrace a vibrant faith.

Day 1

Mark 2:18-20

18 Now John's disciples and the Pharisees[a] were fasting. People came and asked him, "Why do John's disciples and the Pharisees' disciples fast, but your disciples do not fast?" 19 Jesus said to them, "The wedding guests cannot fast while the groom is with them, can they? As long as they have the groom with them, they cannot fast. 20 But the time[b] will come when the groom will be taken away from them, and then they will fast on that day.

This day's scripture challenges us to consider the joy found in our relationship with Jesus. When we find ourselves stuck in spiritual routines or expectations, Jesus invites us to a life of delight rather than drudgery. It can be easy to fall into a rhythm of simply going through the motions, fasting or praying out of obligation rather than out of a desire to connect with our Savior. This passage reminds us that Jesus brings a new way of living that is centered on joy and satisfaction in Him.

As we reflect on our spiritual practices, it is vital that we assess our motivations. Are we engaging in these practices to satisfy an obligation or to deepen our relationship with God? God desires to refresh and renew us, transforming our actions into expressions of love and worship, enabling us to experience the fullness of life He offers.

- What spiritual routines might you be following out of obligation rather than joy?
- How can you invite Jesus to renew your heart and mind in your daily practices?
- In what ways can you express your delight in Jesus this week?
- Pray for God to reveal areas of your life where you've fallen into a rut.

Day 3

Isaiah 25:6-9

6 On this mountain,[a] the Lord of Armies will prepare for all the peoples a feast of choice meat, a feast with aged wine, prime cuts of choice meat,[b] fine vintage wine.

7 On this mountain he will swallow up the burial shroud, the shroud over all the peoples, the sheet covering all the nations.

8 When he has swallowed up death once and for all, the Lord God will wipe away the tears from every face and remove his people's disgrace from the whole earth, for the Lord has spoken.

9 On that day it will be said, "Look, this is our God; we have waited for him, and he has saved us. This is the Lord; we have waited for him. Let's rejoice and be glad in his salvation."

This day's scripture unveils the promise of God's abundant grace and joy, illustrating the beautiful invitation we have to join Him in celebration. Just as a wedding feast is an occasion for joy, our relationship with God is meant to be marked by delight and intimacy. When we experience the fullness of His love, the burdens of life begin to lift, allowing us to rejoice in His presence.

As we consider our walk with Christ, we should not only acknowledge His invitations to feasting and celebration but also actively engage in them. This devotional encourages us to cultivate a heart of gratitude for the mercies He provides, recognizing that every moment spent in His presence is an opportunity for joy and renewal.

Day 4

16 "Whenever you fast, don't be gloomy like the hypocrites. For they disfigure their faces so that their fasting is obvious to people. Truly I tell you, they have their reward. 17 But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, 18 so that your fasting isn't obvious to others but to your Father who is in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

As we delve into the theme of true fasting in today's scripture, we are reminded that spiritual practices should never be about outward appearances or gaining approval from others. Jesus addresses how fasting can become a performative act rather than a genuine expression of longing for God. The emphasis is placed on the heart—God desires authenticity in our walk with Him, not ritualistic behaviors that lack true devotion.

This encourages us to examine our motivational perspective. Why do we engage in spiritual disciplines? Are we seeking public acknowledgment, or are we genuinely pursuing a deeper relationship with God? Today is an opportunity to reassess our spiritual journeys and ensure that they are rooted in sincerity, authenticity, and love for our Savior.

- How can you ensure your spiritual practices come from a place of genuine love for God?
- What internal factors might be hindering your spiritual growth right now?
- How can you encourage others to embrace authentic expressions of their faith?
- Ask God to help you focus on the heart of worship rather than performative actions.
- Pray for authenticity in your spiritual practices as you seek Him.

Day 5

2 Corinthians 5:17

17 Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has passed away, and see, the new has[a] come!
