

### God Calls Us To Be His Ambassadors



All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation: that God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting people's sins against them. And he has committed to us the message of reconciliation. We are therefore Christ's ambassadors, as though God were making his appeal through us. We implore you on Christ's behalf: Be reconciled to God. God made him who had no sin to be sin<sup>[]</sup> for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. 2 Corinthians 5:18-21

On January 1, 1863 the Emancipation Proclamation went into effect and announced that all slaves in rebellious states were now free. With the Civil War still happening, those slaves were

not immediately freed from slavery. Even after the Civil War ended on April 9, 1865, some remained in slavery. It took some months for the northern army to make its way throughout southern states to enforce the Emancipation Proclamation. Finally, by the summer of 1865, all slaves were freed. Even though slaves had the status of being freed according to the federal government, they still lived as slaves.

Many people live a spiritual life like that in our world. By nature, we were slaves to sin, death, and the devil. Completely unable to find God or come to him. But Jesus came. He lived the perfect life we couldn't have lived. He died the death that should've been ours. Because of that, God has reconciled us to himself. Our status before God has changed! What a wonderful truth – the sins that we struggle with daily...the sins that keep us up at night...the sins that are embarrassing are forgiven in Christ. God wasn't content to end it there. He has also wrapped around us Jesus' perfect life. So that through trusting in Jesus, God sees none of our sins but only Jesus' perfect life.

But unfortunately, not everyone knows this or trusts this. Despite God's victory over sin and death, people continue to remain in the darkness of sin and unbelief. What is our task? God calls us to be his ambassadors – to announce this victory proclamation. God has freed us from the slavery of sin and death, and he calls us to be his own and live in his kingdom of grace and mercy. May God give us joy to know that we have peace with God, and may God give us zeal to share that grace with others.

### ST. PAUL'S STUDENTS TO HELP THOSE SUFFERING FROM POVERTY

St. Paul's Lutheran School will be doing a service project on February 14, 2024. It will support the homeless in our community. Students will make "kits" that will be distributed by Couleecap, a local organization that supports people suffering from poverty. Items we are collecting include travel size deodorants (both men's and women's), travel size lotions and ChapStick, travel size packs of baby wipes/wet wipes, hand warmers, socks for man/woman/child, paper towels, sponges, cleaning products (i.e. Windex, Pine sol, Soft Scrub, all purpose cleaner), and flashlights with batteries. In addition to the supplies, each kit will include a message of Jesus' love. Collection bins will be set up in the church lobby area. We ask that donations be brought by Monday, February 12, 2024. Students will assemble the "kits" on Wednesday, February 14 - Valentine's Day.

### **ENROLLMENT FOR 2024-2025**

TADS Admissions is now open for new students. Applications are time-stamped. A priority order established by St. Paul's Board of Education will be followed to determine which students are awarded seats. There are classrooms currently at capacity with students on a waiting list. Members of St. Paul's with new children they would like to attend St. Paul's are encouraged to complete Admissions applications (on our website) as soon as possible to give the best chance of getting a seat.

Parents of currently enrolled St. Paul's students have received emails through TADS to complete Enrollment for their children for the 2024-2025 school year. Completion of Enrollment is the way to reserve a seat for a child in a classroom. We will use the priority order established by the Board of Education to offer seats to student on our waiting list.

St. Paul's hosted an Open House on Sunday, January 21, 2024, for parents interested in learning more about our preschool and Kindergarten programs. We anticipate filling Kindergarten and beginning a Waiting List. It is possible a similar situation will happen with four-year-old preschool. Our leaders continue to work hard to serve as many students as possible while still striving for the excellence in Christian education that makes our school so attractive.



### **Great Things Happening at St. Paul's**

St. Paul's PTO sponsored a visit from Jesse Horn on Friday, January 19. Jesse Horn, diagnosed with autism at age 3, gave a motivational speech about overcoming disabilities. Jesse is a world champion cup sport stacker. He demonstrated competition speed for our students, and he also took time to slow down and explain different events in sport stacking.

### **London Trip**

As a part of our synod's goal of planting 100 churches in 10 years, we have the opportunity to help one of those mission plants in London. St. Paul's has a team of people ready to go to London from **June 14th-24th**. The mission work is going to focus on Central London, specifically Tower Hamlets. The reason they want us there:

- 1) The WELS UK mission is looking to offer weekly church services in June and July. They are requesting more people to be in church to welcome guests on the two Sundays that they will be there.
- 2) The group will spend 2-3 days volunteering in a UK run charity. The groups should engage others in conversation, let their light shine by word or deed, and invite them to a church service.
- 3) Encourage WELS UK members in their life of discipleship.

40-50% of the trip will be sight-seeing and the trips are self-funded. The estimated cost of the trip will be \$1500 plus airfare.
