REFLECTIONS

For a long time, this book has been called “The Acts of the Apostles,” but it could equally well be called “The Acts of the Risen Jesus through the Holy Spirit,” for it is every bit as much about what Jesus is doing in the world as what the apostles do. In the introduction to the book, the writer, Luke, refers to his former book, his Gospel, in which he “dealt with all that Jesus began to do and teach, until the day” of his ascension (Acts 1:1-2). This book, however, is about the events that follow, the continuing work of Jesus from heaven, through the Holy Spirit working in the apostles and the early church.

The book of Acts offers something unique in Christian canon. It has no rival in terms of a book spanning so many different lands. Its references to the Spirit far outpace any other work. It functions as a hinge canonically, bridging the Gospels and Epistles. It recounts the birth of the church age. And its content has no parallel in the New Testament. Some of Paul’s letters correspond to each other, and the four Gospels overlap, but most of what is found in Acts can be found in no other document. Without Acts, there would be no account of fire and wind at Pentecost. No description of Peter’s encounter with Cornelius. No narrative of the rise of the multiethnic church in Antioch. No story of Paul’s visit to Philippi, Corinth, or Ephesus, or of Paul’s trials in Jerusalem and Caesarea...

At the highest level, Luke writes to convince his audience that the bumpy start of the community of God is the plan of God. Luke’s audience needs assurance that they are on the right path. As the church endures rejection and persecution, God’s people might not be sure this is the fulfillment of the kingdom. In many ways, Acts can be seen as a series of onslaughts of Satan trying to thwart the spread of the word. Ironically, the onslaughts only propel it forward. Luke therefore, reassures Christians of the nature and plan of God. This is the primary purpose of Acts.

Pastor: And it was in mercy towards us that our heavenly Father gave his only Son to suffer death on the Cross for our redemption.

As it is written: On the night Christ was betrayed he took Bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and said, “This is my body, which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.” Then in the same way, after supper Jesus took the Cup, saying, “This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.” For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord’s death until he comes.

If you are unable to come to the front to take communion, remain in your seat and it will be brought to you. The bread is homemade and gluten free. Wine is in the clear cups and grape juice is in the purple cups.
