Prophecy/Advent Presentation and Homework



<u>NOTE</u>: We can learn about prophecy and the Season of Advent through the use of the Advent Wreath. Please know there are various views held for each candles' specific meaning. There is simply no 'one way' to describe each candle, so we recognize church liberty and freedom in assigning meanings; however, some views are more common than others.



Prophecy is different than prediction. While *prophecy* is when a prophet actually states the word of God and future things that will indeed happen, *prediction* is when a person states what may or may not happen (full of chance). Good to know the difference. :-)

Advent Wreath Candle One: The Prophecy Candle (Hope/Watch) Blue or Purple

"The Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel." Isaiah 7:14

Advent Wreath Center Candle: The Christ Candle (Light) White

"When Jesus spoke again to the people, he said, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." John 8:12

We light candles to represent Jesus being the Light of the World. It's said that Martin Luther was the first to put candles, yes, actual candles, on the Christmas trees in Germany back in the 1500's. Whether that is true or not, is not for certain. No matter, we do know that lights can represent and remind us of God's Son, the Light of the World, who has come to pierce our darkness and give us life!

How can seeing a candle or Christmas lights in general deepen your understanding of Christmas decorations?
