# From the Ministerial Staff

I keep of list of quotes from films or books that have to do with "hope". As far as films, *Shawshank Redemption* (which is way overplayed) and *The Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers* (and book) offer poignant scenes and lines about *hope*. When it comes to books, you can't go wrong with most writings by C. S. Lewis, Martin Marty, or Fredderick Buechner. As we enter 2021, *hope* is a theme on most of our hearts and minds. I was asked to write about my hopes for The United Church for this new year. While there's overlap with my personal hopes, I have three overall hopes for this congregation over the next twelve months.

It's impossible to clearly see or fully enjoy our experiences of realized hope without memory and memorial. I hope that during the months ahead of us, we can take the time to remember the terrible loss of life throughout 2020 in our country and around the world because of this ongoing pandemic. I mention that acknowledging the incomprehensible number of people who have and will continue to die each day in the weeks ahead. As we remember this great loss may we also honor them through the ways we live out our lives as a church, as followers of the great Teacher and Healer. May the Spirit of Comfort be with the many, many surviving loved ones throughout this time of collective grief.


Another *hope* I have for The United Church is that we'll be able to gather together in person later this year. I learned during our building projects to not try and predict when something will be "complete" or "open" to the public. I have even less foresight about vaccine procedures, protocols, distribution schedules and effectiveness. But we can be hopeful, can't we? We can look forward to that day when we *begin* to gather together once again. It won't happen at once, but it seems likely that 2021 will offer us the opportunity for more and more togetherness. May we bring our newfound understanding of community and connection apart from each other, into our coming together later this year!

A final *hope* I offer is for us to have a clearer understanding as to where our priorities and efforts should be focused in our ministries and mission—that we will live more fully into God's ongoing vision. That's right! Although the buildings were locked, prohibitive signs were posted everywhere, in-person gatherings ceased (in large measure), and ministry budgets were cut—God's vision for this community of faith didn't close its doors or fade in any way! And while individual churches do have a lifespan, it's hard to believe that a congregation who gives such a significant portion of its annual budget, financial gifts, and effort to mission, has a declining vision. It seems more likely that we have the opportunity

and invitation to pivot (a popular word these days) in order to see more clearly and follow more fully into God's continued vision for us.

There are other hopes that we all have, I'm sure. But these stand out to me as we cross this calendar threshold with so much heaviness upon us and so much brightness before us. May each day of 2021 be lived with constant trust in the God who was, is, and will always be "our help in ages past, our hope for years to come".

May the Hope of Christ be with you this year!



The old proverb, "may you live in interesting times" needs to be placed on a shelf for a bit. The year that has ended can be described in many ways... "interesting" is probably the kindest. We, as a Church, community/state and country, have endured a trying twelve months. 
Hello all,

# **Dignity Mission**

Update

Members of the congregation completed 600 adult dignity kits last year and in December assembled 200 children's kits, containing a few hygiene products and many small toys and a candy cane, see pictures below. These Christmas packets were delivered to the children living in five facilities in Cuidad Juarez that house immigrants seeking asylum in the US.

Delivery of the children's kits and many other donations from around the state took place in the last half of December. A \$3000 grant from the Missions and Service Board supported the purchase of supplies. Toys were donated by the Thrift Shop and individual members.

The Memorials and Endowment Committee met in December and granted up to \$5000 to continue this mission in 2021. As soon as it is safe, we will welcome all members to help in the continuation of this wonderful project.

Facilitated by David Elton




Standing between the erratic times of Israel being ruled by judges and Israel's emergence as a strong and united kingdom is the rise of the prophet Samuel and Israel's first king. This book of the Old Testament can be divided by the three main characters: Samuel, the one who represents God's presence and word throughout Israel; Saul, the first king of Israel who struggles to follow Samuel's advice at crucial times; and David, who is anointed Saul's successor years before he

actually becomes Israel's second king in Second Samuel. The political and military escapades abound throughout this book and remain within the rule and power of God's covenantal and delivering hand. Join Rev. David Elton each Sunday as we read and discuss First Samuel.

## Jesus and the Disinherited

To kick off the new year, you're invited to join Pastor Kara and discover one of the key texts that helped undergird the Civil Rights movement: Howard Thurman's <u>Jesus and the Disinherited</u>. In this classic theological treatise, the acclaimed theologian and religious leader Howard Thurman (1900–81) demonstrates how the gospel may be read as a manual of resistance for the poor and disenfranchised. Jesus is a partner in the pain of the oppressed and the example of His life offers a solution to ending the descent into moral nihilism. Hatred does not empower—it decays. Only through self-love and love of one another can God's justice prevail.

## The Sabbath

Once Lent begins, Kara's class will switch gears to another classic of the mid-20th century,

The Sabbath, by Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel. Elegant, passionate, and filled with the love of God's creation, Abraham Hoshua Heschel's *The Sabbath* has been hailed as a classic of Jewish spirituality ever since its original publication in 1951—and has been read by thousands of people of many faiths seeking meaning in modern life. In this brief yet profound meditation on the meaning of the Seventh Day, Heschel introduced the enormously influential idea of an "architecture of holiness" that appears not in space but in time.



Judaism, he argues, is the religion of time: it finds meaning not in space and the material things that fill it but in time and the eternity that imbues it, so that "the Sabbaths are our great cathedrals."

This class begins on February 21 with the Prologue and Chapter 1: A Palace in Time.


# Monday Morning Women's Book Study


the seemingly constant conflict between good and evil.

Online via Zoom, Fridays 10am – Noon




