GIFTS OF THE SPIRIT

"There are different kinds of gifts. But it is the same Holy Spirit Who gives them. There are different kinds of work to be done for Him. But the work is for the same Lord. There are different ways of doing His work. But it is the same God who uses all these ways in all people. The Holy Spirit works in each person in one way or another for the good of all." I Corinthians 12:4-7.

For the past year Spiritual Guidance Cabinet has been looking at ways to help our congregation grow in discovering and using our individual spiritual gifts. The sermon series through I Corinthians was a kick-off point for looking at our dependence upon the Lord's power through His gifts to build His kingdom.

In August, September, and October, the first Sunday of each month will be dedicated to a specific spiritual gift (Hospitality, Evangelism, and Prophecy are the first three).

The commissions will be following up after those sermons with opportunities to discover and practice these gifts.

Another round of sermons on gifts will follow at a later date. Be in prayer for our church body and as individuals that we apply what we've heard in I Corinthians where we are told to eagerly desire the gifts, knowing that God's Kingdom can be built better through His gifting and not our own.

MENNONITE MOMENTS

The Mennonite Choral Society was started in 1890 and reached a membership high of 218 in 1913. In 1933, singers from outside our church were invited to participate in a performance of Handel's *Messiah* for the first *time*.

Planners of our present church (1912) did not feel modern toilets were important and the old-fashioned kinds were constructed in the horse barn.

The Baumgartner and Muensterberg Mennonite churches were built about the same time (1860). They were different in that the Baumgartners had backs on their pews and only one entrance door. The Muensterbergs had backless benches and two entrance doors—one for women and the other for men.

Our forefathers did not carry Bibles to church as it was considered pretentious. When Rev. S.F. Sprunger came home from college he carried a Bible to church. He was severely criticized by most of the congregation.

When the M.R.E. Cemetery was originally planned, it was suggested by the Mennonite church that each of the three churches should have their own section "to avoid trouble and dis-satisfaction among the three churches." The Reformed and Evangelical churches opposed this resolution and the Mennonites acceded. However, a separate place was set aside for non-church members.

FOX TALES

My name is Tom and I am a fainter.

Whenever I have to do a blood draw I have a tendency to pass out. I have been told it is in my head, I have been told that I should just power through it, I have been told that if I do not watch I will be okay. And yet every time I am like a Myotonic goat and I pass out.

For the uninformed, Myotonic goats are a breed that has a defective gene that causes them to fall over like in a faint when they are startled. I am a human myotonic goat when it comes to blood draws. Numerous medical people have told me that they know what they are doing and nobody has ever passed out while they were drawing blood. And yet I can testify to at least three **phlebotomists** who can no longer say that they have never had anyone pass out.

But I am happy to report that I have not passed out recently. And the reason for that is that I have owned my condition. The first part of getting better is admitting you have a problem, and so I have done that.

Now I no longer try and pretend I am okay when the needles come out. I am upfront and admit that I go down like a sack of potatoes when you stick me. And when I am getting my blood drawn I have become more assertive. I know that I need to be flat on my back when I am being stuck and I do not let them talk me out of it. The solution to overcoming my problem was to admit that I did not care about what anybody thought, and to advocate for what I know will work.

I believe for too many of us this is the problem that we often have in sharing our faith. We are worried about what people might think. If I share I might offend people. They might not like me. They might think I am a fanatic.

And indeed they might. But we need to own who we are and be willing to be more open to sharing the good news of Jesus Christ. We need to be openly seeking ways to share the Gospel. If someone accepts, praise the Lord. If we plant a seed and they are open to someone else sharing, praise the Lord.

I am not calling for us to use our Bibles to beat unbelievers into submission. But we need to be open to sharing. If someone is not in the Kingdom they might reject the message, but we cannot drive them to a second or a third level of hell. The choices are "in" or "out".

I spent years trying to be a tough guy, and oftentimes this led to me on an exam room floor looking up at people trying to revive me. I do not want to have to explain to the Lord someday why I was under the table when people were seeking Him. - tef
