FOX TALES

When I was in junior high, my Uncle Max Lehman and his family went on vacation for a short time, and I was tasked with taking care of the livestock on his farm. This sounds like more work than it actually was. He only had heifers (both myself and the cows were glad no milking was involved) and they were on pasture.

My sole responsibility was to ride my bike out to the farm in the morning and in the late afternoon to make sure the animals had water.

My job was to take a six-foot piece of pipe, hook it up to a pump, feed the pipe through a round hole in the side of the barn, and fill a trough with water. And for the first two days this went along without a problem. On the evening of the third day, I went to put the pipe in the hole and I encountered something blocking the hole. I peeked into the hole and saw the familiar black and white hide of a Holstein cow.

No problem. I would just shove the pipe a bit harder and the cow would move on. I pushed the pipe in again with more force and was met with a bellow and no movement of the pipe.

Sensing that there might be a bigger problem, I went around the wall and entered the barnyard. I was greeted by a cow stuck in the water trough. She gave me a look of, "Okay you dumb boy, get me out of here." The cow had somehow sat on a support piece in the tank, causing it to sag and trap the cow in the water tank. Try as I might I could not get the cow out.

My only solution was to hop on my bike and head down to see my Grandfather Harry Lehman. I told him there was a cow stuck in the tank. He gave me a look of, "Oh you dumb city boy, just lead the cow out of the tank." I convinced him that I had tried and it had not worked.

He drove over and assessed the situation and, being the master dairyman that he was, freed the cow. And all was restored in the bovine world.

The point of this story is that we are more like cows than a city boy or a farmer. We get tangled up with sin and the more we struggle with it the more trapped we get. We are left sitting in a mess of our own making, looking around to see who we can blame for our poor choices.

Thankfully we do not have to wait for someone to ride to our rescue. We have the opportunity to turn to the one true God and seek forgiveness from our sins. And then we only need to trust in God, and He can pull us out of the mire we are in.

That does not mean there will not be consequences for our actions. The cow in this story had a few bumps and abrasions, but was able to be freed from the trap she was in. And we may also suffer from a variety of reminders about the path we chose. But in the end God will free us from our sin, and we can be wonderfully and thankfully freed from the mess that we have encountered. -tef †

Brenda J. Sommer, 84, passed away on Friday, July 18, 2025, at Swiss Village. She was born on January 23, 1941, in Adams County, Indiana to the late Rufus P. and Martha (Zimmerman) Sommer.

Brenda graduated from Adams Central High School and attended the First Mennonite Church in Berne. Brenda was honorably discharged from the United States Navy, where she served from 1960-1961. She worked at Shultz Company in St. Louis for 12 years as a production worker.

Her hobbies include reading and watching the St. Louis Cardinals. She created many meaningful friendships driving for her Amish friends. Brenda greatly enjoyed her nieces and nephews.

Survivors include her sister, Janice K. (Ernest) Steiner of Berne, Indiana; sister-in-law, Pam Sommer of Yorktown, Indiana; nephew, Adam Steiner of Glasgow, Kentucky; two nieces, Julie (Jeff) Chrisman of Berne, Indiana and Sada Sommer of Yorktown, Indiana; and several great nieces and nephews.

Brenda was preceded in death by her brother, Michael E. Sommer. In honoring Brenda's wishes, there were no services.

Frederick Dale Stauffer (known as "Fred" or "Fritz"), 94, passed away Sunday, July 27, 2025, at Swiss Village. Born July 31, 1930, in Berne, he was the son of the late Menno E. and Hulda (Gilliom) Stauffer. He was united in marriage to Claudette Nagel on September 1, 1951, at our church and she preceded him in death on June 18, 2022.

Fred graduated from Berne High School in 1948 and completed training at DeVry Technical Institute in Chicago for TV and radio repair. Places of employment included Schindler Electric, General Electric Factory Service in Fort Wayne (nearly 13 years), and Habegger Furniture (50 years), where he serviced TVs and appliances, delivered furniture, and worked on the sales floor.

He was baptized and joined our church on June 4, 1944. His love of music led to his involvement in the Mennonite Men's Chorus, Chancel Choir, Praise Ensemble, and the Mennonite Choral Society, in which he sang the *Messiah* for 74 years. He also served as a song leader, participated on the Worship Commission and in the Radio Ministry, sang in several quartets, and for more than 40 years sang duets with Byron Fox. He often sang baritone solos, including for the oratorios Handel's *Messiah*, Dubois' The *Seven Last Words of Christ*, and the trio in Haydn's *The Creation* in Fort Wayne and Berne. Additionally, he sang in the Edelweiss Singers and was still singing with the Swiss Village Singers and preparing for a solo when he passed.

Fred loved being with family and was a dedicated husband, father, grandfather, and great-grandfather. He was very devoted to his wife of 70 years, Claudette, especially as a caregiver, the last 12 years of her life.

Julia G. Beitler-Liechty, 101, peacefully went home to be with her Lord and Savior Tuesday evening, August 5, 2025, surrounded by her family at Swiss Village.

She was born on January 20, 1924, to the late Wilber E. and Della (Neuenschwander) Lehman at their country home in Berne, Indiana. She never lived more than two miles from the home she was born in. Julia was united in marriage to Chester Leroy Beitler on August 26, 1945, at First Mennonite Church, and he preceded her in death on February 12, 1982. Julia later married Adam J. Liechty on January 7, 1989, at First Mennonite Church, and he preceded her in death on January 14, 2009.

She was baptized and joined our church on May 23, 1937. Chester and Julia served as team teachers for Kindergarten for 19 years. Julia also taught Sunday School and Wednesday nights at the church and was active in the Women's Missionary Society.

Julia was a gifted contralto singer and shared her gift with many people. She actively sang for 70 years in the Mennonite Choral Society, Chancel Choir, and the Ladies Sextet for many years. Julia also sang solos in many weddings and funeral services.

Julia walked to and attended Munsterberg #9 School through 8th grade, and she graduated from Monroe High School in 1941. Following high school, Julia began working for Berne Overall Factory. As Chester and Julia began their

family, she stayed home to raise their family. As their children grew up, Julia returned to work at Economy Printing, now EP Graphics, and continued there for 21 years.

Julia had an exceptional talent for quilting and sewing. She hand-quilted numerous quilts over the years, and was actively quilting until a week before her passing. During the summer months she loved spending time tending to her flowers and gardening. She cherished the time spent with family.

Above all, Julia was a true example of a woman of God, and encouraged so many people with prayers, handwritten cards, and kind words.

Survivors include her son, John (Brenda) Beitler of Kennett Square, Pennsylvania; daughter, Christine (Larry) Nofziger of Beaverlodge, Alberta; son, Stanley Beitler of Fort Wayne, Indiana; step-daughter, Anita (Dan) Wenger of Berne, Indiana; step-son, Stanley (Shirley) Liechty of Port Huron, Michigan; step-son, John (Peggy) Liechty of Ypsilanti, Michigan; step-son, Dallas (Jacki) Liechty of Osceola, Indiana; step-daughter, Audrey (Gary) Kah of Noblesville, Indiana; daughter-in-law, Sharon Beitler of Forest, Ohio; sister-in-law, Naomi Lehman of Berne, Indiana; 28 grandchildren; 57 great-grandchildren; and one great-great-granddaughter.

MENNONITE MOMENTS

About 1875 John A. Sprunger (founder of the Missionary church) was our choir director. His directing was considered satisfactory, but his singing was considered shallow. Thus he was replaced by David C. Neuenschwander, age 18.

In 1903, our church gave consideration to starting a German parochial school because they had concerns about finding a minster who could also preach in English. The idea was dropped when Rev. J. W. Kliewer, a Russian immigrant, met the qualifications.

In the early days you were expected to send word ahead if you could not attend church since services would not begin until everyone had arrived. †
