

# DAILY RALLY TOPIC IDEAS

## Expanded List

On page 123 of the Outreach Guide you learned about daily rally topic ideas, and we gave you a few common topics students have used in the past. Check out the expanded list below for a much larger list of ideas!

## GOSPEL RALLY TOPIC IDEAS:

### Daily Topic Ideas for a “Meant For More” Outreach Week Theme

#### **Meant for More:**

*Than This Temporary World*

Have a speaker talk about the world God created to be perfect and how, now that it has fallen, He has a plan to bring restoration to the world. Explain that through Christ we can once again have a relationship with God through Christ.

#### **Meant for More:**

*Than Fame and Wealth*

Explain to your peers that even fame, wealth, and the attractive things in this world fade. They don't last. We are meant for a world that lasts forever. Use this as a way to share the gospel and invite students to know God and live with Him forever through Christ.

#### **Meant for More:**

*Than Pain and Anger*

Everyone has had pain in their lives or anger over something that has happened to them. Use this daily topic to explain how God is the great healer and redeemer of our lives through Christ. We are meant for more than the bad things that have happened to us, and we can have hope for more than this life.

### Daily Topic Ideas for a “Why” Outreach Week Theme

#### **Why:**

*Is There Pain in the World?*

Have a speaker address the problem of pain in the world and how God speaks into pain with His love. Talk about how God brings good out of pain although He never wants to put us through pain.

#### **Why:**

*Should I Know about Christ?*

Use this common question to explain the gospel and the reason why Christ is so important to every living person. Explain what He did on the cross for all people.

#### **Why:**

*Should I Believe in Christ?*

Have a speaker come in to share about the truth of Christ, historical facts and apologetic standpoints for why we know Christ is God and more than just a human.

## Daily Topic Ideas for a “Who Is Jesus” Outreach Week Theme

**Who is Jesus?  
What Did He Do?  
Why Should I Care?**

Use these questions to explain the life of Christ and His deity. Discuss a different question each day and build on the questions as you go through the week. Tell the truth to your peers about who Jesus really is, and how we can know Him today.

## Daily Topic Ideas for an “I’m Changed” Outreach Week Theme

**I’m Changed:**  
*Various testimonies from club members each day.*

If your club decides on this theme, then each day you can have a different club member share their testimony and background so that students can hear how they were changed by God.

## Daily Topic Ideas for a “Love” Outreach Week Theme

**Love:**  
*More Than a Feeling.*

So many students think they know what love is and that you can easily fall in and out of it. Tell them the truth about real love, the love Christ showed in His life and sacrifice: a love that will not ever fade or fail them.



# APOLOGETICS RALLY TOPIC IDEAS:

### The Bible Matters

Students today think the Bible is merely a book. They don't know that it is historically and scientifically proven. They don't know that it is powerful and relevant to their lives. Talk on the truth and impact of the Bible. Challenge students to read it. Give out copies to every student who attends.

### The Problem of Evil

A major reason students consider themselves to be atheists or agnostics is because they are angry with God. They do not understand how a “good” God could allow bad things to happen. Talk on the problem of sin. Talk on the faithfulness and goodness of God. Speak very lovingly on this topic. Many people are hurting. *(Recognize that this topic is huge and a 30-minute rally is short. Come VERY prepared on this topic so you can adequately address these issues).*

### Truth, Tolerance, & Relativism

Is there absolute truth? If not, what are we living for? Truth is powerful and rooted in the Word of God. Encourage the students at your school to think about truth. Jesus claims, “I am the way.” That is absolute. It means there is only one way to heaven. What does this mean for our lives?

## Intelligent Design

What brought all of life into existence? Many students are asking this very question. There is a DVD called "Unlocking the Mystery of Life" that talks about a powerful but controversial idea called Intelligent Design. Go to the heart of the matter and talk about the origin of life. It points to a Creator. Give out DVD's to all who attend.

## Does God Exist?

Lee Strobel produced a DVD called "The Case for a Creator." It talks about his journey from spiritual skepticism to a profound faith in the God who designed every galaxy and living cell in the universe. You can host an event that addresses this topic. Challenge the students at your school to see science as evidence of a supernatural Creator. Pass out these DVD's to all students who attend.

## Jesus: Fact or Fiction

Is there historical evidence for Jesus? If Jesus really is God, what does that mean for the claims that he made?

## What Can We Know About God?

If you want to use a theme about truth and relativism, explain how we can really know things about God and what we can know about Him. This can focus on the Word of God and nature and what we can learn from each.



## Remember

By no means is this an exhaustive list of Outreach Week themes. Think creatively! As a leadership team, pick an Outreach Week theme that best meets the needs of the students at your school, while giving you clear opportunities to share the gospel message with them. **Make sure that in your theme, the gospel, remains central!**



# Believe it can happen

## Intelligent Design at a Public School

**D**aniel, the club president at Santa Fe High School, had a passion for apologetics, specifically the argument for Intelligent Design.

So Daniel set up an Intelligent Design rally for his senior project. He even got teachers to give students extra credit for attending. A Biola University Professor came and presented the argument for Intelligent Design clearly and convincingly. Many students were touched, and eyes were open to the idea of a Creator.

“[The speaker] challenged their minds in a way that they didn’t expect.

***He showed them their perception of humanity in reality lined up with Intelligent Design more than evolution.***

This moved the audience, and afterward students approached and talked with him for almost an hour,” said campus mentor Abe Miranda after the rally.
