From the desk of the chairman

Greetings to all in the blessed name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

RMS, its Board of Directors, and our Administrative Director started 2021 in a spirit of cautious optimism. There was reason to hope that the worst of the COVID-19 pandemic was behind us and that the coming year might see RMS return to its full effectiveness and productivity. We were not disappointed. The Summer of 2021 saw RMS return to a vigorous TASC schedule in which there were four U.S. and one Mexico TASC sites.

The Mexico TASC, ran morning and afternoon VBS programs at two different churches, among many other accomplishments (including building a water tower for a local pastor). The theme of both programs was "Putting on the Whole Armor of God." I had the privilege of playing the role of Dionysus, a retired Roman soldier and one lately converted to Christ. In periodappropriate costume, Dionysus explained the historical significance of the various items of armor from the perspective of a fighting Roman soldier. Very effective teaching then went on to incorporate the historical perspective into the bible passage that formed the basis for the program.

Trips were conducted as well to Costa Rica and Peru. A VBS program was mobilized and conducted in Madison IN, and a Spring Break service trip was organized and run in the Cape Coral/Naples, FL area. We also maintained readiness and continued our disaster relief activities when and where needed. This year, happily, was a less active disaster response year for us; however, we were able to collect and transfer relief funds for Haiti, volcano relief on the island of St. Vincent in the Caribbean, and hurricane lda relief in the U.S.

On an organizational level, 2021 was a watershed year for RMS. We conducted a nationwide search, identified and interviewed several suitable candidates, and hired Jim Iwema of Sanborn, lowa as Promotional Coordinator. Jim started mid-year and has worked diligently contacting existing and potential supporters of RMS. He is actively pursuing several new member churches, helping set up TASC sites for 2022. In addition, Jim and the Board's Promotions Committee have engaged in fundraising activities and the planning of three Clay Shoot events in 2022.

In October, the Board voted to partner with the Barnabas Foundation. The Board believes that this will allow our donors to easily donate to RMS, while at the same time doing so in the most tax-advantaged way. It also allows us to provide donors with the opportunity to review their wills at no cost to them, with professional help from the Barnabas team. Also, we were able to secure new office and warehouse space.

It is now six full years since I have been a part of the RMS Board of Directors. It has been a most rewarding time during which, through the dedicated efforts of our staff and the Board members past and present, RMS has continually advanced to new levels of carrying out its mission and vision statements. All of us at RMS are profoundly grateful for all of you who have so generously supported this ministry, kept it in your prayers, and supported it, so selflessly with your financial and material resources. We started 2021 cautiously optimistic. We are moving into 2022 fully confident and energized in the conviction that God will continue to bless RMS and use it to His glory and to the glory of the Gospel of His one and perfect Son. Bhaktapur Theological Seminary

Bhaktapur Theological Seminary needs a building. It has been working with MINTS International Seminary to train church leaders in Bhaktapur, Nepal, for over five years, but space has always been an issue. When BTS first started, classes were held in the one-room building that makes up Shekinah Evangelical Church. The co-pastors of the church, Nishan Nagarkoti, and Suraj Kasula, are also the founders of the seminary. In the past five years, they have seen both the seminary and the church grow. They have since had to find a new space to hold more seminary classes, but they still are left with a significant challenge. In its current situation, the seminary cannot house residential students. It can only accept students who live near Bhaktapur. However, Suraj and Nishan would like to train church leaders from around Nepal who can spread the message of the gospel throughout the nation. The ultimate solution is to replace the one-room church building with a larger building that can serve as a church and as a residential seminary. Nishan and Suraj have developed plans for a four-story building.

Before the seminary can break ground on the new building, the old building must be torn down. After that, they can begin construction on the footings and the first floor. Nepal is prone to earthquakes, so the Nepali government requires public buildings to follow stringent building codes. It adds to the expense of the project, but it increases the safety of the building. Buildings in Nepal are constructed differently than in North America. The first floor can be built and occupied before any other floors are started. Once the old building is torn down, the church hopes to be able to quickly occupy the first floor for their worship services. Additional floors will be added as God provides the resources. Reformed Mission Services has been assisting MINTS and BTS with this project from the beginning. Please continue to keep RMS, MINTS, and BTS in your prayers as they step forward in faith to provide solid, theological training to students in Bhaktapur and throughout Nepal.

RMS HAS MOVED!

Over the past year, Reformed Mission Services has undergone many changes. We are expanding our outreach to new member churches, and we've secured sites for fundraisers in California and South Dakota. After a few months of preparation and some remodeling, we have also moved into a new office.

You can find our new office just a block away from where we had been for the past few years. RMS continues to grow, and as a natural step of growth, we needed more space. The new offices are more efficient than the previous one with the way they are laid out, but the benefit is, it gives us some much-needed storage space for our equipment as well as our shower and tool trailers.

Our new warehouse space allows us to store our trailers and equipment in a climate-controlled area. This will help us to be ready for any disaster events that may arise. Your continued support has helped make this possible. Thank you for allowing us to make fulfilling the great commission our top priority.
