'Tres Dias' Retreat Opportunity Offered

"Tres dias" is Spanish for "three days."

In 1995, I attended a Tres Dias retreat, and those three days provided a spiritual experience that became foundational to my faith and ministry.

Tres Dias, an ecumenical lay-led ministry, supports local congregations by guiding Christians into a deeper relationship with Christ.

It's three days for Christians to encounter Jesus so they can be renewed, refreshed, and rekindled. Krista went on a weekend early in our relationship. We both have served on weekends.

Over the three days, we worship and hear the faith stories of lay people and clergy, and the outline of the talks focuses on grace, the challenge of living our faith, and how to put our faith into action. The theme remains the same at each retreat, but each person relates their own life, experience, and faith journey. They share their personal walk with Jesus in a meaningful way.

They share the dynamic way Christ motivates them to impact their home, their work environment, and how they used their gifts and talents as servant leaders in their local church.

On Aug 24, our Worship will include music by Steve Weber, a member of the St. John Vianney Catholic Church. We met Steve and his wife, Terri, through the Tres Dias community.

After Worship, we will discuss Tres Dias and the opportunity for you to attend a Tres Dias retreat weekend some time in the future.

Retreats are scheduled each spring and fall.

- Shampoo/conditioner.


Our missions projects provide opportunities for us to treat our neighbors with Christ's love. We thank you for your continued support of our efforts.

Our Rock Prairie Presbyterian Church Legacy Fund has reached a milestone during the second quarter of 2025—it has exceeded \$100,000 for the first time!

This growth was partly due to a recent Session decision to transfer \$34,760, which had been allocated for the Youth Caravan activities and held in a certificate of deposit (CD), to the Legacy Fund.

These funds are designated as a "restricted gift," meaning that the principal will remain intact, with only the investment yields available for Caravan-related activities.

In the most recent quarter, the congregation contributed an additional \$1,100 to the Fund. So as of June 30, the Fund's assets stood at \$110,131, comprised of

- \$39,951 in checking;
- \$37,934 in CDs; and
- \$35,246 in mutual funds.

Additionally, the Fund is named as a beneficiary of a member's Estate Plan for \$5,000.

Finding Hope In The Face Of Evil

(A different Ed's Note: Sometimes I struggle when asked to do a devotion, and today was no different. I just couldn't come up with the right words, and I only had a couple of days left to prepare. Then God presented me with the following, and it's now my testimony to others that He does show us the way. Sometimes it's obvious, sometimes you must ask, and sometimes He just smacks you beside the head and shows you what you didn't see right before you.)

It was Sunday, and Jean de was the Liturgist for his new church for the first time. The father of seven had been attending services for a little over a year and finally got up the nerve to say "yes" to the pastor.

The congregation listened intently (and with a certain sense of pride) as he read the Gospel and introduced hymns. They all understood what a big step this was for him, and most felt that they had had a small part in this "First" for the tall, slender man.

The Congregation knows that God sent Jean de Mutabazi and his family here. On the first day that the whole family showed up in church, they were welcomed as any other new family would be pleasant smiles and handshakes for all—but no real conversation.

But then, the Mutabazi family's story began to make its way into conversations at the coffee klatches and committee meetings.

Over the next few weeks and months, the family's journey to this congregation unfolded . . . "None of them speak English," "They found us on the internet," "They were brought to town by Jewish Social Services," "They have nine people living in a two

bedroom house," "They are from Congo in Africa," "They lived in tents in refugee camps for ten years," "None of them has a job,

had seen running water, used a phone or computer, or even understand what a screen door or window curtain is."

fold sharing of Christian love.

The Republic of Congo has been, for dozens of years, one of the most dangerous places for Christians in the world. Brutal attacks by the minority Muslim population on the majority are

extremely bloody and vicious.

Just this past February, 70 Christians were rounded up in the night, taken to a church that had been boarded up by the rebels, and were brutally tortured and beheaded.

The Mutabazi family left their village when a group of rebels were looting houses and stores and killing Christians. While running from their home, Jean de turned to see his grandfather beaten, and he hasn't seen him since.

"He helped me become a Christian." said Jean de with tears in his eyes when he told a few Rock Prairie members about that day, but added in the next breath, "God sent my family to my new Christian friends, and for this I am grateful."

Please pray with me:

God, I lift my prayer to you, the Prince of Peace. I pray against violence of all kinds. I pray for peace in people's hearts. I pray against the anger, distrust, and hatred that breeds violence against individuals, groups, and countries. I pray this in the great name of Jesus, the Messiah.
