Course Schedule and Descriptions - Spring 2026 Semester (Classes begin 1/5/26)

I. Monday

- A. BS103-2 Knowing Who You Are In Christ 7:00 pm - 9:30 pm - 2 credits**
Students will study the believer's identity in Christ. This course will explore self-examination of the Christian's walk with God and aid in the discovery of personal ministry.
(8 - weeks: starts 1/5/26)

- B. DS-TH205 How to Know and Practice Spiritual Disciplines 6:30 pm - 8:30 pm**
This course provides an in-depth study of the Spiritual Disciplines. Spiritual disciplines are practices that help individuals deepen their faith and grow spiritually, such as prayer, meditation, fasting, worship, and Bible study. They are intentional habits that allow a person to place themselves before God for spiritual transformation. These disciplines can be categorized as inward (like meditation), outward (like simplicity), or corporate (like fellowship). This class seeks to enlighten, enrich and encourage your spiritual growth!
(10 - weeks: starts 1/5/26)

- C. LA257 A Guide to Legal Affairs for Faith-Based Organizations 7:00 pm - 9:30 pm - 2 credits**
To introduce students to a variety of legal matters that impact the faith-based and church organizations. To provide an overview of the U.S. legal system and to examine day to day organizational matters including the legal responsibility of pastors, governing boards, ministries, and persons in leadership capacities. To develop strategic tools to minimize the church's and faith-based organization's exposure to liability.
(10 - weeks: starts 1/5/26)

- D. TH200 Pneumatology: Holy Spirit I 7:00 pm - 9:30 pm - 3 credits**
Examines the purpose, personage, and manifestation of the Holy Spirit. The student will gain an understanding of the Fruit of the Spirit, the Gifts of the Spirit, and their operation in the Church.
(15 - weeks: starts 1/5/26)

II. Tuesday

A. BS102 New Testament Survey

7:00 pm - 9:30 pm - 3 credits

Briefly examine all 27 books of the New Testament, reviewing the major themes and controlling thoughts of scripture. This study is a Christ-Centered approach.

B. PR202 Homiletics II

7:00 pm - 9:30 pm - 4 credits

This course is designed to further the skill and application mastered in Homiletics I and expand the critical nature of the presenter/speaker/preacher. The student will be challenged to apply the biblical perspective towards effectively making other public centered presentations.

C. TH302 Bible Doctrines II

7:00 pm - 9:30 pm - 3 credits

This course is designed for the student to look deeper into God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit, and how the Trinity relates to our faith, both individually and as a corporate body. The student will analyze questions such as: What are the theological ramifications of the cross? How does water baptism connect with regeneration? Are we components of two separate natures? Can we believe everything the Bible says? Most importantly, is there evidence that God and Jesus are one?

III. Thursday

A. BS101 Old Testament Survey

7:00 pm - 9:30 pm - 3 credits

In this class, students will briefly examine all 39 books of the Old Testament, reviewing the major themes and controlling thoughts of scripture. This study is a Christ-centered approach.

B. BS202 Bible Characters II

7:00 pm - 9:30 pm - 3 credits

Students will learn, through the study of sixty-one characters, God's methods in selecting and training people for his sovereign purpose, while seeing the victories, defeats, joys and sorrows of their own lives. Through series of character studies, the students will also gain a greater understanding of God's plan for mankind, and His ways of dealing with mankind, that will aid them in their ability to trust in God and fulfill their purpose in life.

C. CM485 Cybersecurity Fundamentals

6:30 pm - 9:00 pm - 2 credits

This course considers the contemporary cybersecurity threat landscape facing organizations. Students apply various risk frameworks to provide structure to the decision-making needed to invest in resources for security controls and countermeasures. Multiple strategies are explored, including policies, procedures, training, strategic alliances, technologies, and methodologies, especially drawing upon risk management and financial decision-making that are used in other sectors of an organization. Topics include qualitative and quantitative risk analysis, audits, metrics, vulnerability assessment, capital budgeting, return on security investment, legal and regulatory compliance, and security best practices. While this course was created to train anyone interested in pursuing a career in cybersecurity, it will also prepare students to be successful in taking on leadership roles in assuring the security of an organization's operations.

(10 - weeks: starts 1/16/26)

D. HI200 History of the Black Pentecostal Church 7:00 pm - 9:30 pm - 3 credits

This course seeks to present the history of the African American Holiness Pentecostal church. This denomination is the youngest addition to Christendom and has been one of the most controversial and radical of the family. To understand where this denomination came from, as African Americans, we need to understand the history of the Black Church.

IV. Saturday

TH203 Principles of Leadership 9:00 am - 11:30 am - 3 credits

This course is intended to give students an overview of practical leadership principles and practices. Throughout the course of the semester we will discuss leadership development, the leader's inner life, leadership influence, and examine profiles of exemplary leaders. Students will also assess their own leadership strengths and evaluate potential leadership roles that best match their strengths.
