“A Month of Sundays”

As I meet people, a question that is almost always first is, “are you getting settled into Monmouth?” The answer is YES! Thank you! Thank you to those who have done so much to make us feel welcome, comfortable, and cared for! I appreciate those who have dropped by to say hello and bring us flowers, those who have worked hard painting, scrubbing, and doing other things to make the parsonage a great place for us to live and make many more memories as a family. Thanks to those who have sent cards, invited us for a meal, or friended me on Facebook. (I generally do not send out friend requests, but I do accept them—I don’t want anyone wondering why the pastor didn’t ask to “friend” them!) Thank you for everything you have done to welcome us to this church and to the community!

I want to get to know you better, and to do that, I am setting aside “a month of Sundays.” The Sundays in August, the 6th, 13th, 20th and 27th, from 6:30-8:00 p.m., I invite you to come out to Pattee Park (the shelter by the water pads) on East Broadway and 11th. In case of rain will meet at the church Atrium. I’ll bring lemonade and ice water. It will be open-house style, so come and go as you need to. I am hoping that not everyone comes the same night so that we can have informal conversations and I can learn about you as you learn about me. Together, we can share our dreams for the future of First UMC Monmouth!

Something important I want to share with you about myself is that GRACE is EVERYTHING to me! I was born and raised in the church. Frequently I have said, “I was Methodist born and Methodist bred, and when I die, I’ll be Methodist dead.” I really did not have any huge childhood struggles to speak of—at least none that I think of as out of the ordinary. I felt my call to ministry in high school and accepted my call to ministry my senior year. I knew what seminary I wanted to attend before I had chosen a college. I asked them what I should do to prepare myself, and they said, “study anything but religion” because too many who study religion in college come to seminary thinking they already know everything! That is why I studied French—a language that I loved. I also studied religion because four years was too long to set that on a shelf! In my junior year I studied in France for a semester. A very personal and very heart-breaking thing happened to me while I was there. I came back with a dark cloud hanging over me in many ways. But then, during Holy Week, my chaplain had a worship service on Maundy Thursday. It was a meal that was similar to that of what the disciples and Jesus would have eaten together. At the end of that meal, he held up the bread and the cup and spoke the words that Jesus had spoken, “this is my body, broken for you. This is my blood, poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins.” Then the bread and the cup were then passed from person to person around that table. As the bread and cup came closer to me, it was as if the chaplain and everyone else in that room completely disappeared. I felt the presence of Jesus telling me, “I did this for YOU. Don’t you dare hold onto the grief and shame you have right now.” And in that moment, my chains were broken. I was set free. It was amazing! I left that room a changed person. I had always been a Christian. I had already been called to ministry. But in that moment, Jesus became more real to me than ever before.

I learned for myself what GRACE is—the powerful, real, overwhelming, undeserved love of GOD! I learned that I was completely forgiven from any sin that I had ever committed or would ever commit in the future. I understand that to be forgiven much means to love much. I learned something about not judging others. We all get into messes in our lives. Sometimes we walk in knowingly, sometimes not. Either way, Jesus loves us and died to save us.

That experience changed me and continues to shape me every day. You cannot give what you do not have. You cannot offer what you have not received. So, I do not wish hardships on anyone. I do not believe that God SENDS us trials. But I believe that God can do miraculous things through the trials in our lives. I am not grateful for what happened in my life at that time, but I am grateful for what it taught me.

I cannot manufacture the experience of grace that I received. It was a special, powerful moment of the Spirit of God at work. But like the woman at the well, I can do nothing less than tell people about the Jesus who met me where I was, loved me for who I was, and released me from all guilt and shame in my life. If you have not experienced that grace—I pray you will! And I pray that I can help create opportunities for that to happen! Grace is everything!

We are continuing the study of the miracles of Jesus. We learned that Jesus' first miracle was turning water into wine. Jesus showed us that God cares about all our needs and how He is able to take something ordinary and turn it into something extraordinary for his glory.

Then we went on to learn about the great catch. Jesus showed us that we can accomplish so much more when we include God in everything we do. Peter learned that trust and obedience pays off.

Next, we moved on to the miracle of the paralytic. This man had determined friends. They couldn't get him into the house for Jesus to heal him because the crowds were so great. Licorice represents the cross where Jesus died for us. It is red because it represents the cross where His blood was shed for us.

Cheerios – Jesus said that He is the bread of life, whoever comes to him will never be hungry.

M&Ms – These colorful candies represent the many blessings we receive when we follow Jesus and trust Him every day of our life.
