Continued from Page 2 guide them to the perfect pastor, but to the one called to our church for this particular time in the church's mission. One thing I can promise you, whomever this church calls as its pastor, that person will not be perfect.

Christ called ordinary men and women and placed them into the extraordinary context of the Kingdom of God. Those whom Christ called disagreed with each other, and they often disagreed with Christ; but they also loved each other, and they learned how to

work together to make Christ known to the world.

I've noticed that this church, like all churches, has members who are passionate about different aspects of the church's mission; some are passionate about music; some are passionate about education; some are passionate about community mission, while others are passionate about the organizations to which they belong. I happen to be passionate about preaching, if you want to know. Those passions are wonderful – they are literally the engine of the church's journey.

However, let's always remember that there is "our" thing and then there is Christ's thing. The church belongs to Christ – not to us. While we have our passions, Christ's passion is that we continue to be the church, no matter our differences. We have to give Christ room for change, both in our hearts and in the life of the church. Being open to the leading of the Holy Spirit is what perfects the church – not perfect Christians, nor perfect pastors. Let us continue to pray for open hearts that will trust our Lord, even in the midst of change. ❖

If you ever have any doubts that you are special, important and possess unique talents that can be used in service to others, read Chapter 12 in 1 Corinthians. Paul makes it clear that we have all been given spiritual gifts and these individual gifts have been given "for the common good." Collectively, as uniquely gifted individuals, we form one body, the body of Christ. We exist in Christ and Christ exists in us.

Just as our own body cannot function well unless all our organs are healthy, so it is with the body of Christ. In order for us to carry out our function in the body of Christ, whatever that function may be, we must be spiritually healthy. While physical health is a blessing we all hope to enjoy, we need to remember that our gifts are spiritual and not necessarily dependent upon our physical health. What a comforting thought for those of us who aren't exactly the fit physical specimens we used to be! We must always remember that we are spiritual beings going through a physical experience.

When it comes to our spiritual gifts, there are four responsibilities we must recognize. First, we need to


look within and discover the specific gifts we have been given. If you have a difficult time with this, ask someone who knows you well. Others often have a much easier time identifying our assets than we do. Second, we need to develop these gifts. It can take time to learn how to become proficient

with our newly discovered talents. A spiritual teacher can often provide insight here. Third, we need to use our talents for their intended purpose, service to others. Since our gifts didn't come with an owner's manual, a mentor can help us learn how best to use our newly emerging skills.

The fourth responsibility is one we sometimes unconsciously neglect.

We must nurture and maintain our spiritual gifts. Just as a good diet (or the right medicine) is important to our body and as fresh oil is necessary for our car, so too our spiritual gifts also need to be nurtured and maintained.

Sometimes life gets in the way and we find ourselves stuck in a rut. For some reason our spiritual get-up-and-go, got-up-and-went. If you find yourself in this spot, consider spending some time with a Stephen Minister. We're good company, trained in confidentiality and reflective listening. Working together, with Christ's help, we may be able to help you get your spiritual train back on track.❖

We organized women's and children's clothes, shoes, etc. into labeled bins so that the residents could find them easily. It was heartbreaking to learn that some of the people staying

there had come with almost nothing other than the clothes on their back. I know that we all felt good about giving help to those who needed it so badly.

With a hard day's work behind us, we visited a turtle hospital and learned about the rescues of sea turtles and ended the day with go-carting. We met up with members of the local youth group for this event. We had also met them the previous night when they



Church (on Marathon Key), the youth group leader's wife, Chris, welcomed us warmly and showed us the beautiful floors on which we would be sleeping. All of us set to work immediately planning a meal to be delivered to a local abuse shelter. Then the group was off to the grocery store and we never stopped moving from there. The kitchen was alive the moment we came back and after a few burns, spills, and one melted plastic container, we had a presentable meal. The

provided us with a wonderful dinner. Their group is much smaller than our group back home, only five members compared to about twenty-five, but they were so kind and friendly. I have to say that meeting them was the true highlight of the trip. We raced for several hours and it was a really thrilling experience filled with cheering, laughter and Aaron occasionally attempting to beat us to victory, though he never succeeded (sorry Aaron).

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We had another social dinner with both youth groups to bring the perfect end to the night, except I believe the perfect end for some of us was getting to shower for the first time since arriving.

We had our last worship before Aaron had to leave the next morning, just as we had every night in Marathon. The whole group participated as there was

On our last day, we cleaned up and spent the rest of the afternoon relaxing together and playing card games until we packed the car and headed home. Confirmation

Confirmation for students in the 8th grade and up will begin with a parent and youth meeting on October 23rd at 7 p.m. (immediately following Youth Group). All interested 8th grade youth and up are invited to take part in our 2011 – 2012 Confirmation Class. Confirmation is quite literally the process of confirming or reaffirming one's baptism. Believing that there is nothing we can do to earn God's love, the Presbyterian Church baptizes both infants and adults, attesting to the belief that God loves each of us before we even know how to respond. Confirmation offers the opportunity to grow closer to God, learn

more about our faith and how to claim it as our own. While Confirmation builds upon the promises made by us or on our behalf (as in the case of infant baptism), baptism is not a requirement to take part in Confirmation Class. If you, or your son or daughter has not been baptized, I encourage you or them to be a part of this class, and then in the spring, when the Confirmation students are accepted into church membership as adults (if they feel led to make this commitment), they can be baptized at that time.

I look forward to this class. We will explore everything from what we believe about God and what it means to be a Christian (Sacraments, the Bible, mission, and much, much more), to the history of Christianity and what makes the Presbyterian Church unique. Confirmation Class will begin October 23rd and will be held almost every Sunday night from 7 to 7:45 p.m. after youth group (with the exception of holidays and other nights when there isn't a youth group meeting) through March 18th. 
