

3 Problems with The Pre-Tribulation Rapture View:
#1) It's a View.
#2) It the Mean/Meant Rule.
#3) It's a very doctrine.
So, does the Bible talk about a rapture?
1 Thessalonians 4:16-18 (NIV) "For the Lord himself will
from heaven, with a loud command, with the voice of the
archangel and with the trumpet call of God, and the dead in Christ will rise
first. After that, we who are still alive and are left will be
together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so
we will be with the Lord forever. Therefore encourage one another with
these words."

Revelation 21:1-4 (NIV) "Then I saw "a new heaven and a new earth," for
the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and there was no
longer any sea. I saw the Holy City, the new Jerusalem,
out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride beautifully
dressed for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying,
'Look! God's dwelling place is now among the people, and he will dwell
with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and
be their God. He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no
more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has
passed away.'"

TALK IT OVER

- **1.** What is the common perception of the term "rapture" in American pop-culture, and how does it differ from the biblical perspective in 1 Thessalonians 4:16-18?
- 2. How do the facts that the pre-tribulation rapture: a) Is only popular in the west (specifically among unpersecuted populations), b) ignores the mean-meant rule, I.e. it would make zero sense to John's original first-century audience, and c) is a new doctrine, unheard of before the early 19th Century--affect your perspective on this teaching?
- **3.** In your view, what is the significance of distinguishing between a pre-tribulation rapture and the event described in 1 Thessalonians 4:16-18 as happening "on that day"? How does this distinction affect our understanding of end-time events?
- **4.** How does the promise of Revelation 21:1-4, influence our perspective on the future and our relationship with Jesus Christ today?
