3 Truths about Jesus' Work as The Lamb of God
#1. Jesus was & is the of God's plan for atonement.
John 1:29b (NKJV) "Behold! The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world!"
1 Corinthians 5:7 (NKJV) "For indeed Christ, our Passover, was sacrificed for us."
#2. Jesus' sacrifice was the ultimate

Hebrews 10:10 & 14 (ESV) "We have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all... For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are being sanctified."

Romans 3:23–26 (NIV) "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, and all are justified freely by his grace through the redemption that came by Christ Jesus. God presented Christ as a sacrifice of atonement, through the shedding of his blood—to be received by faith... so as to be just and the one who justifies those who have faith in Jesus."

#3. When Jesus said, "_____ is finished!" He meant it.

John 19:30 (NIV) "It is finished."

TALK IT OVER

- 1. John the Baptist declared, "Behold! The Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world." Why is this declaration such a powerful turning point in the story of Scripture? How does understanding Jesus as "The Lamb of God" shape how we view both the Old Testament sacrifices and our own need for atonement today?
- **2.** Jesus' sacrifice was once for all—final and sufficient. In what ways do we still try to "earn" or "maintain" our salvation, even though Christ has finished the work? How can we practically live out of a posture of trust, rest, and gratitude rather than religious striving?
- **3.** When Jesus said, "It is finished," He meant it. What does it mean in your own life to truly believe that your guilt, shame, and sin were dealt with at the cross? Is there anything you're still striving to to earn that Christ has already finished?
