BECOMING REAL IN AN UNREAL WORLD!

Some might think the above title a bit odd for what we know as

the Ten Commandments. What does "becoming real" have to do with the Ten Commandments that God gave to Moses? The truth is, reality in God's economy is about becoming alive in all that matters.

We all remember that God spoke to Moses in a burning bush on a mountain top, face to face (Deuteronomy 5:4). It was from this encounter that God set in motion a plan to deliver His people out of Egypt and to give them a new path to travel; a new way to live and leverage love so that they will thrive and not just survive.

This Sunday (the 22nd), we begin a new tenweek preaching series on the Ten Commandments. Found in both Exodus 20:1-17 and Deuteronomy 5:6-21, they record the ground rules for God's governance of our lives. More importantly, they convey the path to aliveness and joy, health and fruitfulness that leads to contented satisfaction.

Through this series, we will see that God is much more than a "Thou-shalt-not" God. Our Father purposes life, wholeness, favor and blessing for each and every one of us. Since Jesus said he came to "fulfill the law" (Matthew 5:17), then we should expect to see Jesus clearly at work in these expectant laws of the Father. How did Jesus model these laws for us? What might he say to us today regarding their relevance in our lives?

As we journey through our lives, and through the ages, we will one day look back on these guiding principles to see how we responded to them and how they shaped our lives. John the Apostle, in his Revelation from Heaven, said: "Here is the patience of the saints; here are those who keep the commandments of God and the faith of Jesus" (Revelation 14:12).

Commandment keeping is a huge part of Jesus' understanding of our love and devotion to him. "If you love me, you will keep my commandments" (John 14:15). Some have humorously noted that the bible calls these spiritual principles for action the "Ten Commandments" and not the "Ten Suggestions." God is not calling us to live a cafeteria and buffet approach to our spiritual

lives. This is not a pick-and-choose approach to living the life that we want. Former U.S. President Ronald Reagan once said, "I have wondered at times what the Ten Commandments would have looked like if Moses had run them through the US Congress."

I look forward to this special journey with you in the coming months and will seek to discover, along with you, our chosen path for a victorious and life-giving journey into God's great kingdom!

Last Thursday and Friday I had the opportunity to attend the Orange Conference Tour in Everett with Nicole Rogers and Ben Harrison. Orange is an organization that partners with

churches to provide resources and curriculum to help kids and teenagers experience God, while also engaging well with parents. As the above graphic shows, they believe two combined influences make a greater impact than just two individual influences. The Church (light/yellow) + Home (love/red) = Orange

While this topic obviously relates to my job, I felt the information can also be very helpful to all adults in our congregation. Whether you are involved with our youth and kids through Sunday School, Wednesday nights, Partners in Mission, just in passing on Sunday mornings, or not really at all, the reality is that you and they are both part of this church, and it's important for you to know how best to engage with them.

The main part of the conference was Friday, but we went on Thursday and attended the add-on sessions Lead Small and Parents Cue Live. Ben and I attended Lead Small, where we heard about the importance of being authentic, smart, and honest. Gen Z (born between the late 90s and early 2010s) – which is all of our youth and many of our children have little tolerance for anything that is fake. They want the adults in their lives (including the adults in their church) to be real with them. Now, just because we have knowledge doesn't mean we have to share it all at one time. That's where being smart comes in. Asking ourselves, "how is this helpful for them right now?" can help us find the balance between sharing too little and too much. As for being honest, that seems like a no-brainer. But the speaker, Mike Clear, focused specifically on us as adults being honest about our need for community. A phrase they repeated several times throughout the conference was, "seen people see people." We need to be seen in order for us to see others.

Friday's portion of the conference included several full group sessions as well as two breakout sessions. It's hard to relay all the valuable information that we took in (I have nine full pages of notes!), but I'll try to pass along some key highlights. The overall theme for the conference was "It's Personal". Personal is the opposite of shallow. Speaker Kristen Ivy said, "if you get personal, it will change the way you respond to this [next] generation." In order to get personal with our kids and teens, we need to be able to answer yes to these five questions.

Do you know my name? This is the (pretty obvious) first step to starting a relationship with someone. Know their name, and let them know you know their name by engaging in conversation with them.

Do you know what matters to me? Do you know what they like and enjoy, what makes them laugh, or what they fear? When you know what kids and teens like, they know they are worth liking.

Do you know where I live? Kids need to know there is someone who knows where they live, so that they know there is someone who can show up for them. Not only is it important for adults in their lives to know where they physically live, but where are they living emotionally? When we know that, we can know when they are in trouble. Do you know what I've done? We all make mistakes and we all experience shame. But shame is a shallow motivator. Love is a powerful motivator. Jesus understood that if you know what someone's done and you love them anyway, you'll buy into their life. The story of Zacchaeus was used as an example. Jesus knew what kind of person Zacchaeus had been and was known for, but he still told Zacchaeus to come out of the tree and invited himself to Zacchaeus'

Do you know what I can do? This is where we call out people's potential. Jesus saw Zacchaeus' potential. He also saw Peter's. Jesus knew Peter was a fisherman but told him he'd now be fishing for men. Speaker Gerald Fadayomi asked, "what if we spent less time trying to get students to come to our church and more time training volunteers to show up for them at concerts, sports, and more?" When we show up for them, we can speak their potential and call them to more.

Now here's the part where I call *you* to more. Ben and I aim to get personal with each of our youth, and Nicole, as a parent and Sunday School teacher, also builds relationships with our young people. But this should go beyond us and the other volunteer teachers. I am inviting *each and every one of you* to also engage in a meaningful relationship with a young person in our church. It can be scary getting started, but I promise you it will grow to something life-giving. If you don't know where to start, come find me, and we can start together.
