# <u>The Light to the Nations</u> 12.17.17 (Mark 7:24-8:10)

The purpose of Jesus' one and only excursion into Gentile territory was to reprogram His disciples and get them on board with God's global purpose to redeem a people from every tribe, and nation, and to gather them into one body, the church.

### A Father of Many Nations

Should the disciples have recognized God's global purpose? Yes, and no.

- No, because Paul calls the Gentile inclusion into the covenant people a mystery (Eph. 3:4-6), meaning that it was not fully known in ages past.
- Yes, because the Old Testament is full of glimpses into this mystery:
  - Abraham is called the father of many nations (Gen. 12:1-3).
  - The psalmist spoke of the nations being glad in God (Ps. 67:1-5).
  - Isaiah spoke of the coming Messiah as a light to the nations (Isa. 49:6).

#### **God's Salvation** Extends to the Gentiles

Jesus' encounter with the Syrophoenician woman taught the disciples two truths:

- God's mercy is not limited in its quantity. There is plenty for all who hunger both Jew and Gentile.
- God's mercy must be received by faith. Salvation depends not on whether you are a child (Jew) or dog (Gentile), but in whether you partake of it in true faith.

## God's Compassion Extends to the Gentiles

The point of Jesus' healing of the deaf and mute man is that God is not grudging in His mercy. Notice four components of this healing:

- It is private
- It is intimate
- It is compassionate
- It is immediate

#### God's Revelation Extends to the Gentiles

Just as in the feeding of the five thousand Jews (6:30-44), the feeding of the four thousand Gentiles displays that the Gentiles, too, need the bread of life – the word of God – and that God intends to feed it to them.
