

#### A Refuge for the Besieged

My heart was touched to watch a video of Christians and Jews from Ukraine reading Psalm 31 as a prayer for God to provide refuge for this beleaguered people. Why Psalm 31? Perhaps it's because of verse 21: "Praise be to the Lord, for he showed me the wonders of his love when I was in a city under siege." In Ukraine, thousands of people are literally living in cities under siege, gathered in shelters and basements. If you look up the word "siege" in the dictionary you'll find something like this:

"The act or process of surrounding and attacking a fortified place in such a way as to isolate it from help and supplies, for the purpose of lessening the resistance of the defenders and making capture possible."

Yes, that is what's happening in Ukraine. But as people call out to the Lord, with the psalmist they believe that the Lord "hears their cry for mercy when we call for help" (in the words of verse 22). We believe that God is responding in ways beyond the limits of human agency, working supernaturally to provide relief, protection, and comfort for those in need. The Lord hears their cry and responds. Yet it is at this level of listening where something amazing happens. God tunes our ears to the frequency of their cry for help. God's mercy activates our hearts, and we respond. Sieges are meant to isolate, but God bridges the isolation with relationships.

Our session is inviting our congregation to open our hearts to the plight of Ukrainians under siege and on the run as refugees. As we consider our personal response, God's mercy will open our eyes to recognize the needs around us, and we'll notice people in our community living under the siege of homelessness and poverty. What can we do? Answering that question is what the **Poverty 101** workshop is all about, a program developed by Everett Gospel Mission coming to North Creek in June (but open to registration now).

Truth is, God is a refuge for all who are under siege – whether the setting is war, poverty, grief, illness, or depression. And God often starts providing refuge by bridging the isolation through relationships. Who would have thought that God could show the wonders of His love even in times of desolation? And yet isn't that the gospel message, the Holy Week story of Jesus' suffering and death that after three desolate days gives way to joy unspeakable and hope eternal? So, if you find yourself under siege, in the final words of Psalm 31, "Be strong and take heart, all you who hope in the Lord."



As we gathered for the monthly Session meeting last week, we had before us several matters for discernment, discussion, and decision that impact not just our church community, but our impact on the world as well.

### **Ukraine: How to Help?**

Noting a considerable amount of concern and compassion for the people of Ukraine, we talked about what we could do to help. Already, the Mission Strategy Team (MST) and others have been gathering to discuss and pray for the people of Ukraine, and trying to find the best way to help. The MST is looking into partnering with our Presbytery to coordinate next level support. The Fellowship team is planning a fundraiser concert for May to raise money to support the people of Ukraine. We pray regularly for the people of Ukraine, and will continue to do so. With guidance from the MST and others, Session will be preparing information for the congregation on how to help. Look for that on April 3<sup>rd</sup>.

### **Staffing Needs**

We also discussed our current staffing needs and our plans for hiring people God is calling to fill our positions. The Administrative Task Force has completed the job description for the Administrative Manager, and will be posting that live this week. We are also discussing recruiting for the position and look to you, the congregation, to communicate with us if God is nudging you or someone you know toward this opportunity. Further staffing position descriptions are in the works and will be finalized and posted as well.


### **Ministry Vision**



# Register Now for "Poverty 101"!

The church is offering a free class called 'Poverty 101" in conjunction with the Everett Gospel Mission. The class will be held at the church on Saturday, June 25, 2022 from 9:00 to 2:30. Lunch is included!

Poverty 101 is an interactive series of exercises and learning experiences that helps our community better understand the unique challenges of long-term poverty and to assist individuals to better understand her/his own thinking about poverty and those experiencing poverty. It is designed to provide tools that will help



each of us and our organization find the best way to engage with and come alongside people who are affected by poverty.

#### In completing Poverty 101 you will:

- Increase your self-awareness of life history and how that impacts your understanding of those experiencing poverty.
- Explore differences of socio-economic cultures.
- Understand different kinds of poverty generational poverty, working class poverty, situational
  poverty, immigrant poverty, and depression era poverty and how each kind of poverty
  differently impacts one's views of self, God, and the world around us.
- Learn about communication/perception differences and how they impact healthy interactions with those experiencing poverty.
- Consider how systems might create barriers to change.
- Learn how your church or organization/agency and you can be more effective in ministry to those affected by poverty and homelessness. It is relational not transactional.
- Learn the difference between effective charity and toxic charity.
- Discover how ministry/service to those affected by poverty homelessness can increase your church/agency's outreach and your appeal to your community while strengthening your church/ agency's family.
- Understand that we all share a "marred identity", that is, from original sin and personal sin, and how understanding this allows us to humbly walk together, assisting each other in our life's journey and walk with God.

This will be a great opportunity for our congregation to come together around how to be a good neighbor to those who are experiencing poverty in our community. 

# **Be Our Guest!**

Forrest and I love to entertain. We love times when we can have people over to share a meal, usually with some meat cooked on the Traeger, with drinks, appetizers, desserts. #### From Gary Bannister:

Before I began teaching (1963), I was in a church that taught about the grace of God but encouraged a life of "don't do this" and "don't do that." It was not until a friend of mine who had become a Christian through Young Life asked me to help him start a new club at South Kitsap High School that I learned what the grace of God was in practice and in my heart instead of just in my head. Where one of the "don't do this" was dancing, I found myself as a chaperone at a high school dance. When I was listening to teen-agers talking about Jesus there on the sidelines, my concept of grace began to change dramatically.

My experience with my young friends in Bible studies and camp experiences at Malibu continued to expand my appreciation of the relational strengths of the grace of God. I continue to be thankful for these young friends.


