When she and Walt got married, it was made very clear that travel would be part of their marriage. That became a true reality. They traveled all over the world. They traveled with many tour groups as well as on their own. Besides traveling for their own enjoyment, they also purchased a motor home and traveled throughout the U.S. They took our brother Bob and sister Erma Jean on some of these trips. Early in their marriage they took our mother on a couple of smaller trips.

Alta had a good sense of humor. When she and Walt got engaged and were choosing a wedding date, Alta gave Walt a couple of suggestions. One of the suggestions was January 22. He fortunately chose that one. She chuckled about it afterwards, as this is also her birthday. She figured if their anniversary and her birthday were on the same day, he might be able to remember them. She loved fun and laughter.

Alta was very thrifty but also very generous. While living in California, she collected pop cans and bottles while walking and turned them in for recycling. California paid a few cents for each can or bottle. Over the years, she collected enough to save \$25,000. She gave this money to some young people for their college education.

When illness took over her life, one thing was truly embedded, her love for Jesus. When she couldn't communicate well in other ways, she would often sing a hymn or pray.
