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REPORT FROM PASTOR KURT HELMCKE

It has been an honor to serve as your senior pastor in 2025. In our Presbyterian tradition, the calling to the pastoral vocation is often called the Ministry of Word and Sacrament. At the heart of the work of a pastor is God's word, and I continue to enjoy preparing sermons and preaching them, seeking to lift up God's promises and purposes for our lives. This year my preaching ministry extended into the new satellite worship service on Sunday evenings at the Quail Park Senior Living Community. I treasure the opportunity to serve the Lord at His table as we participate in the sacrament of communion, grateful for the many servants who make this possible both in our sanctuary and in the homes of those unable to join us. I consider it a great privilege to administer the sacrament of baptism, where we celebrate and claim by faith the covenant promises of Jesus. Our worship services are the result of a collaboration of many dedicated, talented, and creative servants, and it is a joy to witness what the Holy Spirit brings to life through their faithful efforts. One worship highlight of 2025 was the day we hosted the meeting of the Northwest Coast Presbytery, where we provided an uplifting worship service as well as the warm hospitality of a dinner for all the delegates.

Some worship services are practical extensions of love and care to the congregation and community. Memorial services function in this way, and we hosted several of them this past year. There is something deeply sacred about these gatherings, where we are reminded of both God's comfort in the midst of our grief and the promises of eternal life in Christ. The reception provides us the opportunity to express the love of Jesus, and a great many of us participate in this ministry of hospitality. I continue to appreciate the pastoral care moments I have with congregation members and friends as I partner with our Deacons and Stephen Ministers to share the love and care of Christ. Weddings are also worship services that are an expression of the care of the congregation, and I was honored to officiate at several among our church family this past year.

Closely connected with the Ministry of the Word is teaching the Bible and guiding others along the path of discipleship. One of my highlights of 2025 was collaborating with fellow teachers in leading the congregation through Healthy Boundaries training. While issues such as sexual harassment are challenging, I was impressed by the willingness of the congregation to participate in this training that will help us extend God's love to others in healthy ways. Another teaching highlight was the Practicing the Way dinner study on Sunday evenings in the spring, where many gathered around a meal and mutual encouragement toward faithful apprenticeship to Jesus. In another instance of pastoral teaching, last year brought the launch of the Biblical Travel Tour to Greece I will be leading in the coming year with two dozen members of the church. My teaching ministry also extended in a youthful direction through the Confirmation Class, Summer Bible Camp, and more personal involvement in youth ministry in the fall as we responded to the gift of growing numbers of Middle Schoolers in our midst!

The word "pastor" is related to "pasture," as in being a shepherd of God's flock. This involves activities of discernment, guidance, and spiritual leadership. I am grateful for another year of serving with our session elders in the ministry of church governance. I also had the privilege of moderating the session of Friday Harbor Presbyterian Church for three months while their pastor was on sabbatical. Starting with our session retreat in February, we launched a five-year strategic project to pursue our church's vision of reaching young families in our community. It is called Project 50 – our goal is to have 50% of our membership under the age of 50 by the time our congregation turns 50 in 2031. We started by hosting several public forums in June, then having our ministry team leaders read the book *Future Focused Church*. From the "Café Conversations" we had throughout the summer we're in the process of forming a Transformation Team that will continue guiding us toward this goal. Stay tuned for more information and look forward to finding your part in this grand adventure! If you want a snapshot of what it looks like for our congregation to be engaging the families of our community, there's no better view than September's annual Back to School BBQ – another amazing event!

I enjoyed leading the church staff, encouraging and equipping them to use their gifts for God's glory. We are truly blessed by the contributions of Brian Armes, Kris Green, Jim Kwon, Johnson Pham, Kcristell Peña, Kate West, and Kristi Wiant. Chris Chang began the year as our Associate Pastor and served the congregation well. His new counseling practice grew so much that he wasn't able to continue serving in his pastoral role, departing mid-year. Around this time God brought us Isaiah Esterline as Family Ministry Assistant, and he has been so important to the revival of our youth ministry this fall. And last but not least, Tiegan Anderson brought skills honed on the mission field to help us with our website and social media during the summer.

REPORT FROM PASTOR KURT HELMCKE

Looking ahead to 2026, I envision discovering more of the eternal treasures of God's word through preaching and teaching and continuing to provide pastoral care alongside the many who serve in ministries of compassion. I hope that we will be able to take the next faithful steps in following Jesus as we pursue the vision for our church that He revealed to us through our congregational mission study not long ago, which means a firm foundation for beginning to build "Project 50." Together, we will continue to cultivate a thriving community of faithful Christ-followers who grow deep spiritual roots in a life-giving relationship with Jesus, extend God's love by serving others with Christlike compassion, and share Christ's hope by making him known near and far.

2026 Pastoral Sabbatical

In the upcoming year, Pastor Kurt will take a three-month sabbatical for rest, renewal, and study from June 1 – August 31, 2026. During this time the session will provide for the pastoral and leadership needs of the congregation, arranging to fill the pulpit each Sunday, providing for a session moderator, and calling our caregiving ministries to share the load. The hope is to employ Rev. Scott Anthony, a regular summer pastoral vacation replacement in recent years, for at least two months this summer.

Pastoral sabbaticals are a benefit required by the Northwest Coast Presbytery in minimum terms of call for installed pastors: *"A sabbatical during the seventh year of service, unless otherwise arranged by the pastor. Subsequent sabbaticals occur every seventh year of the call. The sabbatical term shall be at least three months in one continuous period or in shorter leave periods, as determined by the pastor..."*

North Creek had a strong tradition of pastoral sabbaticals every seventh year prior to 2010, when the most recent sabbatical was taken. It has been 19 years since Pastor Kurt took a sabbatical (as an Associate Pastor in 2007), and his sabbatical in 2026 will bring North Creek into compliance with presbytery requirements.

REPORT FROM OUR CLERK OF SESSION

CLERK OF SESSION REPORT

With the completion of our visioning phase in 2024, where we developed our mission statement and the vision behind it, and with the completion of our pastoral search and installation, Session was ready to hit the ground running in 2025. Part of Session's role is to manage the facility, personnel, finances, ministry support, and polity questions, much of which is done at our monthly Session meetings. At the beginning of 2025, we were also excited to put legs to our vision and continue to prayerfully develop the dream.

During 2025, Pastor Kurt led our Session and Ministry Team Leaders through a study of the book *Future Focused Church*, which led to strategic sessions where we began envisioning and planning for what we are calling Project 50, focusing on new ministries and growth over the next five years. Stay tuned as the plans are developing!

The leadership also engaged in Healthy Boundaries training in 2025, promoting healthy boundaries for our congregation. Session members and ministry leaders attended a workshop to learn together how we can best bless one another with healthy behaviors and boundaries.

Part of the role of Clerk of Session is record keeping, particularly membership records. I am happy to report that during 2025, North Creek welcomed 15 new members, including 5 teens through our confirmation class. Each of these new members enriches our congregation and blesses us as their involvement grows in our faith community. Sadly, we also lost six of our members as they moved on toward their heavenly homecoming. We miss and thank God for each of them.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

Strategy

Our five-year strategic plan with a primary goal of congregational development

Project 50: By the end of the year 2031, when our congregation turns 50, North Creek will have as many active participants under the age of 50 as we have over the age of 50.

Currently, approximately 75% of our active participants are over the age of 50. Project 50 calls us to develop and support ministry initiatives that lead to a significant infusion into our congregational life of adults under 50, along with children and youth.

This goal helps us to make progress toward the strongest hope revealed by our 2023 congregational mission study: To strengthen an ongoing outreach to children, youth, and parents in our community that restores a significant presence of younger generations in our church membership.

We will continue to nurture a vital congregational life for all and enthusiastically receive new members regardless of age. Project 50 simply invites all North Creek members to support sustained efforts that help us reach our younger neighbors in the community.

In September 2025 we hosted our second annual **Back-to-School BBQ** for families in the community. While this popular event is only the beginning, it prepares the way for Project 50 in that it involves a wide range of North Creek members in an effort that creates connections with significant numbers of younger adults, children, and youth in our local community.

Moving Forward

The Session is in the process of putting together a team to serve as a spiritual catalyst for renovating church ministry activities and resources toward our Project 50 goal, guided by the book *Future Focused Church* (Baker, 2025). The definition of a future focused church aligns well with NCPC's mission, vision, and values: "a group of Jesus followers who seek God's direction together—especially in relationally discipling young people, modeling kingdom diversity, and tangibly loving our neighbors."

The Transformation Team will assist the congregation in prioritizing and empathizing with people younger than the average age of our congregation, modeling the ethnic and cultural diversity of God's kingdom, and discovering ways to tangibly love our neighbors.

Purpose of this ministry

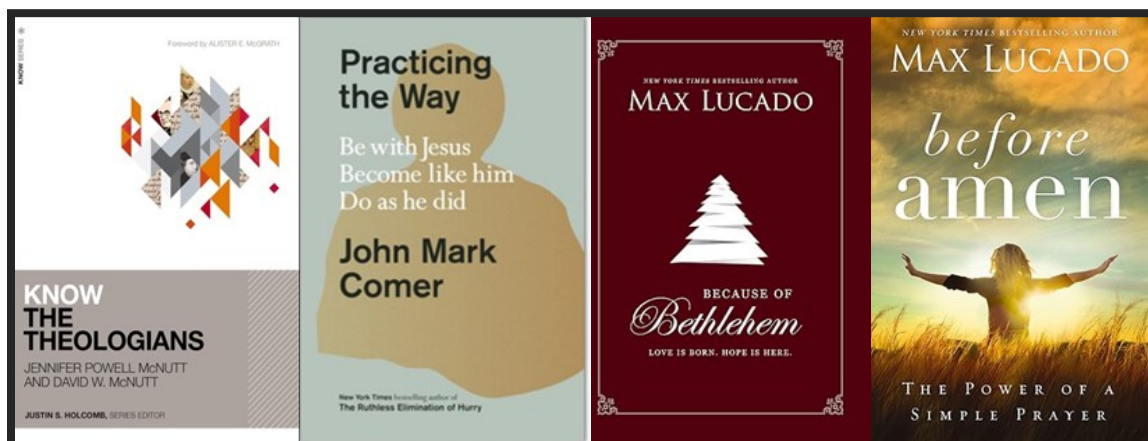

Highlights from 2025:

Our long time chair, Joan Eble, has retired from the service of small group care. We are all very grateful for her and her team's dedication to continuing and supporting small groups over the last several years.

Dave Berkompas has assumed the responsibility of small group coordinator as of this past October. He has assembled an advisory team, listed above, to advise on any major decisions or initiatives that may be undertaken and provide suggestions and encouragement.

Goals for 2026:

To increase the number of small groups in 2026, with possible emphasis during the season of Lent.

To increase small group information and support online, including suggested study materials, training information for leaders and new small group formation and procedures. This will be completed in the months after the updated church website is introduced.

To communicate quarterly with existing small groups and advise them of any new information or suggestions for improvement.

WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY

Purpose of this ministry:

To provide women an opportunity to increase their understanding and appreciation of scripture, deepen their relationship with God and build stronger relationships with other women of faith.

Typical Class Activities:

- Open in Prayer
- Sing hymns or other praise songs
- Study the Bible with the help of various study guides, breaking into small group discussions as necessary. Study sessions are typically 6-12 weeks in length. Attendance for full study session is encouraged but not required.
- Sharing of personal praises and petitions and praying together as a group
- Zoom participation is available whenever possible

Yearly Overview:

- We meet almost every Tuesday morning at 10am- 12 noon with the exception of holiday weeks and snow-days.
- Occasional speakers are invited to share in-depth information or updates on mission work that we support.
- We also enjoy more informal fellowship two or three times a year including our Christmas potluck and a summer picnic.

All are always welcome, including community members seeking Bible-based study.

Highlights from 2025:

- To start off 2025, we viewed a video series and studied relevant Bible Passages from The Rock, The Road and The Rabbi.
- Our Spring session was spent studying the entire Book of Revelation aided by N.T. Wright's study materials.
- Our summer schedule was more relaxed, continuing to view the TV series The Chosen (Season 3) while studying relevant Bible stories and Judean history. We also had a short review of recent biblical archaeological discoveries presented online by Joel Kramer.
- Our Fall Study was another video series and Bible Study called Vanishing Grace by Philip Yancy.
- During December we studied selected chapters from "Praise God: Worship Through the Year", published by Presbyterian Women. This study added to our understanding of the roles that our Presbyterian church calendar, the Lectionary and our treasured holiday symbols play in our worship during the Christmas season.

Purpose of this Ministry:

To connect our older adults to provide fellowship on a monthly basis during daylight hours; an opportunity to visit, deepen relationships and attend structured events, programs, and outings together.

Highlights from 2025:

- Joyful Life (Older Adult Ministries) in 2025 had the privilege of representing our congregants, who are a bit older than middle age.
- We met at least once a month as a team and planned months out in the future for our occasions.
- Joyful Life sponsored some Fellowship times, just for folks to meet during the week for conversation over lunch and to learn more about each other. For instance, we met at Kay Nickel's for fellowship and lunch; we met at the Dimmicks for Fellowship and lunch; and then we met at the Sundins for lunch and a most informative lesson given by Ken Sundin about some of his historic large maritime art collection.
- Our Field Trips included visits to the Schack Art Museum in Everett to enjoy the well-presented exhibits, and then on to lunch at Sisters. In 2025 we also went to the Cascadia Art Museum in Edmonds to see and be informed by a terrific docent about their new exhibit with two artists represented, and then enjoyed lunch fellowship following. We also traveled to Japanese Garden at Washington Park Arboretum with lunch following too. Anyone was welcome on these field trips.
- To pay attention to the request from the Session and our minister to represent our ministry in various other areas, Joyful Life also contributed to the Families Advent Service project of December care bags for those unhoused neighbors. We made every effort to reach across to other ministries and help or include others in our occasions and events.

Hopes for 2026

- Continue to offer and host information sharing and fellowship opportunities for seniors and any-age individuals who are interested in our events.
- Provide new programs on topics especially pertaining to seniors.
- Continue to partner and work with other ministry teams on intergenerational projects.

FAMILY MINISTRY

Purpose of This Ministry:

NCPC's Mission Statement (concise version) is "Growing Deep in the Life of Jesus, Extending God's Love, Sharing the Hope of the Gospel." To further this mission, Family Ministry's goal is to serve families, both NCPC members and families in our greater community, by teaching and discipling children and youth so that they may grow in their knowledge of a loving God, develop a personal life-giving relationship with Jesus Christ, and become part of a like-minded faith community. This ministry spans many areas:

- Supporting parents in the nurturing of faith in their children and youth.
- Providing a safe and fun nursery for pre-kindergarten children while their families participate in the life of NCPC.
- Offering an engaging Sunday school program for kindergarten through 5th grade.
- Providing a welcoming and fun opportunity for middle school and high school students to build a personal relationship with Jesus Christ.
- Organizing events such as Summer Bible Camp, Back-To-School BBQ, and Advent Service Project care bags.

2025 Highlights:

Whirlyball: In January 2025 the youth and their families played whirly ball at a specialized venue in Lynnwood. This is a combination of old-fashioned bumper cars, basketball, and lacrosse. Everyone had a wild and fun time.

Sticky Faith book discussion: In spring of 2025 the parents of children and youth finished a study of the book *Sticky Faith* by Kara E. Powell and Chap Clark. The focus was research and resources that families and churches can utilize to plant seeds of faith in kids that will "stick" with them into their college years and beyond.

Sunday school: This fall Sunday school continued with the *Biggest Story* curriculum from Crossway Publishing. The curriculum has 104 lessons which follow the story line of the Bible, going through the Old Testament and then through the New Testament. It is engaging for the students and a good guide for the teachers. The curriculum uses eye-catching artwork; examples can be seen in the hallway by the classrooms.

Nursery: The Family Ministry provided a safe and fun nursery for pre-kindergarten children while their families attended worship services. The attendance increased in 2025 with occasionally up to nine kids.

Confirmation: In March 2025, five youth were confirmed. They led the worship service for their confirmation.

Graduation celebration: Two NCPC youth, Ian Stansberry and Hailey Summe, who were graduating from high school, were celebrated in June 2025.

Artwork in hallway: The Sunday school curriculum we use contains artwork by Don Clark who has a studio in Seattle. This artwork, one picture for each lesson, along with pictures of NCPC kids were put up in the hallway by the classrooms.

Summer Bible Camp: In July 2025, 55 kids attended the camp, many of whom were not from NCPC member families. There were 35 volunteers from NCPC, of which 13 were youth, that made this camp a success. The camp theme was "The Lord your God is with you wherever you go" (Joshua 1:9). The week-long camp included music, Bible lessons, games, science, and crafts.

BBQ at Dill's: The children and youth had an end-of-summer BBQ with smash burgers and yard games at Mary and Forrest Dill's backyard.

FAMILY MINISTRY – CONTINUED

Back-to-School BBQ: In September 2025 the Family Ministry Team participated in this community outreach event. It was an “all NCPC hands on deck” event and was a big success. At the BBQ there was live music, a bouncy house, a bouncy slide, crafts for kids, and of course lots of food and ice cream.

Family Ministry Administrative Assistant: In September NCPC hired an Administrative Assistant, Isaiah Esterline, to support and help with all of the wide-ranging activities the Family Ministry Team does.

Family Insider: A weekly family news email, *Family Insider*, was started this fall to make announcements and keep families informed about youth and children’s events at NCPC.

Lights out game night: The Youth had a well-attended game night in November. All the lights in the church building were turned off and the fun and games ensued.

Family Advent service project: In early December 2025 over 120 care bags containing food, winter socks, winter gloves, warm hats, toothbrushes and toothpaste, and bottles of water were assembled. The bags were handed out to the whole congregation to give to unhoused individuals we may encounter.

Hopes for 2026:

Discipleship for youth: This winter Pastor Kurt and the Family Ministry Team plan on including faith and discipleship building along with fun youth events.

Volunteers: Additional Sunday school teachers and nursery workers are needed to continue providing a safe and quality learning environment for our children.

Purpose of this ministry:

Every Sunday, something sacred happens when we gather to worship—and our team works behind the scenes (and sometimes right up front) to make those moments feel alive, authentic, and welcoming to everyone.

From planning sermon series, designing visual elements, managing sound and livestreaming, we help to make sure worship connects whether you're in the sanctuary or watching from home. Our team brings together musicians, tech experts, artists, speakers, and creative thinkers who all share one goal: helping our community encounter God in powerful, personal ways.

From the songs we sing, to the images on the screen, to the light pole banners outside that say "you belong here", we're creating space for worship that reflects who we are: a church growing in Christ, extending love, and sharing hope.

W&A Highlights of 2025

- Quail Park, an assisted living facility in Lynnwood, now has weekly worship. What started as a vision became reality in January when residents began gathering for their own service. The Mission Strategy Team, Worship and Arts, and generous donors all said yes to this opportunity—proof that when we follow Jesus, we go where people are.
- Every Communion Sunday, we now publicly commission the deacons who carry communion to members who can't make it to the sanctuary. It's a small moment that says: you matter, and so does this ministry.
- Lent took us into the shadows with Jesus. Our "Prayers in the Dark" series was raw and real, with chancel décor featuring the proverbial rock where Jesus poured out his hardest prayers. We didn't shy away from the struggle—we sat in it together.
- Palm Sunday reached beyond our walls. We made sure our homebound members could wave palms right along with us by delivering branches to their doors. Distance doesn't mean disconnection.
- We made it easier to reach out. New cards in the pews now give you a simple way to connect with us or share a prayer request. Sometimes the smallest invitation opens the biggest doors.

Media Report for 2025

The NCPC Media Ministry has been busy this year. It's hard to believe that we've been live-streaming our services for almost 5 years now. There are some weeks when it feels like we really know what we're doing and everything runs perfectly and then there are the weeks when it feels like it's the first time and we still don't quite know what we're doing. But, with a faithful group of volunteers, we're honored to be able to share our worship services with you each week. Special thanks to Liz Marshall, Linda Roundhill and Schy for all of the hours that they put in to make this happen.

On the other end of things, we continue to try and bring a high-quality audio and visual experience with our worship services. We have added some new equipment and we had Isaiah Esterline work with us for part of the year and his help was critical for the Choir Christmas Concert. Thanks to Dick McGrath, Neil Pedersen and Isaiah Esterline for helping out throughout the year.

Moving into 2026, we are looking at updating the lighting system in the sanctuary to not only be more energy efficient, but also allow for more creativity and flexibility in how we light the service.

As always, my best weeks are the ones when no one really knows that I'm there...it means that the service went off without a readily noticeable mistake. But, I'm grateful for those of you who do stop by before or after the service and share a word of encouragement.

Purpose of this ministry

The Music Ministry is a sub-ministry of the Worship & Arts team. Its focus and purpose is to plan and create music that supports our worship and arts ministry. While the “team” is noted to have only 4 members, the program is actively supported by **nearly 50 volunteers** who bring their vocal and instrumental skill sets weekly to our congregation and community. This is done by way of our adult choir, our rotating weekly Sunday music teams, and special music.

Highlights from 2025:

The Music Ministry of North Creek Presbyterian Church rejoiced at number of new musicians joining the choir and worship band throughout 2025; however, in January, **Kayla and Harrison King**, members of the choir and worship band, departed with blessings for Nashville, TN where Harrison pursues music producing at Blackbird Studios.



A **new pipe-organ emulator** was introduced into NCPC’s instrument set in February. NCPC’s new “pipe organ” operates through an app from the Jeux d’orgues project, emulations of French pipe organs. The app communicates with a keyboard via Bluetooth. Later in the year, the organ “grew” from a 10-stop console to a 26-stop console, exponentially increasing the combinations of instrument sounds.

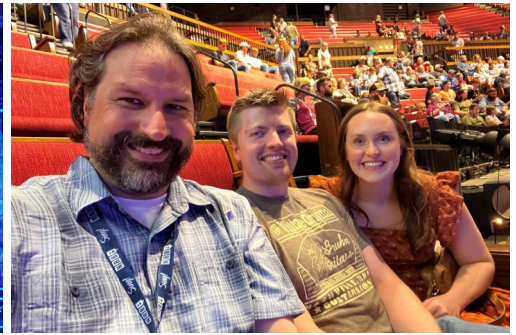
Spring was a season of collaborations. For Good Friday, the NCPC choir presented a service of thematic choral selections focusing on God’s LOVE for us. Joining the choir were members of the **Revival Dance Team from Reflections School of Dance** in Mill Creek who added movement to two of the choir selections. Easter worship celebrations included a brass quintet from **Inglemoor High School**. The Music Ministry also led worship music at the **Northwest Coast Presbytery** annual in-person meeting on May 15.



Summer worship introduced NCPC to **Anna Eby** and **Isaiah Esterline**, recent graduates of Northwest University who started attending NCPC earlier in 2025. Anna and Isaiah joined in the music ministry life at NCPC playing a variety of instruments including bass, drums, keyboards, flute, and vocals. Isaiah also served on the NCPC staff as a Worship and Media AV Tech summer intern. He provided invaluable assistance in enhancing the Music Ministry technology, instrument upgrades, and notation software data entry. NCPC also joined Voice of the Martyrs and Getty Music in recognizing **The Day of the Christian Martyr** on June 29 by singing “Christus Victor” as part of our worship service, in unity with churches around the world.

The Music Ministry again partnered with Family Ministries to lead music **during Summer Bible Camp**. Many members of the regular worship band taught the campers SBC songs and songs used in regular worship at NCPC.

In September, Brian attended the **Sing! Conference** in Nashville. This Getty Music event provides opportunities for resourcing, networking, and worshiping, bearing immediate and on-going influence on the ensembles and worship at NCPC. This year's conference centered around the release of *The Sing! Hymnal* published by Getty Music and Crossway. This volume collects hundreds of songs from church history and the modern hymn writing movement and was immediately implemented in the worship at NCPC. He was also able to visit with the Kings and learn about God's work in their new home.



The NCPC Choir's October Workshop emphasized preparations for the Christmas Concert, *Great Joy* as well as a session to try on our **new choir robes**. These new to us robes were a gift from First Presbyterian Church of Snohomish (thanks to Kate West) and made their NCPC debut during Advent.



In December the choir presented their **annual Christmas Concert** with orchestra at NCPC and an abridged version at Quail Park Senior Living. This year's concert was titled *Great Joy* and featured familiar carols and Christmas songs, along with scripture readings telling the Christmas Story. An 18-piece orchestra complemented the 24-voice choir that evening.



The music ministry also supported both **Christmas Eve services** with volunteers leading music at both services and the choir singing at the 8PM service.

In addition to NCPC volunteers, **guest musicians** Olivia Stall (French horn), Kuvalvir Parhar (trumpet), Danny Hughes (trumpet), Johanna Bote (trombone), Cord Wisler (trombone), Laura Hendrickson (piano), Leanne Riddle (cello), and Michelle Rhee (violin) provided additional instrumental music for worship.

Music Ministry has also continued a partnership with Family Ministries to include singing as part of Sunday School and Sunday Nursery. The aim of this time is to familiarize the children with music from worship for their faith foundation and for them to be more engaged worshipers. To aid these goals, two-octave set of **"Kidsplay" Handbells** were purchased as a teaching instrument. These bells debuted at the Christmas Concert.

As Music Ministries teams lead worship together, opportunities are taken to unite the ministry teams on pieces and develop skills within the teams. Choir pieces and programs have featured members of the worship band. Instrumentalists are also encouraged to try different instruments as interests develop, increasing the team's ability to incorporate a variety of musical selections into the worship services. Beyond music, rehearsals for each ensemble conclude with a shared devotion and prayer, and all service musicians gather pre-service for prayer and devotional together. These times continue to build a sense of unity and purpose among the groups and with God as we prepare to lead the congregation in worship.

In Paul's second letter to the Corinthian church, he gets honest about human vulnerability, comparing us to fragile clay jars. Yet he's convinced that it is precisely in the middle of our greatest need that Jesus' power is present to bring transformation. We explored the idea that God gives us sufficient strength in Christ and sought to welcome it into our daily lives.

*Lent & Easter***PRAYERS IN THE DARK****With Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane**

Jesus' experience in the garden is pivotal to the story of salvation as the place where he found the loving & courageous resolve to move forward to the cross. His prayers spoken there are filled with raw emotion and a sense of deep vulnerability, reminding us that Jesus understands us when we offer our own "prayers in the dark."

*Spring***HEART & MIND ALIVE!****Following the Risen Lord into the Old Testament**

Among the many good reasons for Christians to read the Old Testament is the simple fact that this is what Jesus did with his disciples in the forty days between his resurrection and ascension. During the Easter season we followed Jesus into the Old Testament, where he revealed insights that brought our hearts and minds alive!

*Summer***JONAH: The Travel Podcast**

Following up on the prior year's popular "Summer Podcast" sermon series on the Old Testament book of Esther, this summer we did the same with the book of Jonah. Traveling with Jonah by sea and by land, we learned important faith lessons about running from and responding to God's call. We learned that we, too, can be redirected by the "God of second chances" to be faithful emissaries of God's grace and mercy.

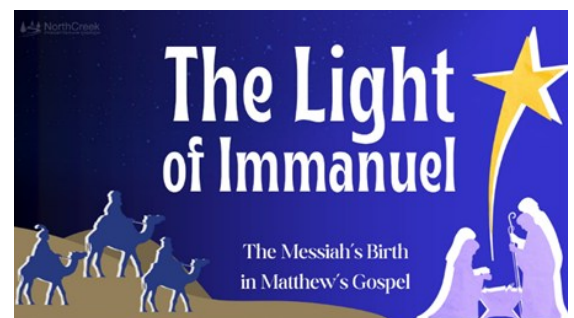

DEACON CARE

Purpose of this ministry

The purpose of this ministry is to provide loving assistance to the sick, needy and elderly at North Creek Presbyterian Church.

2025 Highlights

- **Our Unhoused neighbors:** To address the immediate needs of our neighbors struggling to find shelter, the deacon board authorized the front office to use their monthly deacon budget to package shelf stable food, & water for those who we see spending a moment of rest in the safety of the church grounds.
- **EBT card scare:** In November, when the federal funds for EBT food cards were threatened with cutoff, the deacon board asked our office manager to prepare for new requests for assistance by purchasing grocery store gift cards for those in need. Pastor Kurt also arranged for an impromptu food drive to support the Mill Creek Food Bank, the response from the congregation was amazing! Thank you to everyone who brought a bag of food!
- **Southern California Wildfire Donation:** The Deacon Board approved \$1000 seed money to start off a fundraiser to go to Southern California for a Wildfire Relief Fund. The congregation matched it and then some! Our final donation total was \$2536.
- **A Large Deacon Board:** Three faithful deacons retired off the board, and we welcomed 6 new deacons in June.
- **Homebound Deacons:** We were able to maintain our three Deacons to serve our homebound and memory care members. Each homebound member continues to get a call each month from two deacons in an effort to maintain a connection with NCPC.
- **Quail Park Deacon:** The Deacon Board is excited to have a Deacon, Diana Hunt, who is serving as a deacon liaison between Quail Park Retirement Community and NCPC. This deacon ministry is a work in progress as we determine the needs of this sister community, and a growing prayer ministry within the community has already taken root at Quail Park! NCPC also takes part, once a month, in leading their well-attended Sunday evening worship services. Thank you to Diana for being the trailblazer in this new deacon ministry.
- **Warm Quilts for our Homebound:** Silver Thimbles quilt group mourned the passing of one of its longtime members, Doris Noll. Doris's daughter gifted many of her quilts to the group, and the group passed the quilts on to the Deacons. Each of our homebound received one of these lovingly handmade quilts as a Christmas gift this year.
- **Congregational Support:** We rely on congregation members who, though not officially deacons, act in the capacity of deacons to support others. We love our volunteers and are incredibly grateful for your contributions. We couldn't do it without you! Thank you for all the cards, meals, transportation, & home communion help!

Purpose of the Ministry

The Stephen Minister logo below symbolizes the healing from brokenness to wholeness that comes with God as the cure-giver and the Stephen Minister as a care-giver. Stephen Ministers assist members of the NCPC community as well as people from the surrounding community as they go through life's trials. Care is given in one-on-one situations honoring the confidentiality and leaning on the cure-giver, Jesus Christ, to help remediate the situation.

The continuing education portion of Stephen Ministry monthly meetings focused on topics to enhance our knowledge of issues our caregivers might face. This year our topics included divorce, depression, and how to tell the message of Jesus. Speakers, Pastor Chris Chang LMFT (licensed marriage and family therapist), and Stephanie Armes, PhD, LMFT, presented messages to enhance our understanding of the topic of divorce from a pastor's and a therapist's point of view.

Stephen Ministers offer support by giving booklets dealing with the journey of grief at four times during the year. These booklets focus on what the person is likely experiencing at that point in grief—offering understanding, empathy, compassion, and hope. We also provide books, *Cancer Now What?*, as a way to offer help and hope to those dealing with cancer.

It is our hope that in the coming year we can increase the number of Stephen Ministers so that we can serve more people from NCPC and the community.

Highlights from 2025

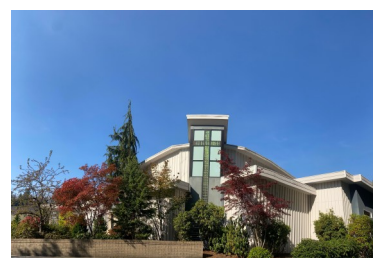
- The Ministry Team for Facilities had a very busy 2025 but thanks to God and great members, much was accomplished.
- One of the 3 HVAC units in the CE wing failed and was replaced, 22 yrs old.
- Parking lot entry lights were added out by 164th street to aid in safe site entry.
- There was a WIFI switch added to the water fountains to schedule the on/off times.
- The roof over the CE wing was cleaned of moss to aid in longevity.
- New first aid kits were purchased to replace the 4 existing kits that had many expired contents.
- An Emergency Preparedness plan was placed at the welcome station to give direction on many utility and life safety issues. This needs annual review.
- QR code was posted in the kitchen area so that volunteers may access the electronic work order system called Maintain X that is used by the Facilities team to track issues.
- Repairs were completed to our Fire Alarm and Sprinkler Systems to keep our life safety systems in compliance. New Smoke detectors will be needed soon.
- The north parking lot received crack sealant to protect from degradation and erosion.
- The choir room was repainted and new cabinets from Jim and Mark were added.
- The sale of a sliver of land that was part of our property but separated from us by the creek was sold to the office building adjacent.

The Solar Panel Project.

2025 marked completion of the 6-year plan that financed our roof top panel project. It was the 2nd largest in Snohomish County and thanks to those whose vision and expertise made it happen, 2026 will see great reduction in PUD bills. A larger more detailed report will be presented to you soon.

Purpose of this ministry

The Finance Ministry Team (FMT) monitors the church's financial condition throughout the year. The FMT meets monthly (usually the third Tuesday) to monitor both sides (income and expense) of the budget, to address special requests from ministry teams, and prepare a report to Session. The FMT compares actual income & expenses against our budgeted income & expenses, investigates the reasons for variances, and then alerts Session where corrective action is recommended to assure a sound financial position for the church while making best use of the resources God entrusts to us. The FMT also assists Session in creating the annual budget for the next year and provides support to the stewardship campaign in the fall. The Finance Team reviews all fundraiser requests to make sure each fundraising group has the maximum chance of succeeding. In addition, the team coordinates volunteers to help count the giving from each Sunday.

Top Highlights from 2025

During the year, the Finance Team supported the Facilities Team, Session, in strengthening external and internal financial security controls, and with current interest rates invested our reserves for higher returns. We also worked with Personnel to help fill the vacant bookkeeping position and aid with facilities on a small boundary line adjustment east of the NGPA.
