WELCOME

The Service of the Longest Night is named for these days in December when we experience the shortest day and the longest night of the year. But the name also applies to the feeling that a number of us have about this season. For many, it is the "long dark night of the soul," in which memories of past experiences and the pain of present experience can become overwhelming.

For some, Christmas Day is the most difficult. For others, it is Christmas Eve, or New Year's Eve, or the beginning of another lonely new year.

In this service, we gather with many Christians around the world to remember in the midst of pain, grief, and heartbreak that God is here. God is present with us when we are mourning the death of a loved. God surrounds us with God's embrace when we suffer from illness, addiction, abuse, or estrangement. God is with us when we are lonely, struggling financially, or in conflict with another. God is here in the midst of the pain, brokenness, and violence of our nation and world.

We gather today within our suffering to remember and hold onto the promise of God's goodness. We gather to remember our loved ones, lay before God our burdens and brokenness. We gather because we have every reason to hold on to hope.

Let us take a moment of silence as we draw close with God...

GREETING & PRAYER

The light of our Lord Jesus Christ, the warmth of God, and the hope of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

Let us pray. Merciful God, hear our prayer for ourselves, our families, and our friends who long for your warm embrace within their sufferings and struggles this holiday season. Come to those who suffer in any way and bring about your peace. Grant rest for those who are weary this day, freedom to those burdened by tomorrows worries, and bring hope to those who despair about the past. We ask these things in the name of Christ who shares our life in joy and sorrow, death and new birth, despair and promise. **Amen.**

LITURGY OF REMEMBRANCE

Throughout human history, people have used candles as symbols of prayer. Today we light five candles. These candles represent our recollection of our losses of loved ones, of relationships, of our own grief, and of the hope that lies hidden within us.

We light the first candle remembering the fullness of Christ's birth; acknowledging the joyful celebration of Christ coming to earth but also the suffering and anguish that Christ endures on the cross. We see our own lives reflected in these events as we marvel at the babe born in a manger yet are filled with grief with our own losses. We pray for God to be near to us.

Comfort us, O God, in our joy and in our grief.

We light the second candle to remember those whom we have loved and lost. We pause to remember their names, their faces, their voices, and the memories that bind them to us in this season. We hold them before God, giving thanks for their lives in ours.

May God's eternal love surround them.

We light the third candle to redeem the pain of loss; the loss of relationships, the loss of companionship, the loss of health in ourselves or in family members, the loss of joy and peace in our lives from the stresses which surround us, the loss and loneliness we experience when our loved ones do not share our faith. We pause to gather up the pain of the past and offer it to God, asking that from God's hands we receive the gift of peace.

Refresh, restore, and renew us, O God, and lead us into your future.

We light the fourth candle to remember ourselves this Christmas season. We pause and remember these past months and for some of us years of grief; the disbelief, the anger, the down times, the poignancy of reminiscing, the hugs and handshakes of family and friends, all those who have stood with us, and the pain of reflecting our own mortality. We give thanks for all the support we have known.

Let us remember that dawn defeats darkness.

We light the Christ candle to remember our faith and the gift of hope which God offers us in the Incarnation. We remember that God, who shares our life in Jesus Christ, promises us a place and time of no more pain and suffering.

Let us remember the One who show the way, who brings the truth and who bears the light.

LIGHTING OF INDIVIDUAL CANDLES & LAYING ON OF HANDS

Each of us comes here today bearing our own hurts, sorrows, and broken places. I invite each of you to offer your personal wound to the God who loves each of us deeply and wants to carry our pain. God waits patiently, gently calling out, "Give me your pain, come to me... all who labor and are heavy burdened, I will refresh you."

In the space to follow I invite you to come forward to light a candle and to participate in the laying on of hands, as ways of giving God all that weighs heavy upon us. Know that while the invitation is extended, you may choose to do as much or as little as you desire.

As you light a candle, remember that it is God who lights a candle in our darkness and holds us close until we are able to shine our light for others. Be reminded that suffering passes, though memory remains.

As you kneel at the altar railing to receive a sign of healing and wholeness through the laying on of hands, remember that it is God who give comfort and healing.

Come. Let God carry your burdens.

And in your mercy, answer.

For all our family and friends that they may know love and peace and happiness in you; God, hear our prayer.

And in your mercy, answer.

For the peace proclaimed by the Christmas angels, that it might come to the whole world; God, hear our prayer.

And in your mercy, answer.

Merciful God, your Holy Spirit intercedes for us even when we do not know how to pray. Send your Spirit now to comfort us in this time of need and loss, that even in the midst of our sorrow, we may know the consolation of your love and the joy of your saving grace; through Jesus Christ our Lord.
