The disciple Thomas, often referred to as "Doubting Thomas," must have been from Missouri. Remember the saying: "I'm from Missouri, you have to show me." Or the saying: "Don't believe anything you hear and only half of what you see."

According to John 20:24-29, Thomas wasn't present at the first post-resurrection appearance of Jesus to his disciples in the upper room. He refused to believe the other disciples that Jesus had appeared to them. He said he would only believe if he could see Jesus himself and verify it was Jesus by putting his finger in the imprint of the nails in Jesus' hands and his hand in the wound on Jesus' side. MEMORIAL DAY HAS ITS CUSTOMS—

- General Orders No. 11 stated that "in this observance no form of ceremony is prescribed," but over time several customs and symbols became associated with the holiday.
- ❖ It is customary on Memorial Day to fly the flag at half-staff until noon, and then raise it to the top of the staff until sunset.
- Taps, the 24-note bugle call, is played at all military funerals and memorial services. It originated in 1862.
- ❖ The World War I poem "In Flanders Fields," by John McCrea, inspired the Memorial Day custom of wearing red artificial poppies. In 1915, a Georgia teacher and volunteer war worker named Moina Michael began a campaign to make the poppy a symbol of tribute to veterans and for "keeping the faith with all who died." The sale of poppies has supported the work of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.



Did You Know?—National Days in May 2023

- May 1—National Loyalty Day—Recognizing American freedom, and set aside for the reaffirmation of loyalty to the United States and the recognition of the heritage of American freedom. Every U.S. President since 1955 has set the day for May 1st. Whether they call for Americans to raise the flags, pray, or reflect on their heritage, each of them recognizes an inherent need for the country to be united in our basic ideals. Their messages speak of loyalty and freedom in equal measure, especially those who serve in the military.
- May 1—May Day—A celebration of spring! Decorate with colorful flowers today. Dance!
- May 1—National Mother Goose Day—In honor of this day, revisit those wonderful childhood stories with your children—or someone else's children. What's your favorite?
- May 1—Melanoma Monday—(1st Monday in May)—Set aside to raise awareness about skin cancer. The deadliest of skin cancers, the observance focuses on skin health, sun safety, tanning prevention, and skin cancer screenings. Reduce your risk by wearing sunscreen, find shade, don't let the clouds fool you, avoid tanning beds, and regularly check your skin for abnormal moles.
- May 1—National Chocolate Parfait Day—YUM!
- May 2—National Foster Care Day—The first Tuesday in May is dedicated to all the children in the U.S. foster care system. It encourages everyone to wear blue and raise their voices to show their support for foster youth everywhere.

 Statistics:
 - ❖ 250,000 children enter foster care each year.
 - Only 50% of youth in foster care graduate high school.
 - Foster children suffer PTSD at more than twice the rate of U.S. war veterans.
 - ❖ 1 in 5 foster children experience homelessness within 1 year of aging out of care.
 - At ages 17 & 18, one-third of young women in foster care are pregnant or parenting.
 - More than 70% of inmates incarcerated were at one point in the foster care system.
 - Stipends don't cover the essentials of a growing child.

If you know of someone in the foster care system, send a card, a gift, or just be "a friend" and do something special — make a "play date."

- May 2—National Teacher Appreciation Day—(Observed on the 1st Tuesday of the first full week of May)—Recognizing the dedicated educators across the country, honor an exceptional teacher you know by saying "Thank You." NOTE: We have many "teachers" in life—not only those in the school classroom, but Sunday School teachers, ministers, scout leaders, 4-H group leaders, parents, grandparents, even friends and neighbors—anyone that has taught you something you didn't otherwise know is a teacher. Recognize them with a card or a phone call, a gift, or another nice gesture. It will mean more than you know!
- May 3—National Paranormal Day—People who believe in the paranormal are encouraged to get together and share their experiences with each other.
- May 3—National Chocolate Custard Day—Who wouldn't want some of that?!
- May 4—National Day of Prayer Designated—In 1988, President Ronald Reagan signed for this day to be the first Thursday of May.
- May 5—Cinco De Mayo—It's tacos & margaritas for dinner tonight!
- May 6—National Nurses Day—(The first day of National Nurses Week, which concludes on May 12th—Florence Nightingale's birthday). On this day, we raise awareness of all nurse contributions and commitments and acknowledge the vital role nurses play in society. Tell the nurses you know how much they are appreciated, especially these past few years, throughout this pandemic!
- May 6—National Fitness Day—(1st Saturday in May)—This day is to encourage everyone to try new ways of becoming fit and healthy. If you already have a routine, shake it up—walk or jog a different route, try a new, healthy recipe, take the stairs instead of the elevator, park at the back of the parking lot, make a goal to go to bed and wake at the same times every day to get better sleep.

- May 10—National Clean Your Room Day—That will make Mom happy!
- May 10—Receptionist's Day—(2nd Wednesday in May)—Now there's one to remember!!!
- May 11—National Eat What You Want Day—Blow the diet, you'll get back to it tomorrow.
- May 13—National Apple Pie Day—Make or buy an apple pie and indulge! Or take one to a friend or someone who is unable to get out.
- May 13—National World Migratory Bird Day—At least 4,000 different species of birds migrate, which adds up to about 40% of the entire avian population. And they all do it in pursuit of food. Twice every year, these birds will fly to warmer climates for the winters, and then return home to breed. As humans, we can all appreciate the value in following food all around the globe.
- May 14—Mother's Day—(Always occurs the second Sunday in May)—Celebrate your mother, grandmother, godmother, someone else's mother, or someone who is just "motherly."
- May 15—International Day of Families—"Family is not an important thing—it's 'everything" (Michael J. Fox). Celebrate your family. Do something special together today.
- May 16—National Do Something Good For Your Neighbor Day—This day encourages individuals and organizations alike to be neighborly to each other. Help a neighbor with a chore, plant flowers, run an errand, invite them over for a cup of tea or coffee, or drop a note in the mail just to let them know you are thinking of them—any act of kindness to make them feel special.
- May 17—National Cherry Cobbler Day—YUM!!
- May 17—National Walnut Day—The Walnut Marketing Board established this day in the 1950s...because "sometimes you feel like a nut!" Use them today in cookies, oatmeal, salads, sauces, cakes, or alone as a snack.
- May 19—National Endangered Species Day—(3rd Friday in May)—Observed for everyone to learn about the importance of protecting endangered species. It also encourages learning about wildlife habitats and the actions necessary to protect them. Make a donation to a charitable organization dedicated to conserving endangered species, volunteer at a local nature center, or go on a nature walk. See what animal species you spot. Look at the Endangered Species list and research some of them. Share what you have learned. NOTE: The leatherback turtle is the largest of all living turtles, is thousands of years old, and is considered "vulnerable," although, in many areas it is "critically endangered." There was a report on the news about this last year. Interesting animal—learn more!
- May 20—National Rescue Dog Day—According to the American Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA), a non-profit organization established in 1866, more than 3 million dogs enter shelter homes every year. In observance of this day, adopt/shelter, or donate to this very worthy cause.
- May 21—National Take Your Parent to the Playground Day—Everyone is a kid at heart! Go have some "kid" fun! Your children will love you for it!
- May 22—National Vanilla Pudding Day—Oh yeah!
- May 23—World Turtle Day—Learn about these resilient animals. Turtles and tortoises are two different animals. The main difference between the two are that turtles sometimes live in water, while tortoises only live on land. Turtles live up to age 40 and have streamlined and mostly flat shells. Tortoises live up to 300 years and have larger, more domed shells. NOTE: The box turtle (those we occasionally see on the road or in our yard) is "near threatened," as their status has been declining statewide, mainly due to loss of habitat and being hit by vehicles. If you see a box turtle that may be in danger, such as on the road, move the turtle to the other side of the road in the direction it was going. Do NOT try to relocate it. Box turtles have a homing instinct, and they will try to get back to where are they came from.
- May 25—National Missing Children's Day—This day shines a spotlight on child safety. While the observance honors those who've gone above and beyond to protect children, it also offers resources to continue protecting them further. Here are ways to keep your children safe every day. It's important to:
 - Maintain custody documents.
 - Keep recent photos of children handy.
 - Also, keep medical and dental records up to date.

Protect your children by:

- Making "online safety" a priority.
- Complete background checks on caregivers and check references.

- Never leave young children unattended in strollers and car seats.
- Whenever possible, don't dress children in clothing with their names on it.
- Teach them their address and phone number as young as possible.
- May 26—National Road Trip Day—(Friday before Memorial Day)—Everyone needs to "get away" once in a while. Whether it's to pay tribute to fallen soldiers by visiting war memorials across the country, or simply going for a few-hours drive, make it a special time. If you can't physically go for a drive, take a "trip down memory lane"—share memories of a trip you once shared with someone.
- May 28—National Hamburger Day—Guess what's for dinner?
- May 29—Memorial Day—(The last Monday of May)—Honor those who died while fighting in the U.S. Armed Forces. This day began as "Decoration Day," following the Civil War, when mourners placed flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers. Let's remember the heroes who have fought for the freedom we all enjoy.


INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THE VIETNAM MEMORIAL WALL:

LENGTH—Each wall of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial is 246 feet, 8 inches long. They meet at an angle of 125 degrees, 12 minutes, and point exactly to the northeast corners of the Washington Monument and Lincoln Memorial. The walls are supported along their entire length by 140 concrete pilings driven approximately 35 feet to bedrock.

HEIGHT—At their vertex, the walls are 10 feet, 1.5 inches high.

COMPOSITION—The stone for the walls, safety curbs, and walkways is black granite quarried near Bangalore, India. All cutting and fabrication was done in Barre, Vermont.

SYMBOLS—Each name is preceded (on the west wall) or followed (on the east wall) by a symbol designating status. The diamond symbol denotes that the service member's death was



THE NAMES—As of May 2017, there are 58,318 names on The Wall. The original 57,939 names were gritblasted in Memphis, Tenn., using industrial equipment and stencils produced through a photographic process. Since 1982, 376 names have been added to The Wall (as of 12/31/2016) by craftsmen using the same photo-generated stencils. The letters are 0.53 inches high and are inscribed to a depth of approximately 0.015 inches. The names were provided by the Department of Defense, which compiled a list of combat zone casualties according to Presidential Executive Order #11216, handed down by President Lyndon B. Johnson on April 24, 1965. It specified Vietnam and adjacent coastal waters as a combat zone. This zone was expanded to include Laos, Cambodia, and Air Force bases in Thailand.

WOMEN—The names of eight women, all nurses, are inscribed on The Wall. Seven are from the U.S. Army; one is from the Air Force.

MEDAL OF HONOR RECIPIENTS—The names of 160 Medal of Honor recipients are on The Wall. However, one of those recipients earned his Medal of Honor during World War II, but died while serving in Vietnam. Michael Blassie was awarded the Medal of Honor when he was interred in the Tomb of the Unknown at Arlington National Cemetery. The Medal was rescinded when his remains were identified, and he is not counted with the 160.

CHAPLAINS—There are 16 clergy members listed on The Wall: seven Catholic, seven Protestant, and two Jewish.

PEOPLE FROM OTHER COUNTRIES—There are 120 individuals on The Wall who listed foreign countries as their home of record. The countries include: Australia, Bahamas, Bolivia, Brazil, Canada, Colombia, Costa Rica, England, France, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Jamaica, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, Pacific Island, Panama, Peru, Philippines, Puerto Rico, and Switzerland.

PANEL NUMBERING—Each wall contains 74 separate panels, including four each end without names, for a total of 140 panels of names.

FUNDING—The Vietnam Veterans Memorial was paid for by donations from more than 275,000 individuals, veterans and civic organizations, corporations, foundations, and unions. No federal funds were used.

"WALL MAGIC"

"Wall Magic" describes miraculous, unbelievable coincidences at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. The Wall has many stories surrounding it—stories of friends who reconnect, of families who meet men who served with their loved ones, of friendships and marriages forged there. These occurrences come about through events that seem more than coincidence and bring their own story of healing.

Volunteers at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial have seen many instances of Wall Magic. These stories, and there are many, involve these remarkable moments that happened at or because of The Wall.

An early Wall Magic story comes from Doubek, who worked so hard to make the dream of a Memorial a reality.

In the final days before the National Salute to Vietnam Veterans in 1982, construction and landscaping crews still had the Memorial fenced off in order to keep crowds off the newly laid sod. Doubek was down at the site, wrapping up for the night. A young man approached and asked if he could go down to The Wall. Doubek asked him to return another time. The young man said he was from California and still in the military. He had to leave the next day.

Doubek agreed to walk the man down to The Wall. "As we were walking, I was telling him how the [panels] are like pages in a book. He was getting emotional. I had the directory with me. So, we looked up the location of this name, then he thanked me and left."



The morning after the dedication, Doubek and his wife were watching Charles Kuralt on "CBS Sunday Morning." Kuralt traditionally ended the show with a snippet of film, and that day, he showed footage of the Memorial. Gradually the camera moved in closer, Doubek recalled, "until you were seeing one wall . . . then 10 panels . . . then one panel . . . then a few rows of names . . . then the camera stopped to focus on a single name . . . and it was the same name that the guy had asked me to see."

He sat stunned for a moment, then thought to himself, "Maybe that guy was an angel telling me I've done OK." That day, Doubek experienced a little bit of Wall Magic.

"AND THERE SHE WAS"


At the 10th anniversary ceremony of the Wall, a long line of people waited in the November cold to read the names inscribed on the memorial. An elderly, frail-looking lady was standing next to a man as large as a football player. They chatted nearly two hours as they waited to read their personal list of names.

When it was the woman's turn, she stepped onto the stage and read all the names on the list except the last one. Pausing, she said, "...and my son," and then she read his name. The big man nearly collapsed. For 25 years, he had been looking for the mother of the soldier who died in his arms...and there she was, reading his name.






