

Boxes will be sent directly to the church.

All items must be returned to St. Paul's UCC by Sunday, September 7th.

Missouri Family Food Boxes

Each box should contain:

- 3 different cans of vegetables
- 3 different cans of fruit
- 3 cans chicken
- 3 cans tuna
- 1 can pasta sauce
- 1 pound pasta
- 3 boxes of macaroni & cheese
- 1 jar peanut butter
- 1 box of oatmeal packets (10 ct.)

-flavored or unflavored

Pack all in a box (provided) and fill with packing material to keep contents secure. Tape securely and clearly label each of the four sides and top of the box as "Missouri Family Food Box".

CWS Hygiene Kits

Each kit should contain:

1 wash cloth

1 tooth brush (in original package)

1 wide-tooth comb (remove packaging)

-must have at least 6 in. of teeth

-no pocket combs or picks

Travel-size deodorant (3.4 oz or less, non-aerosol)

Travel-size lotion (3.4 oz. or less, fragrance-free,

NEW only)

Travel-size shampoo (3.4 oz. or less, NEW only)

Travel-size toothpaste (3.4 oz. or less, expiration date of 1 year)

1 bar of soap (bath size in original package)

1 nail clipper (remove packaging)

Place all items in a 1-gallon plastic bag with zipper closure; remove excess air from bag and seal.






— A FUN EXPERIMENT.





According to superstition, catching leaves in autumn brings good luck. Every leaf means a lucky month next year.



AUTUMN TID BITS

The Planet—On the first day of autumn, the sun is aligned with the center between the North and the South of the earth. On that day, the light and dark hours are exactly the same length. This is called 'equinox', derived from the Latin word 'aequus' which means 'equal.'



What happens to plants?—Yellow, orange and variations thereof always reside in the pigmentation of tree leaves, but they are overpowered by the abundance of green from the chlorophyll in the leaves. Come autumn, when the sun weakens and days grow shorter, the amount of chlorophyll in leaves diminishes, allowing the other pigments in the leaves to show through. Red and purple leaves are actually caused by the presence of sugars from sap that is trapped inside of the leaves.

Autumn for animals—Squirrels do not hibernate, they collect and bury nuts the entire autumn! They rely on storing nuts to be able to eat during winter. When they do come out in winter, they are usually tunneling under snow to find the food they buried during the fall. The nuts they bury, but don't retrieve, sprout into new trees.



The aurora borealis, also known as the Northern Lights, are geo-magnetic storms that occur when charged solar particles squeeze through our

atmosphere's defenses and collide with gaseous particles in Earth's sky. Due to longer, clearer nights, this occurs twice as often during fall and winter months.

Monarch butterflies

make autumn a migratory season, flying South from America to Mexico and parts of California.



Traveling at speeds of 12-25 mph, they are the only insect that migrates up to 2,500 miles for nicer weather.

SEPTEMBER FUN FACTS:

• September is the ninth month and the only month with the same number of letters in its name in English as the number of the month.

- September starts on the same day of the week as December each year, but does not end on the same day of the week as any other month in the year.
- Labor Day is observed every year on the first Monday in September.
- Grandparent's Day is observed in the United States on the first Sunday after Labor Day.
- In the northern hemisphere, the Autumn Equinox occurs and fall begins. This takes place on September 22nd or 23rd, depending on the year.
- The only US president to have had a September birthday was William Taft (Sept. 15, 1857).
- President William McKinley was shot on September 6, 1901 while attending the Buffalo Pan-American Exposition in New York. He passed away eight days later, on September 14, 1901.
- On September 5th, 1961, President John F. Kennedy signed a hijacking bill, making air piracy a crime punishable by death or imprisonment.
- The Great Fire of London occurred on September 2, 1666.
- The poem "Mary had a Little Lamb" was published September 1st, 1830.
- World War II began in September 1939, when Hitler invaded Poland.
- The very first comic strip was printed in an American newspaper on September 11th, 1875.
- In September of 1920, Earle Dickson, of Highland Park, New Jersey, invented the Band-Aid for his wife who frequently burned herself while cooking. He was a cotton buyer for the Johnson & Johnson Co.
- Former President Richard M. Nixon was given an unconditional pardon, for his role in the infamous "Watergate" fiasco by President Gerald Ford, September 8, 1974.
