How happy can I be when I'm scared of dying?

"Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord from now on." Revelation 14:13

Many things are scary. Watching your infant wiggle out of the car carrier that you had momentarily set on the table—that's scary. Witnessing a car swerve into oncoming traffic—that's scary. But of all the scary things, death for many people is the scariest.

It's scary because of what we know and don't know. We know death is certain. Its cloud hangs over us at every traffic intersection, on every consult with our doctor, and during every violent storm. What we don't know is what dying is like or what, if anything, happens after death.

If there is no God, then death is the end and that's it. If so, then death may be final and sad, but it's hardly something to be afraid of. However, if there is existence after death and God is waiting to judge us for all the things we have done, then death is more than sad. It's scary.

God does exist. There are no ifs about that. The Bible pinpoints the greatest fear about dying and facing God: "It is a dreadful thing to fall into the hands of the living God" (Hebrews 10:31). Yes, that's scary! So how happy can I be when I'm scared of dying?

If it were up to us to find happiness in the face of death, we would be on an impossible journey. What we need to calm our fears and to find happiness is for someone to do something about death. The good news is that someone has.

God, who awaits you after death, sent Jesus to destroy death's fear. Jesus began that work by obeying God's laws for you. Then he traded places with you. He gave you his perfect life in exchange for your sins. And so, with your sins laid on him, he suffered a most horrible death, which earned God's forgiveness for you. With all sin forgiven, death lost its power. So, three days after his burial, Jesus rose to life from the dead. He defeated death so that it can no longer hold the lives and bodies of those it has claimed. God will raise all people from the dead.

Believe this good news and know for sure that God waits for you with open arms to welcome you into his heaven. This is why God tells us in the Bible: "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord from now on."

The unknown experience of death may still be scary for you, but because death has been conquered by Jesus Christ, you can live happily, now and ever after.

Upcoming Theme - Dead & Buried: We have come to the final stretch of Lent, known as "Holy Week." Think about what that title is implying. We





normally talk about a "holiday" (short for "holy day"), where one day is set aside for some special observance or celebration. But for centuries, believers have set aside this entire week for special observance. Clearly, what is discussed during Holy Week is important. Indeed, what we see happen this holy week is the foundation of our eternity. In Holy Week, we see the impossible. The Son of God dies. The Lord of life enters the last place he belonged—the grave. But what we will see this week is that, when Jesus entered the tomb, he did not go alone. He buried all our baggage with him: sin, guilt, shame, condemnation, fear. Jesus will walk out of the tomb. But thanks to him, those things will all stay dead and buried.



Easter Series – Because He Lives: It is easy to become so engrossed in the details of historical events—who, when, where—that we miss their significance. For example, consider World War II. There are many

compelling stories. Lots of dates and data to remember. However, for a moment, set all that aside, and just imagine the Allies had lost. How would the world be different today? What would life be like for those of Jewish heritage? Would freedom exist in Europe? Would we be speaking German? With historical events, you miss out if you focus only on the details: who, when, where. You also need to focus what that historical event means. The Allies won. That means something!

In this season of Easter, it is good we review the details: who, when, where. That reminds us that the resurrection of Christ is not fairytale or fable. It is a historical event. . . the historical event. However, we do ourselves a disservice if we simply recall the historic details of Easter without thinking long and hard about Easter's significance. Jesus won. That means something! It is our privilege and pleasure to use the fifty days of Easter to discuss this fact: because he lives, not only is our eternity secure, but we have abundant resources to face the present.


Mission Statement:

LWMS Meeting - All women of St. Paul are invited!

Thursday, May 15th at 6:30 PM, St. Paul LWMS will meet in the church basement. Please come and learn how our congregation is supporting missionaries and their families. We will be voting on National LWMS Board of Directors and 2025-2026 home and world mission projects of the Lutheran Women's Missionary Society. LWMS meets four times throughout the year, plus attends a Spring Rally and a Fall Rally. After a break during the summer months, we will meet again on Thursday, September 18th, at 6:30 PM in the church basement.

Befriend a Mission (BAM) Program: LWMS women love missions and the missionaries who serve them. One way this is apparent is through the Befriend a Mission program (BAM). Each of the 60 circuits plus the non-circuit member congregations and the individual members receive at least one home mission and one world mission to befriend over a two-year period. The circuit's BAM Coordinator collects information about the missions and missionaries and shares the information with the circuit. The women of the circuit pray for the mission and missionary. They also send cards of encouragement and sometimes send gifts to support special projects or gifts simply to show love to the missionary and family. Over the next few months, we will be providing information about each of our new 2025-2026 BAM families.

A message from Home Missionary Joel Prange, Amazing Grace in Dickinson, ND:

In the late 1800's my great-great-grandfather worked on a ranch near Bison, SD. Bison is in the northwest corner of the state. He became friends with the rancher's son, and every generation since then have been friends, my grandma included. Grandma hadn't seen her friend from Bison for over 20 years when seminary call day arrived for me in 2022. Imagine her surprise as she found out that I was assigned to the southwest corner of ND, to Dickinson, a little over 100 miles from her friend. They text and discover that her friend has a grandson around my age, working as a realtor in Dickinson.

I connected with this grandson, Zack, and he helped us find our first rental property to live in. We've become good friends, and he invited us to his wedding. I've had the opportunity to talk with him about many scriptural things, and he trusts me as someone that he can come to with questions about the Bible. He even discovered the storefront where Amazing Grace worships right now. He's not a member of our church, but in many ways, he's under my spiritual care as a prospect. All because my great-great-grandfather worked on a ranch over 100 years ago. God be praised!
