The Image of God

For years Americans visiting the Capitol in Washington, D.C. have stopped to marvel at one of Gutzon Borglum's best-known pieces, a huge head of Abraham Lincoln. While Borglum was still working on that sculpture, one day he was interrupted by a family who came to visit him at his shop. The face of Lincoln was just emerging on one side of the massive block of stone on the studio floor.

While the adults visited with Borglum, their five-yearold daughter, dwarfed by the granite block, gazed in wonder at the giant features of Lincoln's face. After a few moments of intense study, the little girl scurried over to Borglum, tugged at his pants leg and asked, "Is that Abraham Lincoln?" "Yes," the famous sculptor replied. "Well," the little girl asked, "how did you know he was in there?"

The Bible tells us that at creation, "God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them." (Genesis 1:27) We were created with the image of God in us. That's the shape we were intended to take, the face that people were supposed to see when they look at us. But sin ruined all that. No longer did God's perfect image of righteousness shine out from within us. Sin disfigured that image beyond recognition. Sin brought pain, shame and death.

But Jesus changed all that. His resurrection gives us hope. Peter wrote, "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." (1 Peter 1:3)

That new birth is ours in our baptism. Paul wrote, "So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, ²⁷ for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ." (Galatians 3:26-27) That image of God that we lost, in baptism we regain. It is still

smudged with sin and may be hard to see, but it's there. Believe that.

What do you see when you look in the mirror? A good Lutheran would probably answer: "A sinner." That's good. That's the attitude of the tax collector in the Temple who beat his breast and prayed, "God, have mercy on me, a sinner." (Luke 18:13) Jesus said that he went home justified because he trusted in God's mercy and not his own righteousness.

But if that is the only image we focus on, we are missing the power and joy of the resurrection. Through your baptism Christ is alive in you. When you look in the mirror, yes, see a sinner, but also see Christ. See God's image rebooted in you.

See the eternal life that is already in you and will be exposed in all its beauty on the last day. Find joy in the person you are in Christ.

Then live that image. Show the face of God to the world. When you go to work, do people see the face of God in how you go about your business? Do they see someone who is happy to help and serve?

As a parent, do you think about how your children see you? Shine the face of Jesus in your love and care for them.

When you are facing surgery, are you grumpy and complaining or does the face of Jesus shine through with patience and kindness?

May you see Christ in you. May others see Christ in you.

A message from Pastor Ryan Cortright, Our Redeemer Lutheran Church in Madison, WI:

During the fall before the Outdoor Adventure Camp VBS our congregation had planned for the following June, I stumbled across a promotion for the Mission Journeys program. Since I was hoping to find a group of volunteers from another congregation to help us, I went to Mission Journeys website and filled out the online form with information about our camp.

About five months later (when I forgot I had even applied for a Mission Journeys team!), I received a message that there was a group interested in helping us. The team was from St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Platteville, Wisconsin – about an hour from our church in Madison. When I thought of a mission team, I always imagined that they would come from a faraway place. Having our team come from another congregation in our region was a good reminder of the mission opportunities that surround all of us without having to go very far.

The process of organizing the team was simple. I was put in contact with Irv, one of the adults coming on the trip. We made plans for housing and food for the team of four high school students and two adults who would spend a week in Madison. They arrived on Sunday afternoon before the camp began, and we worked on setting up. Throughout the week of camp, the team came early each day to welcome the kids. They led groups and participated in all the camp activities. Every member of the team was engaged. They wanted to be helpful and it showed in all they did. When they left to head home, they were tired, but they knew they had helped us to connect the 80+ kids in our camp to Jesus and God's Word.

I've been a pastor for about 10 years and I've worked with about that many mission teams. The benefits of hosting a team go far beyond the help they provide for whatever activity the host congregation is doing. Teams bring with them enthusiasm and energy. They come

expecting to work hard and also make some memories. Hosting a team is not as easy as simply signing up on the Mission Journeys website. It involves providing food, transportation, and housing for team members, which gives the host congregation the opportunity to practice Christian hospitality. The best part of having a mission team is working together with other Christians who share a common confession and goal of sharing the gospel.

Letter from Pastor Neumann

Dear Members of St. Paul Lutheran Church,

Rose Marie, Tim, and I wish to express our heartfelt thanks and appreciation for your generous gift to help the Ukrainian Lutheran Church, in memory of our

son, David.

As you are aware, David passed away unexpectedly on Friday, December 4th, 2020. David had type 1 diabetes since third grade (he was 31 when he died). We found out the cause of death was complications due to the diabetes, called ketoacidosis.

David had wanted to, at some point, come along with me to Ukraine to visit the churches there on one of my trips. The Lord had other plans, however.

After the memorial service we had for David, which had to be limited due to COVID restrictions on gatherings, we decided to start a memorial drive to secure funds for one building, for a congregation in the ULC. Only 5 of the 17 congregations have a building that is their own. All the others rent facilities. I knew of one possibility in Tokmak of purchasing a building that could be renovated and we set our goal for that purchase.

Rose Marie and I started the fund with a gift of \$35,000 and Tim added \$5,000.00. The Lord has richly blessed our efforts and we now can say that we have funds for that one building. We knew others still wanted to give a gift so we raised our sights to help 3 congregations. This has allowed us to increase our goal from \$110,000.00 to \$250,000.00. We will keep this Memorial Fund open through 2021, or to the first anniversary of our son's passing on Dec. 4th, 2021.

With the new goal, my wife and I will add another \$10,000.00, which will put us half way there to the \$250,000.00. Praise God from whom all blessings flow!

This wholeheartedly has Synod approval, with the WELS Ukraine Committee fully informed of what we are doing. Also, I talk weekly with Bishop Horpynchuk, president of the ULC and each of these goals are with full approval of the ULC Council.

My niece, Jackie Mayer, who worked for a period of time with Jesus Cares Ministry, is excited about helping me by providing donors with updates on the use of these gifts. One of my members, Nadine, who helped put together a video, will assist her.
