"Lazarus, come out!"

We are familiar with the Gospel account of how Jesus called Lazarus, his good friend and brother of Mary and Martha, from the grave. Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days. However, that didn't stop Jesus. The raising of Lazarus was a most indisputable proof of the power Jesus had over death.

This miracle was performed by our Lord just about one month before his miraculous rising from the grave, and so it might be said that he was previewing his own resurrection. The resurrection of Lazarus also gives certainty to all who trust in Jesus that this is a preview of our own glorious rising.

Someone once said, "If Jesus had not called Lazarus by name, the whole graveyard at Bethany would have emptied its tombs." Such is the power of a word of Jesus. He speaks and the grip of death is broken. At the Last Day, the Scripture says, "all who are in their graves will hear his voice and come out."

Think of the scene at Bethany when at the command of the Lord Jesus, Lazarus came walking out of the tomb that had held his dead, decaying body for four days. It's an astounding picture, especially as we visualize him with the graveclothes still bound about him.

Now, transfer the picture to the Day of Judgment and imagine, if you can, the millions of graves in the world opening at the same time and all the bodies coming out alive. From the smallest, oldest cemetery to the battle field to the depths of the ocean, the dead will rise and will come before Jesus for Judgment, summoned by his voice.

There is at least one important difference between our rising on the Last Day and the rising of Lazarus. Lazarus was raised from the dead to continue this life until the natural processes of death took over again. We shall be raised in a glorified body that cannot die again. We see something of that difference indicated by the graveclothes in the resurrect of Lazarus and of Jesus. Lazarus, still in his earthly body, came out of the tomb struggling with the clothes still binding him. Jesus, in his glorified body, rose free from the graveclothes which remained in their place where he had laid. The glorified body will not be hindered by earthly things as our earthly bodies would be. We shall have glorified bodies eternally free of decay and disease.

Easter guarantees us that we shall be like the Lord who will call us from the grave. We shall "see him as he is." We shall be caught up to meet him in the clouds of heaven and we shall live with him forever. Death and grave will no longer threaten our well-being. Joy and thanksgiving will fill our lives. It will be a wonderful day for us when the Lord will shout for all the dead to come out.

The beautiful account of the raising of Lazarus is recorded in John 11. Read this comfort-filled preview of our own resurrection from the dead.

The victory is ours, now and forever. Easter is more than a day. It is an entire joyful season. The six solemn weeks of Lent are eclipsed by seven weeks of unbridled joy. These seven weeks correspond to the period of fifty days on the Jewish calendar between Passover and Pentecost. The Church reserves its highest praise for the Easter season. We do not merely watch from the sidelines as Christ marches in victory over sin, death, Satan, and hell. We join in the festal procession!

A message from Deborah Witte, Zambia, Africa:

My husband Dan and I, along with our youngest son, Drew, moved to Lusaka, Zambia, in December 2019, to teach and learn from our Christian brothers and sisters in ministry in Lutheran churches across Africa. Dan directs degree programs for national pastors who are seeking formal continuing education. We both interact with the Lutheran Church of Central Africa seminary students and their wives to exchange language and cultural training. As Paul says in Romans 1, we are 'mutually encouraged by each other's faith.' It is a blessing to serve alongside these faithful servants of the gospel.

We are proud of the 2020 Lutheran Church of Central Africa (LCCA) vicar graduates and their wives. These eight men have completed three years of study at the LCCA Lutheran Bible Institute in Lilongwe, Malawi, followed by three years of seminary at the LCCA Seminary in Lusaka, Zambia. Graduation Day is not only the day they finish their formal seminary training, but it is also the day they receive their vicar assignments. After one year of

vicaring, these men will receive their full-time call into pastoral ministry within the Lutheran Church of Central Africa. Their assignments are made within their home countries.

My husband and I have six children. Five live in the US, and Drew (age 13) lives here in Zambia. Our high-school aged son Donovan (age 16) remained in the US due to health conditions that require medications not available here. Our oldest daughter, Deanna, graduated in 2019 from the University of South Florida, where she earned her master's degree in medical studies. Our other children are Danae, married in July 2020 in Chicago (due to Covid-19 and international travel restrictions we were not able to attend her wedding), David, who works in Melbourne, FL, and Daria, who is a sophomore at Wheaton College in the western suburbs of Chicago. We miss them all terribly, and we thank God for how well He cares for them.
