# He Is Risen: Living the Resurrection Today

Consider a seed planted in the ground. It appears lifeless, buried beneath the soil. But in time, it sprouts, grows, and blossoms into something beautiful. Similarly, Jesus' death and resurrection demonstrate that what seems like the end can be a new beginning. In our own lives, God can bring growth and renewal out of our trials and hardships.

Early on that first Easter morning, a group of women approached Jesus' tomb, carrying spices and heavy hearts. They expected to find a sealed grave and a lifeless body. Instead, they encountered an empty tomb and two angels who proclaimed, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen!" (Lk. 24:5–6). This moment changed everything. The resurrection of Jesus is not just a historical event; it is the cornerstone of our faith and the source of our hope.

The resurrection assures us that death does not have the final word. In our community, where we face challenges like illness, loss, and uncertainty, the empty tomb reminds us that God brings life out of death and hope out of despair. When we feel overwhelmed by the difficulties of life, we can find comfort in knowing that Jesus has overcome the grave.

The disciples initially struggled to believe the women's report of the empty tomb. Their skepticism reflects our own doubts and questions. Yet, the resurrection invites us to trust in God's power, even when we don't fully understand. In our faith community, we support one another in times of doubt, reminding each other of God's promises and the truth of the resurrection.

The resurrection calls us to live transformed lives. As followers of the risen Christ, we are empowered to love, serve, and forgive. In our daily interactions, we can embody the hope of the resurrection by extending grace to others, standing up for justice, and sharing the good news of Jesus. Our actions become a testimony to the living Christ.

The resurrection of Jesus is not just a past event; it is a present reality that transforms our lives. As we navigate the joys and struggles of life, let us remember that we serve a risen Savior who offers us hope, peace, and purpose. May we live each day in the light of the resurrection, sharing its power and promise with those around us.

**Easter Series – Because He Lives** (Continued): It is easy to become so engrossed in the details of historical events—who, when, where—that we miss their significance. For example,

consider World War II. There are many compelling stories. Lots of dates and data to remember. However, for a moment, set all that aside, and just imagine the Allies had lost. How would the world be different today? What would life be like for those of Jewish heritage? Would freedom exist in Europe? Would we be speaking German? With historical events, you miss out if you focus only on the details: who, when, where. You also need to focus what that historical event means. The Allies won. That means something!

In this season of Easter, it is good we review the details: who, when, where. That reminds us that the resurrection of Christ is not fairytale or fable. It is a historical event. . . the historical event. However, we do ourselves a disservice if we simply recall the historic details of Easter without thinking long and hard about Easter's significance. Jesus won. That means something! It is our privilege and pleasure to use the fifty days of Easter to discuss this fact: because he lives, not only is our eternity secure, but we have abundant resources to face the present.

# **2025 Facility Improvement Proposals**

The Council will present 4 facility improvements at the April 29 Voter's meeting. Please plan to attend. Some items were on hold as we considered a new school. A decision has been reached to continue using our school building and not expand. However, there are renovations and improvements needed over the coming years. Keep in mind that although our school is in excellent condition, it is 70 years old! These are the projects needed now, with more to follow.

We have a strong funding plan to pay for all the proposed work this year. In addition, special funds have been opened for each project, and members can contribute directly if desired. **Voters will be asked to approve these proposals.** 

**Project 1.** Replace the original interior school doors with new doors to meet security and accessibility codes. New classroom doors will have 3" X 33" vertical windows and locksets that are always locked from the hallway to improve security. The doors will have closers and metal kickplates, as they do now. The internal entrance doors, gym doors, and kitchen doors will also be replaced to improve security and meet emergency egress codes. This investment is long overdue and will be welcomed by families and staff as we demonstrate our commitment to school safety and accessibility. **Cost \$38,918** 

**Project 2.** Replace the carpeting in the kindergarten room with new LVP plank flooring. This is requested help

children with allergies. (It is our only carpeted classroom.) A solid surface floor will be dust free, and its durability is well suited to a classroom environment. Keeping it clean and stain free will not be an issue. The existing carpet is ten years old. **Cost \$8,964** 

**Project 3.** Repave the parking lot. The parking lot and striping are in very poor condition. The solution is to excavate the surface, regrade the base adding gravel if needed, repave with a new 3.5" layer of asphalt, and restripe. This has been needed for several years but was delayed primarily due to our school replacement study. It didn't make sense to spend money on the parking lot until decisions were made. **Cost \$83,500** 

Project 4. ECC Room Dividers and Building Code Compliance. Our ECC has been in operation since 2015 and expanded three years ago. We are at full capacity. Our ECC director developed a plan with the Properties Committee to divide the 3K room to enable several more children to be enrolled. This is important to families with multiple children. Without this project some families will likely have to move as we won't have space for all their children. Because this project will increase revenue, the cost will be paid for in less than a year. The second part of this project is adding doors to staff areas in the ECC rooms. At the last city safety inspection, it was determined the current child gates are not in compliance with egress codes. Removing the gates and adding the doors will remedy this problem. We will also add two sound control windows to lower the noise between the adjoining rooms. Cost \$13,000

# **LWMS News**

**All women of St. Paul are invited!** St. Paul LWMS will meet in the church basement on Thursday, May 15<sup>th</sup>, at 6:30 PM. Please come and learn how our congregation supports missionaries and their families. We will be voting on candidates for the National LWMS Board of Directors as well as world and home mission projects for 2025/2026. LWMS meets four times throughout the year. After a break during the summer months, we will meet again on Thursday, September 18<sup>th</sup>.

**Befriend a Mission Program:** LWMS women love supporting missions and the missionaries who serve at them. One way this is apparent is through the Befriend A Mission program (BAM). Each of the 60 circuits, plus the non-circuit member congregations and the individual members, receive at least one home mission and one world mission to befriend over a two-year period. The women of the circuit pray for the mission and missionary, send cards of encouragement, and sometimes send gifts to support special projects or gifts simply to show love to the missionary and family. Over the next few months, we will be providing information about each of our new

2025-2026 BAM families. We continue to supply greeting cards for you to send to our BAM families. You can find them in the quilted pocket located on the LWMS bulletin board in the church basement.

A message from World Missionary Joel Hoff, TELL Network, One Africa:

Our family arrived in Zambia on March 1, 2023. Our first year was a whirlwind of transition and change. The Lord allowed new adventures, experiences, challenges, and blessings to enrich our lives each day. I joined the One Africa Team as the TELL (Think, Evaluate, Learn, and Lead) Network Missionary to Africa. TELL is an e-Learning program that teaches simple truths from God's Word that can be shared with others. My work includes online instruction and counsel to students as they train to be TELL Growth Development Leaders. There are currently students in 25 different countries throughout Africa. During my first year, I was able to visit national church partner leaders and/or TELL students in Cameroon, Nigeria, Kenya, Uganda, Malawi, Zambia, and South Africa. It has been a blessing to meet in-person the smiling faces that I have studied online. Some students are members of the Lutheran Church who desire to study God's Word and share Jesus with others. Many come from various religious backgrounds and, by God's grace, are receiving biblical training from theologically trained TELL instructors. We pray the Lord will bless their continued studies and efforts to tell others what they have learned.
