Time to Grow

Jesus said, "Listen! A farmer went out to sow his seed. As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. Some fell on rocky places, where it did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly, because the soil was shallow. But when the sun came up, the plants were scorched, and they withered because they had no root. Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up and choked the plants, so that they did not bear grain. Still other seed fell on good soil. It came up, grew and produced a crop, some multiplying thirty, some sixty, some a hundred times" (Mark 4:3-8).

Songwriters have used it. Thinkers have used it. Investors have used it. You probably have used it yourself. Even Jesus Christ used it. Used what? They used the picture of planting seeds to make a point. Jesus told a story about planting seeds. Recorded for us in Mark 4:3-8, this simple story speaks volumes for our lives.

Jesus teaches us that seeds are being planted in hearts at worship services each Sunday. That's also what is happening in a children's Sunday school lesson—seeds are being planted in their hearts. That's what is happening when you learn what the Bible teaches—seeds are being planted in your own heart.

They are being planted by God through his Word.

Seeds need time to grow. In springtime, when gardens are first planted, there's not much to see. Yet, as every gardener knows, when it comes to seeds, it takes time. As sunlight warms the moist earth where seeds are embedded, seeds take time to sprout and grow.

Sometimes, a person checks out a church one Sunday and decides not to go back. But that's not much time to let the seeds sown that Sunday grow, is it?

Sometimes, people are glad to attend a particular Bible class or workshop at a church. But when it is done, they lose interest. In a way, they are like a child who excitedly plants a seed in a foam cup and waters it

regularly. But a couple of days later, the child forgets about it, and the seed dries up.

Sometimes a person goes to worship regularly so that the seeds of God's Word start to grow, but then he lets the cares of life grow up like thorns. They crowd out time for the Word, and so the planting of faith in his soul gets the life choked out of it.

But sometimes, an amazing thing happens. The person keeps coming back to hear the Word. And the seeds grow and keep growing. The plant of faith is made strong by God's complete forgiveness won by Jesus. It flourishes under God's unconditional love given in Jesus and is made resilient by heaven's guarantee paid for by Jesus.

This summer, let God continue to plant the seed of his Word in your heart. Worship with us Sundays at 8:00 a.m. & 9:30 a.m. (May 25 - August 31) and Mondays at 6:00 p.m. Subscribe to have a WELS Devotion delivered to your email inbox. Read through a book of the Bible this summer in small chunks and ask Martin Luther's 4 Bible Study Questions: What does this Bible lesson teach me to do? What does it teach me to be thankful for? LWMS News

New Befriend a Missionary Assignments: One of the ways LWMS serves missionaries is through the Befriend A Mission Program (BAM). Each circuit receives at least one home mission and one world mission to befriend over a two-year period. We will be sharing information about each of our new 2025-2026 BAM missions and missionaries over the next few months.

World Missionary: Our World Missionary is Pastor Timothy Matthies II. He works with the Asia-Oceania Team. The Asia-Oceania Team is made up of 17 missionaries serving 18 different countries throughout Asia and Oceania. The team—with members in Thailand, Hong Kong, the Philippines, and Australia—partners with God's people to equip, encourage, and empower others to bring the good news of Jesus Christ to the billions still lost in darkness. The Asia-Oceania Team explores new mission opportunities, supports existing sister synods, and trains current and future leaders for service in their churches through Asia Lutheran Seminary.

Asia Lutheran Seminary (ALS), the regional seminary for Asia and Oceania, trains Christian leaders by equipping students to reach out, disciple believers, train leaders, and multiply groups for the advancement of God's kingdom. ALS offers a comprehensive evangelist through pastor-level training program, ranging from certificate courses to a Master of Divinity degree.

Initially focused on Chinese-speaking students, ALS has now expanded its reach to serve students across Asia and Oceania. A partnership with Multi-Language Production's TELL Network has expanded ALS into new, unreached areas. The Regional Theological Education Program (RTEP) collaborates with sister churches throughout Asia and Oceania to ensure consistent training through consultation, curriculum development, and visiting instructors.

Pastor Matthies was called to the Asia-Oceania Team in 2019 to serve as a professor for Asia Lutheran Seminary. He teaches courses in the areas of Old Testament, Hebrew, and the Lutheran Confessions. He previously served at Cross of Glory Lutheran Church in Washington, Mich., from 2015-2019.

Matthies married his wife, Rachel, in 2013, and they have two children: Irene and Zadok. The family resides in Hong Kong.

A message from Home Missionary Caleb Schultz, Cross of Life, ON, Canada:

Early in its history, Cross of Life Lutheran Church focused on getting as many people as possible in the doors. Outreach at all costs! Such is the life of a mission start. But now, our 24-year old congregation has started to focus on nurturing deeply discipled relationships with Jesus, and the Spirit is producing fruit. Take Matthew for

example. A few years ago, he would have described himself as an atheist. But he started exploring our church after seeing one of our YouTube videos. He went on a 3year-long journey of studying Scripture regularly with me, asking tough guestions, and wrestling with truth. He and his sister were recently confirmed at Cross of Life! Or take Will for another example. A long-time member of Cross of Life, in the last few years he has taken amazing strides in being a spiritual leader. He teachers the gospel to his family, recites psalms with his children, engages his non-Christian friends in spiritual conversations, and has organized and facilitated a men's group where brothers in Christ study the catechism and discuss how to lead their families. He also serves as our church president. All this makes sense, since our Lord did not tell us, 'Go and get lots of people in the doors, gather large crowds, make lots of converts.' No, he tells us, 'Go and make disciples.' We believe this is our call, and we are seeing the fruit.

We are very close to the end of the 3K/4K school year with a graduation service taking place on May 20th and the last day of the school year is May 22nd. We are in the process of welcoming one new full time staff member and two-part time cleaners to our ECC family. In a couple of weeks will say goodbye to some of our families as they move on to kindergarten in the fall at their neighborhood school or church school. We will also be welcoming several new families for the first time!

With the recent voters' approval of a room expansion/code compliance project, the ECC is also preparing for some work to begin in June. By August, we will be able to take on 8 additional students, allowing us to better meet the needs of our growing families and welcome a couple of new families into the ECC. We are currently hiring new staff to fill the roles being created by opening a new room.
