### **Instructions**

Write the memory verse on the board. Recite the verse together. Choose a student to come up to the board and erase one or two words at a time. Have the class recite the entire verse each time another word is erased. Continue erasing words and reciting until all of the words are gone. Then ask students to try reciting the whole verse without any words left on the board.

### **Instructions**

Print the Memory Verse Poster. Write one or two words from the memory verse on index cards. Make one set of verse cards for each team.

Review the verse with the class using the Memory Verse Poster. Divide the class into teams. Randomly lay out each set of index cards facedown on the floor—one set for each team. Put a piece of poster putty or tape on each card.

Have teams line up away from the cards. When the relay begins, the first student in each line will race to the cards, pick one up, and put it on the wall or board. As the relay continues, students will put each card on the board in the proper order. They may need to rearrange the cards to fit others. Allow students to use the Memory Verse Poster for help.

When finished, have the class read the verse cards aloud together.

# Christmas Bingo

### **Materials**

Word cards (following page)
Bingo sheets (following pages)
Container for word cards
Small wrapped candies, such as Hershey's <sup>®</sup> Kisses to use for markers (enough for a handful per student)

### **Instructions**

Print enough Bingo sheets for each student to have one; use all four sheets for variety. Print and cut out three copies of the word cards and put into a container.

Pass out a handful of candies to each student. Draw word cards one at a time from the container and announce what it says. Students will use a candy to mark **one** matching picture on their Bingo sheet.

Continue playing as time allows or until someone gets a complete row filled in on their sheet and shouts "Merry Christmas!"

### **Suggested Discussion**

Christmas is a wonderful time of year! There are many things we love about Christmas. Many of those things are on your Bingo sheets.

## Gift Go-Round

### **Materials**

Several boxes from small to large that will fit inside each other
Gift wrap
Tape
Candies/small prizes
Christmas music

### **Instructions**

Put enough candies or prizes for each student into the smallest box. Wrap the box and set it inside the next larger box then wrap that box and set it inside the next larger box. Continue until the largest box is wrapped with the others nested inside of it.

Have students sit in a circle. Turn on the music and have students pass the gift around. Pause the music. Whoever is holding the gift when the music stops will open only the outside box. Continue randomly playing and stopping the music and having students unwrap each box until the box with the candies/prizes is unwrapped. Have students share the contents while you move on to the Suggested Discussion.

### **Suggested Discussion**

**?** How many of you were really hoping there was something special inside all those boxes? Show of hands.

# Hope Wreath Ornament


### **Materials**

Hope Circle cards (following page) printed on colored card stock
Wide-mouth canning jar lids (not rings)
Glue
Scissors
Green, red, and white ¾-inch pom-poms
Narrow ribbon cut in 8-inch lengths
Optional: small Christmas decorations (i.e., berries, beads, holly leaves, mini pinecones, etc.)

### **Instructions**

Print the Hope Circle cards on colored card stock and cut out one card for each student. Have students trim around their circle and glue it onto the jar lid.

Next, make a loop with the ribbon and glue the two ends together at the top edge on the front of the lid (the ribbon ends won't show). Lay the loop out of the way.



### **Suggested Discussion**

**?** What is the message on these wreath ornaments? Jesus is our hope!

When you hang up your ornament at home, think about what we learned in our lesson today. God is eternal, so he has always known that Jesus would be the Savior who would come to earth, live a perfect life, then die on the cross to take the punishment for our sin.
