A Bicentennial Moment

In anticipation of Mulberry's upcoming Bicentennial Celebration in 2026, the Leonard Hill Cochran Historical Room presents a moment of Mulberry history:

A brief history about the building of Mulberry's first church and its founders

Prior to 1821, Fort Hawkins and the settlement around it stood guard on the western frontier of Georgia. In 1821, a treaty with the Indians opened the land west of the Ocmulgee to the Flint River for settlement. The legislature created Bibb and adjacent counties, and named the town Macon. In 1823 at the request of Rep. Tarpley Holt and one Thomas Gardner, an act was passed setting aside 2 acres for a Methodist Episcopal Church. The chosen site was located on the west side of First St. at Mulberry, outside the city limits, a wooded lot with a stream running nearby.

At the same time, Thomas Gardner was holding religious services at the Court House which wasn't much more than a shanty. Preaching regularly, he gathered together 8 men and 13 women. There was a Methodist mission at Forsyth and it possible that a preacher came from there occasionally. However, there is no record of such and by 1826, Gardner and his followers had formed a Methodist Society.

Gardner applied his skills as a carpenter to the building of the church which was completed in 1828. It was a frame building 60' by 40' with a balcony which was used by the slaves and a belfry on top. Possibly there were two doors, as was the custom in many churches, for men and women who sat on opposite sides. In 1827 a notice appeared in the newspaper thanking the citizens of Bibb County for their contributions of the \$86.57 to the building of a House of Prayer, then referred to as "The Macon Church".
