A WORD FROM OUR PASTOR

Leadership at Woodlawn is changing, is it for the better? We are moving to a two-tier model of leadership. This means our church will have two sets of leaders, or two leadership offices within the church, namely, Elders and Deacons (1 Tim. 3). The role of each of these offices is crucial to our ability to rightly follow Christ. My hope is to give a "job description" of sorts for each of these offices in modern parlance with an eye toward application within Woodlawn.

Elders are most easily understood and defined by understanding three synonymous titles given to their position: shepherd (pastor), elder, and overseer (used synonymously and interchangeably in Acts 20 and 1 Peter 5). Shepherd (the Latin form of this word is where we get the term "pastor") is the most common portrait presented in the Bible for faithful leadership of God's people. The image of God's people being shepherded by appointed members of the community is found in both the Old and New Testaments. Shepherds are called to guide God's people toward a more faithful relationship with him. They are called to do this by modeling, caring, protecting, and loving. Shepherds are to be models for God's people as faithful followers of Christ. Each shepherd should strive to echo the words of Paul, "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ" (1 Cor. 11:1). Caring for the congregation certainly includes physical concerns, but the Bible places a premium upon the souls of each believer being cared for by the shepherd (Heb. 13:17). Protecting the people of God is especially necessary in light of false Christians who would seek to lead people away from the faith (Acts 20:29-31). And finally loving God's people through every experience of life is the heart of a true shepherd (2 Cor. 2:4).

Shepherding should also contain an "elder-ing" component. The term elder connotes the idea of one who will give counsel. The specific form of counsel in view is the application of God's Word to the lives of his people (Titus 1:9; 2 Tim. 4:1-5).

Elders are also called to be overseers. Overseeing was a term often used to describe the person who would manage a farm or vineyard. The management of the church does not primarily speak to administration issues, although these would be affected. More to the point, Overseers are called to make sure every aspect of the church faithfully follows the true Shepherd, Jesus.

The role of Elder is contrasted then with Deacon in that deacons come under elder oversight and serve a different function for the church. They are tasked with giving support to the elders and guidance to specific church ministries. In Acts 6:1-6, deacons are appointed for the first time ever in order to give direction to the most prominent church ministry recorded in the pages of the New Testament. The ministry at hand was caring for the widows in the congregation. The care for widows in the church in Jerusalem was misguided, therefore the elders (who also were known as Apostles at that time) asked the congregation to appoint godly men who could give guidance to the widow ministry. The initial establishment of deacons within the church led to a flourishing of the gospel: "And the word of God continued to increase, and the number of the disciples multiplied greatly in Jerusalem" (Acts 6:7). God used the faithful ministry of these men as a catalyst for gospel effectiveness. We therefore have sought to model our deacon ministry after this description in Acts 6. Each deacon at Woodlawn is tasked with faithfully guiding specific ministries of the church.

In some respects, the church leadership model in the New Testament is simple - only two offices. But we believe by closely following this model our church is honoring God through faithful obedience.

"Trust in Him at all times, O people; pour out your heart before Him; God is a refuge for us." Psalms 62:8

The scripture above encourages us to pray by simply pouring out our heart to God. Scripture states God is a *refuge* for us, a place of safety or shelter. However, that scripture begins with *trust in Him*. Therefore, our prayers must start with trust in the One to whom we are pouring out our heart. He is the One who makes differences! As we head into the unknowns of a new school year, let God be the source of our hope and confidence as we trust in Him. We can begin to make differences through prayer as suggested below.

Please join others in prayer for students, administration, and teachers as the school year begins. Consider the following seven prayer prompts.

- Strength for students who stand for Christ at their schools
- Salvation opportunities for nonbelievers
- Modeling of godly character and principles by believers on campus
- Safety on campus and at school functions
- Nurturing and respectful family relationships for students
- Wisdom for staff in daily classroom challenges including those involving health concerns
- Diligence by students and educators for academic achievement

Author and prayer leader, Stormie Omartian, writes, "When we don't pray, it's like sitting on the sidelines watching our children in a war zone getting shot at from every angle. When we do pray, we're in the battle alongside them, appropriating God's power on their behalf." Remember, time in prayer is well spent!



Hero or Zero: Simone Biles

I am a sports nut. I love to watch all kinds of sports on tv. This month the Olympics were on so I watched a lot of different sports. I loved watching the young girl from China demolish the high dive world record. It was absolutely spectacular to watch. The control she had during the dive and without a splash was amazing. I also watched a sport I played in high school - badminton. This version is not your backyard summer fun hitting a plastic shuttlecock with a really badly strung racket,

but a real sport. The women's rugby 7's final was really excellent and fun to watch. One sport I never understood is race walking. With so many sports and so many athletes during this Olympics, one woman's name stood out above the rest: Simone Biles. She was expected to easily dominate women's gymnastics and win 5 gold medals, possibly 6. She had not lost the women's all-around competition in 8 years. She has 4 gymnastic moves named after her. At the first event of the team competition, Simone botched her vault attempt. Shortly after that she withdrew from the competition. Listening to sports radio and reading various sports blogs the reaction was mixed. Some supported her decision, considering it a courageous move. Others lambasted her for choking under pressure and were unmerciful in saying that she quit on her team. It is an interesting contrast to the missionary I mentioned in last month's article - Eric Liddell. He withdrew from his best event due to his convictions about running on a Sunday. He faced similar scrutiny. Imagine the uproar that it would cause today. We learned that she had a condition known in the gymnastics world as the "twisties" where a gymnast loses their orientation in the air. For Simone and the difficult moves she does, it was dangerous to continue competing. She eventually was able to compete several days later and won a bronze medal on the balance beam.


So, what does this have to do with missions? I consider missions a team sport. Missionaries are like the Simone Biles of our missions team. They are the ones who are going on a difficult mission. Many times, they face an unknown future and incredibly difficult situations in a foreign land as they do missions work that we can't or won't do. What happens when they face hardships and have to come home? What happens if month after month they labour and have no thrilling results to tell us, like no baptisms? What happens if they get thrown in jail for preaching? Would we at Woodlawn consider our missionaries chokers or quitters under pressure, or would we continue to support them? As part of the great commission, we are told to 'go'. We can either 'go', 'send' or disobey. Missionaries 'go' for us. However, missionaries require a team. They need a team to support them in many ways. Our prayers, encouragement, and financial support make it possible. Churches are to be reliable in their support of missions. We can see this in Paul's ministry in Phil 4:16,18a. In these verses Paul was supported in Corinth, Thessalonica, and he was supported even when he was in prison. Let us at Woodlawn continue to support our missionaries in the good and not so good times, thus fulfilling the call of the great commission.



The Pates in Brazil


