A WORD FROM OUR ELDERS

Do you approach church more like a marriage or fast-food? There are largely two ways to look at church, the first is very similar to cereals at the grocery store. We want a church that has all the right ingredients for what we need and appreciate. The following is a list of church ingredients, see if these are the ingredients that matter to you: teach the Bible as God's Word, lead people to faithfully share the gospel in their community and around the world, seek to disciple the next generation, provide an opportunity for authentic Christian community, worship music on Sunday that richly communicates the truths of Scripture, and opportunities to serve in meaningful ministries. Would you add anything else to this list? The list sounds so good, and is filled with critical godly attributes, but finding a church that has all these things can still cause us to miss the point. The problem is the Bible's insistence that if you approach church in this manner your heart is probably hardened by sin.

Even if we improve upon the list of ingredients the issue is the same; church is one of the products and services we consume. Take marriage as an example, a young person looking for the right characteristics in a spouse will often site similar things: Christian, you complement each other well, you are good friends, attracted to them, etc. A few years down the road in marriage and the person says, my spouse no longer has the ingredients I am looking for in a husband or wife. At that point do they say, I have fallen out of love and I am no longer happy, so I am going to find someone else? It is at this point (one virtually all marriages come to) when you find out if the couple believes marriage is consumer relationship or an *actual covenant commitment - where the good of the relationship supersedes the good of the individual*.

David Brooks, speaking to Christian college presidents, described the correlation between covenant relationships and the formation of our nature in Christ well.

"For most of us, our inner nature is formed by that kind of covenant, in which the good of the relationship takes place and precedence over the good of the individual. For all of us ... life doesn't come from how well you keep your options open but how well you close them off and realize a higher freedom."

It is in the covenant commitments of marriage - "I'm going to be here through thick and thin" - by which God makes you a better version of yourself. Because it is in this environment that the other person can point out a flaw or give unsolicited advice without chasing you off. And you know that if you are going to value the relationship you will have to address their concern.

This concept of covenant commitment is the basis for Hebrews 3:12-14:

"Take care, brothers, lest there be in any of you an evil, unbelieving heart, leading you to fall away from the living God. But exhort one another every day, as long as it is called 'today,' that none of you may be hardened by the deceitfulness of sin. For we have come to share in Christ, if indeed we hold our original confidence firm to the end."

The key warning in the passage - "leading you to fall away from the living God." We are able to avoid falling away from the living God by the exhortation of one another. To be exhorted is to be urged or challenged by other people to operate in a manner different than you currently behave. Because *deceitful sin will only be addressed by unsolicited advice*. This does not come from a consumer relationship but a covenant one.

For instance, if I love going to Chick-Fila because of their waffle fries, but one day they explain that I should really refrain from the fries and enjoy a fruit cup instead. They go on to tell me I clearly need to watch my diet. I will respond, "how dare you comment on my weight. I am not paying you to be a health instructor, I am paying you to be food choices, either give me the fries (a large please) or I am going somewhere else."

So, although I may need to be challenged or urged to modify my diet, I feel that they have no right to make such a statement to me. I am not going to stick around an establishment that tries to tell me how to live, because they are there to serve me fast food!

Hebrews 3 is premised on the idea that you have a covenant commitment, similar in nature to marriage, to a local church. Where they can get to know you well enough to offer actual exhortation regarding sin and hardening. It is only when we value the relationship with other people in our church more than our own self-interest that we will receive unsolicited advice. It is only when I desire to stay in a committed relationship with a local church, that I will feel the right pressure to consider someone's concern.

WBC PRAYER FOCUS

WBC PRAYER MINISTRY:

"Prayer Matters"

"Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in Your sight, O Lord, my Rock and my Redeemer."

Psalm 19:14

February focus for many is the idea of hearts and love. As Christians, we often reflect on two truths from the Bible during February.

- 1. The truth presented by the sacrificial love of our Redeemer for us demonstrated in the Old Testament (Isaiah 53:5-7) and the New Testament (Romans 5:8).
- 2. David is spoken of as "a man after God's own heart" in both the Old Testament (1 Samuel 13:14) and the New Testament (Acts 13:22).

David lived before Christ's sacrifice on the cross was made visible, however, he knew scripture and talked with God often. He is thought to have written many of the Psalms himself. David was a devoted follower of God. He wrote often of his love for scripture, its benefits, guidance, and truths for living. Psalm 103 is filled with praise and awe and thanksgiving to the Lord. It appears to be written out of a heart which must love God deeply. Perhaps, revealing the writer, David, to be "a man after God's own heart."

In Psalm 19:14, we see part of David's heart revealed in his desire that his words and meditations (thoughts and reflections) be acceptable to God. David's path for being that "man after God's own heart" came through him spending time building a relationship with God and his desire to know and to do as God instructed – including living in faith that God was faithful and true to the promises David learned from the scripture he studied and truths learned about God's character from scriptures of God's steadfast love, mercies, forgiveness, etc. These truths from scripture and David's many times of pursuit of God in both times of adoration or struggle, grew him to be a man who believed God in faith and sought God as his Lord. . and his Rock and Redeemer. David's desire for pleasing God was his love for God revealed through his pursuit of relationship with God because of his belief in God's love for him. Scripture teaches us of God's steadfast love – David believed it. And, Christ proved it, on the cross.

As we regularly read scripture and think about God's love, we see even more how worthy HE is of our praise! It will fuel our prayer lives for one another and others, affect our daily words and meditations, and likely deepen our heart relationship with our Lord and with others!

"The good person out of the good treasure of his heart produces good, and the evil person out of his evil treasure produces evil, for out of the abundance of the heart his mouth speaks."








Friendships

One of the things I find interesting and yet also dispiriting is the fact that most men have many acquaintances but very few if any real friends. Their conversations are superficial, brief, and without real meaning. For the most part men are spiritually fed, but relationally bankrupt. This is regretful and can be counter-intuitive by not serving a useful function within the body as few men have close friendships in the church.

One thing that is expressed over and over again through survey's, mens questionnaires, and groups dealing with men's fellowship is that the greatest need of men today is close friendships among men. This need for close, trusted relationships with other men proves to be a compelling need amongst most men, regardless of race or culture. Men are looking for brothers in the spiritual sense that will become real, true and long time best friend relationships.

In spite of what is believed about men, there is a great need among brothers who will come alongside to encourage, exhort, and love them. By this each one through this Godly, Biblical relationship will see hope in their own lives and the innate need to turn to that relationship for help in times of difficulty. This is what Jesus meant when he spoke these words: "34 A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. 35 By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:34-35)

Encouragement, exhortation, and love kindle hope. Mature men labor together in God's kingdom by taking this hope to his family, his friends, and this world.

Men struggle with this role in leadership despite the clear mandate to "love one another," most men have a difficult time having genuine relationships in the church. And yet when quizzed many would say that they would love to have friends with whom they can count - brothers that truly matter! A response by Pat Morley, in his book "Man in the Mirror, is helpful and offers a list of questions that are practical and timely in our quest for the definition of a quality man-to-man relationship.

- 1. When things go badly, to whom do you talk?
- 2. With whom can you be totally honest?
- 3. Who will listen to you?
- 4. From whom would you take advice?

- 5. When you fail, who will stand by you?
- 6. With whom do you face life's struggles?
- 7. Who is your confidant?
- 8. Who holds you accountable?

If men are to become successful in ministry they must develop a system that will guide them in making lasting and significant friendships. Without this men are fated to continue feeling lonely, isolated and without hope. If we are to build a biblical ministry to men we must focus our time in relationships that matter and not just the program and their ministry involvement.

(Ecclesiastes 4:9-10)

A Biblical "Men's Ministry" is developed by God's Word, lived through the Word of God, and cultivated within the people of God.

Factors to consider for Missionary Homes Part One

Just like everyone else missionaries must consider the type of housing they will live in. A large variety of personal choices go into selecting a home. Some missionaries I have met have

lived in housing that is maybe too nice to live in compared to those they are trying to reach. Others go hardcore and live in dirt floor huts and eat bugs. Even the locals would frown upon it. After some time on the mission field, it is usually best to let the missionary struggle with this balance as they get to know the people they will reach. The picture above was the headquarters for our missions board in the capital Edinburgh. The top floor was where the local missionary/director lived. The middle floor had several rooms where missionaries would stay for short visits. For longer visits or new missionaries, they would stay on the ground floor. The ground floor had a kitchen. The new missionaries would stay there until they decided where they would serve. We stayed there quite often. The front of the ground floor was a film studio. The coolest thing about this house was the mahogany staircase with long banisters. I always wanted to slide down the banisters but was never allowed. For our own family choices, we lived in three different houses over our 11-year career. During our first term, we rented a house across the street from the missionaries we were replacing. In our second term, we rented what is called a council house. Our rent went to the town council. It is similar but a little bit more upscale than what we would call the projects. Both of these houses were in the same town as our work and only a few miles from the church. In our third term, we bought a house for several reasons. One reason is that we had moved from Hawick to Glasgow which is more centrally located. My dad's focus had changed from church planting to becoming a fill-in missionary. He filled in for other missionaries when they needed to go home as he was now an experienced missionary. This was needed as several works had fallen into disarray when the missionary left for a period of time. From Glasgow, he oversaw the works in Sterling, Paisley, and Bishopbriggs. Picking a home is important to enable you to reach the locals with the gospel.


