A WORD FROM OUR ELDERS

Resurrection Hope for Today

1 Corinthians 15:58

[58] Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain. (ESV)

'Tis the season of resurrection hope and new life in Christ. I love the metaphorical observations that can be made in connecting the spring season with the Christian hope in the resurrection. Dead, brown lawns are beginning to sprout patches of fresh, green grass. Dormant bulbs buried beneath our hardened flower beds are sprouting forth new life with the expectation of beautiful blooms for weeks and months to come. Bluebirds and finches are chirping and swirling, looking for homes and building nests for laying eggs and hatching baby birds. Kids who have hidden indoors all winter are spilling out into backyards and fields to play the world's best game, the recreational hope of summertime, baseball. Life is all around!

When Christian's think about their hope in the resurrection, they usually think about the hope of heaven and eternal life. This certainly is our ultimate hope! But does our resurrection hope impact our lives today? Like, right now? 1 Corinthians 15 is a chapter all about resurrection hope. In this chapter, Paul lists the bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ among the truths of "first importance" in essential Christian doctrine (15:3-8). He also explains that if we believe Jesus was raised, we should also believe that ourselves and others can be raised (15:12). Then he concludes that without the truth of the resurrection of the dead Christians should be pitied for the way they choose to live their lives (15:19). Throughout the chapter he goes on to describe what bodily resurrection looks like for a believer, and that Christians should anticipate imperishable immortality (15:52-53)! Because of this hope, Paul says that the sting of death is gone. For Christians, because of their faith in Christ and his resurrection, all that death will bring is eternal victory (15:55). The last verse of the chapter is a concluding statement of application based on the Christian belief in the resurrection: "Therefore, my beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain" (15:58).

Isn't it interesting that the concluding application isn't about heaven? It is about our life here and now on earth! Why is that? Paul concludes that since we believe in the resurrection, we should be steadfast, immovable, and always abounding in the work of the Lord. Why?

Christians, our hope is not in this life. If this life is all that there is, we should scratch and claw to make it comfortable, enjoyable, easy, and breezy! But a life of faithfulness isn't an easy life. In the sermon on the mount, we are told that we are blessed when we are mourning and persecuted for the sake of our faith, among other things (Matt. 5:1-12). We are told to love our enemies and pray for those who do us wrong (Matt. 5:44). We are told to walk the hard path through the narrow gate of faithfulness and obedience to Christ (Matt. 7:13-14). This is why Paul concludes that without the hope of the resurrection the Christian life is most to be pitied.

John 12:24 teaches that a grain of wheat must fall to the earth and die before it can bring forth new, fruit-bearing life. This principle is also true of the Christian life. As we die to ourselves, our preferences, and our selfishness, we have the hope of eternal life. Not because our resurrection philosophy has become more refined and articulate, but because of our faith in the bodily resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

I pray that this spring's celebration of the resurrection will produce in you hope for *today*. That you would be steadfast, immovable, and always abounding in the work of the Lord (15:58).

Friendships

One of the things I find interesting and yet also dispiriting is the fact that most men have many acquaintances but very few if any real friends. Their conversations are superficial, brief, and without real meaning. For the most part men are spiritually fed, but relationally bankrupt. This is regretful and can be counter-intuitive by not serving a useful function within the body as few men have close friendships in the church.

One thing that is expressed over and over again through survey's, mens questionnaires, and groups dealing with men's fellowship is that the greatest need of men today is close friendships among men. This need for close, trusted relationships with other men proves to be a compelling need amongst most men, regardless of race or culture. Men are looking for brothers in the spiritual sense that will become real, true and long time best friend relationships.

In spite of what is believed about men, there is a great need among brothers who will come alongside to encourage, exhort, and love them. By this each one through this Godly, Biblical relationship will see hope in their own lives and the innate need to turn to that relationship for help in times of difficulty. This is what Jesus meant when he spoke these words: "34 A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. 35 By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." (John 13:34-35)

Encouragement, exhortation, and love kindle hope. Mature men labor together in God's kingdom by taking this hope to his family, his friends, and this world.

Men struggle with this role in leadership despite the clear mandate to "love one another," most men have a difficult time having genuine relationships in the church. And yet when quizzed many would say that they would love to have friends with whom they can count - brothers that truly matter! A response by Pat Morley, in his book "Man in the Mirror, is helpful and offers a list of questions that are practical and timely in our quest for the definition of a quality man-to-man relationship.

- 1. When things go badly, to whom do you talk?
- 2. With whom can you be totally honest?
- 3. Who will listen to you?
- 4. From whom would you take advice?

- 5. When you fail, who will stand by you?
- 6. With whom do you face life's struggles?
- 7. Who is your confidant?
- 8. Who holds you accountable?

If men are to become successful in ministry they must develop a system that will guide them in making lasting and significant friendships. Without this men are fated to continue feeling lonely, isolated and without hope. If we are to build a biblical ministry to men we must focus our time in relationships that matter and not just the program and their ministry involvement.

(Ecclesiastes 4:9-10)

A Biblical "Men's Ministry" is developed by God's Word, lived through the Word of God, and cultivated within the people of God.

Factors to consider for Missionary Homes Part Two

Just like everyone else, missionaries must think about where they will live, one such factor is access.

Missionaries don't want to necessarily be too far away or too isolated from

the people groups they are trying to reach or work with. When you move to a new area culture shock will kick in quickly. At times you may want to just hide, but being among your people group presents many gospel opportunities. It also helps to overcome the culture shock a little more quickly. In our first two mission terms, we lived and worked in a little town called Hawick. Hawick had 16,000 people. We worked mostly with children and the poorer side of town. I went to school with most of the kids. The church was only about 1.5 miles from the house so it was easy to get to. In our last term, we lived in a town called Bishopbriggs, which is a little bigger than Belmont. It is a suburb of the city of Glasgow. Glasgow is about the size of Charlotte. My father's mission had changed from church planting to being a fill-in replacement for missionaries who needed to go home, usually for an extended stay of up to a year. His time spent in Hawick gave him the necessary experience for the job. Glasgow is a major centrally located city with good highways to most major towns. My father filled in at several locations such as Bishopbriggs itself, Paisley (20 miles away), and Stirling (40 miles away).

Another factor to consider is hospitality. I could write entire novels on this subject alone. Is the home good for hospitality? Is the house comfortable for locals to visit? Is it in a good neighborhood or a sketchy neighborhood? Is the space itself efficient or frustrating for hosting? Is it too fancy or uppity for the locals to visit? Is it in a high-rise apartment? Some people may not visit due to a fear of heights. Growing up I never knew what kind of stranger would be at the house. My parents were constantly inviting people over at least for a cup of coffee. They usually stayed for a meal. How my mother managed to feed so many people with something as simple as a can of beans and a few potatoes I will never know. We would also host church services at our house. The first church services we had in Hawick we hosted at our house for several months. The church building was a small storefront set up as a printer's shop. We converted it to a church but it took time. The Bishopbriggs church rented out a gymnasium for Sunday services. On Wednesdays, we would host church at our house. I especially enjoyed having all the international students there and getting to know them. They were from all over the British Commonwealth nations. I indirectly met my wife through my parents' hospitality. Once they left the mission field they continued to work in our local church. They continued their tradition of hospitality. They invited Melissa's older sister to our house when she came to college. I got to know her and then a year later Melissa followed in her footsteps.
