A WORD FROM OUR ELDERS

The Blossom of Humility

Joseph answered Pharaoh, "It is not in me; God will give Pharaoh a favorable answer." Genesis 41:16

The very thought of being able to interpret dreams for someone would be pretty impressive. Imagine the capability to tell people what their dreams meant and even being precise as to the very details of such things. Dreams can sometimes paint pictures for us that normally we wouldn't come up with while awake, being fully caffeinated. Here in this passage, we find a fellow named Pharaoh, and he has had a dream that has horrified him. He sends for his wise men, who aren't able to interpret the dream he has had. He then quickly sends for Joseph.

The understanding of why this dream was so frightening, is that it questioned Egypt's ability to produce healthy grain, and also of the description of cattle in verses 3-7 that appeared to be very ugly in appearance. Joseph is released from prison to come and interpret this dream, but quickly received an extreme makeover in verse 14. Remember that the very action of interpretation of dreams is what landed him in a place of captivity, with his brothers, and now that very thing which had caused such devastation would bring freedom.

Joseph tells Pharaoh that seven years of hunger are on the way, and though this revelation would be frightening there would be seven years of plenty that would precede this famine. Joseph's life shows us that God's plan and provision always meets our needs, and thus we only succeed by the grace that He provides for faithful service. These events that were completely outside of Joseph's power, now he could stand before Pharaoh and speak such wisdom that God provides.

Do you see how humility came about in Joseph's life? Maybe the posture of where he saw the need to place trust in God and not focus on the frustration of the environment. There are many issues and troubles we all face in this life; but be reminded of the control that God has in the instance of where things appear to be completely out of control. Joseph's life sure had some mishaps, and even in those instances there was divine arrangements being orchestrated that brought forth the greatness of God. 1 Corinthians 15:10 Paul states "by the grace of God I am what I am." We are limited in our own capabilities and strengths, and we may not be able to interpret dreams for kings, but we are humbled by the King of kings who knows best for us.

The Case for Men's Ministry

As a church leader, we must be convinced that men's ministry is essential to the vitality of the church. So, why target men? Why is men's ministry significant to a church – to the Church?

Current Issues

Men in our society – even Christian men – are taught subjective qualities, attributes, or characteristics considered typical of or appropriate to a man. They are continually deceived about their masculinity.

Alexander Mitserlisch says that, "Society has torn the soul of the male, and into this tear the demons have fled – the demons of insecurity, selfishness and despair. Consequently, men do not know who they are as men. Rather, they define themselves by what they do, who they know, or by what they own."

Men have colleagues and work buddies, golf partners, and maybe a "couple" friend or two, where the bond is really between the wives. If they say they do have a best friend, often it turns out to be an old friend whom they see or speak to once every few years. Sadly, for most men in our culture male friendship is a part of their distant past. This leaves men feeling isolated. Studies show that most men past the age of 30 do not have any friends. One man spoke for many when he said "I haven't made a new friend in 25 years." Society has torn the soul of the male, and into this tear the demons have fled.

Ninety-five percent of men are so dis-connected that they have no best friend. Many believe this to be the result of our culture's discouraging true friendships between men in our modern society. Close friendships between two males who are not relatives are seen as suspicious and unhealthy. Society has convinced us that a relationship like Jonathan and David had in the Old Testament is impossible. The younger generations of men present a picture even more sobering. One pastor wrote, "There are not enough fathers and role models for our boys and girls. Some single parent females lack confidence in reaching and understanding their sons.

In the streets our boys are being influenced by evil men and being raised by television to believe in a fantasy world."

Current trends

The following are current trends among men:

- Men commit suicide at four times the rate of women.
- Men between the ages of 18 and 29 suffer alcohol dependency at three times the rate as women in the same age group.
- More than two-thirds of all alcoholics are men; 50 percent more men than women are regular users of illicit drugs.
- Men account for more than 90 percent of arrests for alcohol and drug abuse violations.
- Life expectancy for men is 10 percent shorter than for women, and the incidence of stress related illness, such as heart disease and certain cancers, remains inordinately high among men.
- More than 80 percent of the homeless are men.

Influences on men in our society

Dr. Gary Rossberg in a 1993 survey suggested the following four major pressures on a man:

Pressure on a man:

- 1. Career and success pressures
- 2. Distractions from pressure of finances
- 3. Relationship pressure
- 4. Sexual temptation pressure

Challenges facing men:

- 1. Search for significance
- 2. Tendency to withdraw or to be passive
- 3. Desire to be in charge or to take control
- 4. Sexual temptation pressure



10 Not-so-stupid questions to ask about missions.

If you are thinking about missions, you probably have the answers to the big questions. But what about the usual day-to-day questions that seem silly and trivial? As the saying goes there are no stupid questions just stupid answers

#3 Will there be time for hobbies?

Everyone including missionaries needs downtime for leisure and hobbies for a healthy balanced life. Further hobbies can also open up new opportunities for ministry.

#4 How will I get around? (Will I need a car or bike?)

How you get around will really depend on where you go. Missionaries travel by various means including cars, motorbikes, and even public transportation. Public transportation is excellent if you are in Europe but in the US a car would be required. Another consideration is the laws for driver's licenses in your country. Some countries allow you to drive with a valid US driver's license while others don't. On our mission trip to Belize, we could drive for up to 3 months on a US license.

#5 Can missionaries get tattoos?

Tattoos, piercings, etc. are a personal and wisdom decision best discussed with your elders. Missionaries need to consider how tattoos will be perceived by the culture in which they will be serving. What may be considered harmless or meaningless in our culture may be offensive to others which could create barriers to ministry. On the other hand, it might open doors for ministry. Things can be perceived differently from one culture to another. For example, I remember when I was a teenager on the mission field, and a pastor from the US visited us in Glasgow, Scotland. He was a large man with a very loud, strong voice. It was unnerving for the locals as they were not used to very loud, Southern, US revivalist-style preaching. What shocked them even more was his use of hand gestures during his sermon. Unbeknownst to him, he was waving his hands around making what was considered inappropriate and very rude gestures in their culture.

This is one of the fruits of our support. Brian had the privilege to preach at the installation service of his friend Thiago. Thiago is one of the students at the Reaching & Teaching training sites where Brain teaches.
