4. Read Isaiah's call in 6:1-10. A prophet is a person who speaks God's words to God's people. What was Isaiah called to do as a prophet? How is Jesus's prophetic role realized in his sermon at Nazareth?

Luke 4:20-30

1. Context should always be a primary consideration when trying to understand any passage of Scripture. As you read about Jesus's message in the synagogue in Nazareth, how do the stories of his baptism and temptation in the wilderness impact your understanding of his ministry in Nazareth?

5. Read Matthew 11:28-30. What sorts of people does Jesus call to himself in this passage? Why must a person acknowledge they need help to be saved? How is Jesus's invitation in Matthew 11:28-30 a stumbling block to some?

2. In the passage, Jesus was welcomed with open arms at the beginning of his message (v. 22) and they were ready to kill him by the end of it (v. 29). What caused the people to turn against Jesus?

6. Jesus can be your savior, but he won't be your servant. How do people sometimes try to force Jesus to fit into the mold they have created for him. Why will this approach never lead to salvation?

3. Jesus says that a prophet is without honor in his hometown. How have people close to you rejected your Christian message when it spoke against their preconceptions or their own desires? How have you been tempted to reject the Bible's message when it speaks against you?

7. Read Luke 7:19-23. In prison, John the Baptist began to wonder if Jesus might not be the Messiah. How did Jesus respond to John's question? How should Jesus's response to John affect your understanding of Jesus and his mission.
