5. Read Mark's account of this healing in Mark 1:40-45. Based on Mark's witness, why might Jesus have not wanted the man to talk freely about his healing? What is Jesus's purpose according to Luke 4:43? How might a ministry of constant healing impede Jesus's primary purpose?

4. The levitical law dictated that a leper was not clean until he had been declared so

by a priest. How does Jesus's command for the leper to go and show himself to the

priest show Jesus's reverence for the Old Testament?

- 2. Luke says the leper approached Jesus with these words, "If you will, you can make me clean." Why do our prayers often change the word order to something like, "Lord, if you can, will you...?" How might our lives be different if we prayed fewer "safe" prayers?
- 6. Jesus charged the leper to not tell others about his healing, but the secret wouldn't be kept for long because he was no longer leprous. How do changed lives bear witness to the saving power of Jesus?

- 3. Read Leviticus 13:45-46. These verses explain how a person with leprosy was to carry themselves because of their ceremonial uncleanness. How might the leper in Luke 5 have been impacted by Jesus's willingness to touch him? Jesus could have healed with just a word, but he touched him instead. Why might he have chosen this path for healing?
- 7. Lepers were unclean and those who touched them became unclean. How might we view Jesus's willingness to take this man's uncleanness upon himself as a foreshadowing of what was to come at the cross?
