Luke 6:37-42

1. Read Luke 6:37–42. What instructions does Jesus give in this passage? Which of these commands do you think people struggle with the most today?
2. Consider this sermon illustration: someone points out the dirt on your car while their own car is filthy. Why does hypocrisy make correction so hard to receive? How do you usually respond when someone corrects you but struggles with the same issue?
3. Read Luke 6:41-42. Where are you tempted to notice the faults (specks) of others even when you struggle with similar faults (logs) of your own? What are some practical ways Christians can examine their own hearts honestly?

4. What does correction with humility look like in a healthy Christian relationship? How could our church get better at being a place where people help each other grow without condemnation?

5. It was said in the sermon that “People who understand the mercy they received will be less likely to condemn others.” How does remembering God’s mercy toward you change the way you treat people who sin or fail? How have you extended mercy, or how have you responded when you experienced mercy from someone when they could have condemned you?

6. Read Galatians 6:1–2. How do these verses help us understand what Jesus meant in Luke 6 about correcting others after examining ourselves? Is there someone in your life right now who may need gentle restoration rather than criticism?

7. It takes courage to repent. Is there an area where God may be asking you to take a courageous step of repentance or honesty? When it comes to dealing with the “log” in your own eye, how might risk and courage be required?
