Luke 6:43-45

1. Discuss a time in your life when your actions did not represent Christ well? How did you repair the situation and seek forgiveness?
2. You may have heard someone say, "The Bible says you shouldn't judge." Based on this sermon from Pastor Craig and the sermon from Pastor Adam last week (from Luke 6:37-42), do you think that is true? Why or why not? How would you respond to that statement?
3. Read Luke 6:43-44. Do these verses mean that a Christian never sins? How do these verses apply practically in daily life?

4. The parallel passage in Matthew contains the words, "for by your words you will be justified, and by your words you will be condemned" (Matthew 12:37). Combined with the warnings about our fruit and actions, how concerned should we be for ourselves—or others—who claim to be followers of Christ but do not *live* as followers of Christ?

5. What do Jesus's words in Luke 6:45 tell us about the importance of filling our hearts and minds with good things? How does Philippians 4:8 encourage us to focus on the things of the Lord?
6. Jesus says that what comes out of our mouths originates in our hearts (Matthew 12:34). Describe a time when your words revealed your heart? How did that make you feel, and what did you change as a result?
7. The memory verse for this week is from John the Baptist's warning to the Pharisees and the Sadducees, because even though they were religious leaders, they did not live surrendered lives to God—they were hypocrites. How can hypocritical people today keep non-believers away from the church and the things of Christ? What steps can you put in place to prevent hypocrisy in your own life?
