4. On Sunday, Pastor Craig urged us to celebrate God in his simplicity. The doctrine of divine simplicity holds that God exists as a unified whole and cannot be divided into separate parts. His attributes are identical to one another and are not a "part" of God but a unified aspect of his essence. For example: He is love. How is God's simplicity distinct from the way human beings exist?

Psalm 8:1-9

1. We just finished hosting Vacation Bible School for over 300 children. How might our constant efforts to teach kids about Jesus lead some to believe that learning the Bible is mostly for children? How can you combat that idea?
2. Psalm 8:1 teaches about God's majesty in the creation. What does Romans 1:19-23 teach us about what can be known about God from creation?
3. Psalm 8:3 speaks of looking at the objects of creation and considering who God is and what man is in relation to the God who has created him. How can the observation of, and meditation on, the created world help you know and love the Lord better?

5. Psalm 8:4 points out that God is mindful of human beings. How can you lean into God's care for you? How are you comforted knowing God cares for you?

6. You have an important part in God's plan. Psalm 8:5-8 shows that God's created purpose for humans is to exercise dominion over the created world. How do you play a part in God's plan? What can you do differently to be more engaged with God's plan for your life?

7. Many confessions of faith point out that the primary purpose of human beings is to glorify God and enjoy him forever. How can you fulfill your primary purpose of glorifying and enjoying God?
