4. Psalm 91:5 says, "You will not fear the terror of the night..." Why do we still wrestle with fear even in the presence and promise of God? Read Matthew 14:27-33. What caused Peter to fear? What was Jesus's response?

5. Read Psalm 91:11-12. These are words of promise and comfort, but Satan used them to tempt Jesus in the wilderness (Matthew 4:6). What steps do we need to take to make sure that we properly understand and apply God's word?

6. Psalm 91:14-16 marks another shift in the Psalm to God speaking a pledge over his people. What stands out most to you in this pledge from the Lord?

7. The big question Sunday was, "Where do you dwell?" The Psalmist encourages us to dwell in the shelter of the Most High and to abide in the shadow of the Almighty. Look up the definition to the words dwell and abide. How does each word give us a different way of experiencing our relationship with God?

Psalm 91

1. Psalm 91 speaks of safety and security in God's presence. How has your relationship with Christ helped you to feel more secure? How can you cling to God's promises of security even when you don't *feel* secure?
2. Read Psalm 91:1-2 and identify the four different titles that the Psalmist uses for God and the four metaphors he uses for security. How do each of these names and each of these metaphors help you to better understand the way that God loves and protects?
3. Psalm 91:3 represents a shift--the author moves from speaking of God as "my refuge" to speaking of God as "your refuge." Why do we need people in our lives who have experienced God personally to help us to better understand God's love for and toward us?
