**Students do NOT need to have an email address to login**. Follow the link and enter the username and password that I have created for you. Each student's username and password are the same "word" based on the student's first name and first letter of their last name. For instance, Brian Wilson's username is **brianw** and his password is **brianw**. **Lowercase for both username and password**.

Lessons take less than a minute to complete, and I suggest the students practice for 5 minutes a day. The lessons are fun and rewarding, and I will keep track of the students' progress remotely. Students will receive a grade on their completion of the typing lessons when school begins, so please take the time to practice this summer. It will pay off for the rest of their lives!

Finally, if they do not already have their own email address, please have your child create an email account in Gmail. This coming school year, they may need to be able to submit assignments electronically, as well as access information that's shared with them on Google Classroom. ## **Book Summary**

Once you've finished reading *Prince Caspian*, you will need to **write a three-paragraph essay about the book**. Please follow the outline below to help you know what should be included in each paragraph. I am looking for creative writing, neat handwriting, spelling, grammar, and to get to know your strengths and weaknesses as a reader and a writer. Your essay needs to be **typed** and double-spaced using 12-point Times New Roman or Arial font. All spelling and grammar should be correct. **For current LCA students: all dress-ups and openers should be used (and marked) throughout the paper to demonstrate that you can use them fluidly.** 

## Paragraph 1 (5-7 sentences)

- Title of the book
- Author of the book
- Setting (where and when does the story take place)
- A basic introduction and description of the main characters. you should describe what they are like as well as their role in the story (hero, villain, etc.)

### Paragraph 2 (8-10+ sentences)

- Summarize the plot of the story
- o Tell about the main problem and the solution, if any, to that problem
- Be selective about the information you include. Only include what you think is MOST important, without leaving out too many details. Many times people do not want to give away the ending of the novel, but you need to explain how the book ends so that I know that you indeed did read and understand the novel.

## Paragraph 3 (6+ sentences)

- Tell what you thought of the book (your opinion –would you recommend it to a friend) and explain why.
- O What is one LESSON that you think you can learn from this book? What event or which character taught you this?
