it. Everything else seems to be so pressing that exercise is the last thing that's on my mind. I know I need to make time for it because I need to live healthier. I want In the 1950's, a professor from the University of Chicato exercise, but I've discovered that I must be missing the genetic DNA that calls my feet to action. I've also discovered that the older I get, the harder it is to get them into three groups and tested each group on how motivated! It's so much easier to just think about exercising than it is to actually go and do it (but at least I thought about it, right?).

I have come to the place where I have accepted that exercise will never just spontaneously happen in my life. I must set aside the time and commit myself to it. to get on the treadmill, let me give you something to think about: Training our bodies to be as healthy as possible is a good thing, but, as followers of Christ, we also need to train our minds to "think" spiritually healthy. All day long, we are bombard with the desires of the world and the urgencies of the moment. Every email, text message, phone call, and commercial seeks to steal away our minds. We become so consumed with the world around us that we forget and fail to put our attention on the things of the Kingdom. Like physical exercise, we must make the commitment to think and focus on the mission that Christ calls us to. Paul told the church at Colossae to, "Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth." Colossians 3:2 (ESV)

This setting of our minds on the things of God's Kingdom is not a natural thing to do. In our sinful state, we are not naturally drawn to God. Our natural state is that of rebellion and selfishness. In Romans, Paul reminds us that sin has separated us from God and that we must purposely seek to transform our minds to focus on the

> Let me ask you a couple of questions: How often to think about the mission of making disciples? Do you ever prepare yourself mentally to think about the mission before you?

> go conducted a survey where he took a group of 90 students, who had no basketball experience, and divided many free throws they could make. For 30 days, each group practiced and the professor recorded their results. The first group physically practiced shooting free throws every day for an hour, the second group simply visualized themselves making free throws, and the third group did nothing.

While I sit here and try to summon the strength and will After 30 days, he tested them and had them do this again for another 30 days. The results showed that the first group improved by 24%, the third group showed no improvement, but the second group improved by 23% without ever touching a basketball, except for the test! Our minds have so much to do with our outcomes!

> The things that we focus our minds on affect how we choose to live! If we are constantly focusing on the world around us, on entertainment, hobbies, and knowledge, we will reap a lifestyle that puts God's Kingdom, at best, second. We will always be drawn away by the newest craze, the next big adventure, or by our exhaustion from keeping up the culture.

> Instead, if we want to be obedient to Christ's mission, we must start by daily transforming our minds and committing our actions to follow.

> It's time for the church to not only produce missional literature and quote Matthew 28:18-20, but to really begin to constantly "think missionally" on how and where we fit into Christ's call to, "go and make disci-




Who is Annie?

The woman whose passion for missions inspired the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering.

Every year Calvary Pampa, along with Southern Baptist churches throughout North America, participates in the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering, but few know the story of the mission advocate for whom the offering was named in 1934. In fact, there is only one surviving photo of Armstrong.

"Annie was born in Baltimore at a time when there was little opportunity for women. Yet, her devotion to Christ led her to a life of service and leadership. She organized women to pray, to give and to meet the needs around them. She challenged pastors and churches to action and rallied vital support for missionaries. Ultimately, Annie was recognized as a national Southern Baptist trailblazer for her visionary leadership that still inspires millions today." (anniearmstrong.com/who-is-annie)



Annie's Contributions:

- Started Bay View Mission for Baltimore's poor and addicted
- Served as the first executive of Woman's Missionary Union
- Led the formation of missions' organizations for children
- Raised support for missionaries to Italian and Jewish immigrants
- Refused a salary because she would never give to the Lord "that which costs me nothing."
- Initiated fund-raising "brick cards" to build churches in Cuba

- Gained support for the first black, female missionaries
- Secured funds to relieve China missionary, Lottie Moon, who had served for 11 years without a furlough
- Advocated for Native Americans and impoverished mountain people
- Honored in 1934 when The Home Missions
 Offering was re-named for her to encourage
 more to follow her sacrificial example

"Think Missionally." It's a good saying, but what does it mean? Is it just a churchy thing we say or is it something a little bit more? We are told in Matthew 5:14-16 ¹⁴ "You are the light of the world. A city situated on a hill cannot be hidden. ¹⁵ No one lights a lamp and puts it under a basket, but rather on a lampstand, and it gives light for all who are in the house. ¹⁶ In the same way, let your light shine before men, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven.

We see here that we are expected to carry that light into the world and shine before men so the world will see Jesus in us and glorify God. If we choose not to shine, the outcome is every day the world grows a little bit darker. When we look at a light, it does not

have to try to be a light because that is what it is. It was made to shine. As believers and followers of Christ, when we are made new by Jesus, this happens: 2 Corinthians 5:17 ¹⁷ Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away, and look, new things have come.

Those new things are us being faithful to Jesus by not just "Thinking Missionally" but becoming "Missional" in all we do. We should get to the point in our walk with the Lord that this is who we are, not what we do. Each day we meet people not by accident, but by divine appointment. What are we doing with those appointments? When we realize every encounter we have with individuals has eternal ramifications it changes our perspective of life. We become mission-motivated. What good is it to know all about Jesus and be doctrinally and theologically sound yet not share the hope we have in Jesus? We are like a closed book, a dark room, a folded map. This week open up, share the light, and give directions to the hope you have to someone who does not have that hope. Don't just "Think Missionally", "BE MISSIONAL" !!!!

Our 2024 theme this year Coram Deo ("core-um day-oh") is a Latin phrase meaning "in the presence of God." As a Bible-believing, Bible preaching church, and as followers of Christ, we live our lives Coram Deo: in the presence of God, under the authority of God, for the glory of God. This is our focus. Let's think missionally! Google defines the word mission with 2 meanings:

- an important assignment carried out for political, religious, or commercial purposes, typically involving travel.
- the vocation or **calling** of a religious organization, especially a Christian one, to go out into the world and spread it's faith. "the Christian mission"

The first definition typically involves travel. When you think of missions you automatically think of missionaries that travel. We have several missionaries in our church that travel such as to India, and have even moved their family to South Africa to spread the word! There are many different kinds of missions though. Some include travel to different parts of the world. Some are our local ministries, the church, bible studies, different organizations, etc. It says at the beginning of the first definition "an important assignment". That is The Great Commission.

Then he said to them, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation." Mark 16:15

Jesus came near and said to them, "All authority has been given to me in heaven and on earth. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe everything I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of age. Matthew 28:18-20

That leads into the second definition. **Calling**, to go out into the world and spread it's faith! Not only is it a calling, it is a command from our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Our mission is to tell people about Jesus. In that mission we have to live our lives Coram Deo. In his presence, under his authority, and for his glory in all aspects of our lives. We are missionaries carrying out his mission for his glory! So, we have to remember, we have a mission everyday and to live our lives Coram Deo. Also, remember our mission is Matthew 22:37-39: **Love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and most important command.. The second is like it: love your neighbor as yourself. We can do this right here in our church and community. Be faithful, obedient, in his presence and glorify him in all things you do. Think missionally! This is my encouragement to you. Don't forget to LOVE HIM AND ONE ANOTHER.**
