FROM THE PASTOR

I don't know about you but I am praying that March is at least a little warmer than February has been. I am a little tired of that four letter word that has blanketed our world in mounds of ice and has only seemed to fall on Saturday nights leading into Sunday, prohibiting us from worshiping with regularity in January and February. As the ground begins to thaw, things start to change and people start to clean up the mess the snow has left behind.

There are times in my life where I feel that things are out of or beyond my control. Things seem chaotic and I feel that I am in a bit of a spiral as I am not able to steer the ship of my life without the waves springing up around me turning me in other directions that I do not necessarily want to go.

When I begin to feel that way, there is something that I tend to do to make myself feel like I have some sort of control - I clean. I don't just clean, I frantically clean. I organize various parts of my life that I have neglected for far too long. Piles of papers that have accumulated get purged, trinkets and odds and ends that I have held onto for far too long find their way to the trash or the yard sale pile. Things that have just been tossed on my desk find a home and get put away. My space gets dusted and cleaned and everything seems to be in order. Because if everything else seems like it is falling apart and beyond my control, at least this I can control and there is a very real and visible result for my actions. If you ever walk into my my office and my desk is in order, you know I have been struggling.

But sometimes the job is too big to handle on my own and I need help. Sometimes I get so overwhelmed with the mess around me that I don't know where to start and so I need someone to help me. They help me focus. They help me get started. They help me feel that I don't have to do it all alone.

It reminds me of what the Psalmist, David, says in Psalm 51:7 as he cries out to God. "Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow." Hyssop is a purple, blue, or white flowered herb in the mint family. Its aromatic leaves have a slightly bitter or minty taste. In the Bible it was a symbol of humility and referenced as parts of the acts of purification and ritualistic cleansing.

But here David requests divine assistance for purification. He requests that God purge him and clean him from the inside out. It was not only to be ritualistic, but it was the understanding that David could not do it on his own. He could try. He could try to make things right on his own, but he could only get so far. Only God could truly make him clean. Only God could make him "whiter than snow."

In our lives we often struggle. We often feel that we are out of control or that things in our lives are beyond our control. We fight and struggle to put things in order but sometimes it is beyond the scope of what we can do on our own. We need to turn to God and ask for God to work in our lives and in the world to clean us and to put things in order. It does not let us off the hook to participate, but it does take the pressure off that it is all our responsibility.

Yes, we need to participate to make things right in our lives and in the world around us, but some of it is more than we can ever handle on our own. But God is with us and we need to be open to allowing God to work in us and through us.

So as we think about the spring cleaning in our lives, putting things in order, or trying to get a grip on things that may otherwise may feel out of control, let us remember that we are not alone. Let us also remember that God is able and willing to do some of the heavy lifting in our lives to help us out. We do not have to do it alone, but we also have to ask for help. May we look to God and allow God to wash us and purify us.

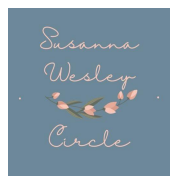

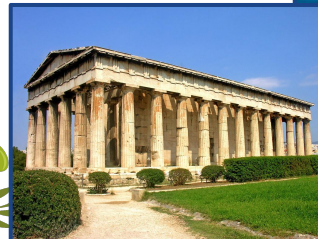

MISSION of the Month March 2026

March Mission of the Month: Tails of Valor, Paws of Honor

Tails of Valor, Paws of Honor, Inc. based in Coopersburg, PA is in its second decade of service, and is dedicated to providing community education and rehabilitation programs that address the growing behavioral health challenges impacting our nation's veterans, first responders, their families, and the broader community. With rising rates of PTSD, depression, anxiety, substance use disorders, and suicide, there remains a critical need for accessible, community-based interventions that promote healing, resilience, and reintegration.



Tails of Valor programs are grounded in trauma-informed practices and designed to reduce barriers to care while strengthening emotional regulation, coping skills, and family stability. Through structured rehabilitation services, peer engagement, and educational outreach, Tails of Valor equips participants with practical tools to improve mental wellness, rebuild confidence, and restore connection within their homes and communities.

When you see a service dog in public, you see a calm, focused dog, unbothered by noise, people or chaos, you see the results. What you don't see is the 2 years of repetitions, training sessions with hours of practice, the patience of a dedicated staff working tirelessly, daily laundry, administration of stocking toys, food, meds, leashes, coordinating vet visits, grooming, bathing, keeping the kennel clean, moving equipment, tracking progress and setbacks. They also coordinate a large volunteer network of puppy raisers, puppy sitters, fundraisers, and kennel clean ups. You don't see those that opened their home and heart to donate their time, their sleep, their energy, feeding, socializing, teaching basic life skills. Volunteers are fully loving a puppy knowing they will be giving them back. It isn't easy, but it matters! You don't see the trainer who sharpens skills, shaping purpose. You don't see the setbacks, the slow days and weeks when progress wanes. But, all of it matters. A puppy comes in as a playful 8 week old puppy and departs as a focused dog trained to ignore everything so they can be everything for one person—a life-long companion that will provide confidence, safety, and dignity to their person. Tails of Valor dogs change lives without ever saying a word.

Your financial support during the month of March will support this Christian based 501(c)(3) organization to continue to expand program capacity, enhance outreach to under-served populations, and strengthen long-term behavioral health improvement. It costs \$25,000 to \$30,000 a year to raise each TOV puppy. Your donations will directly contribute to improved quality of life, reduced crisis intervention needs, and stronger, healthier communities for those who have sacrificed in service to others.

News from Dallas Indian Mission UMC

Greetings to you from our friends at Dallas Indian Mission UMC. We have not had a prayer meeting with our friends in Dallas for a while. However, I have had regular contact with our liaison Alan Kriesel to get news and updates. I've also been in touch with the Pachekah sisters, the ladies who sang as part of our Native American Services.



Many things have been happening at the Dallas church. Most significantly, Pastor Jackson was reassigned to another congregation and Pastor Jamie Moss was assigned as the new pastor.

At that time, we were having Zoom prayer meetings several times a year. We had also learned how monthly Community Meals and other gatherings were at the heart of the Dallas church. A new kitchen stove was badly needed and with your support through Mission of the Month donations we were about to finish the kitchen improvements at the Dallas Church. What had started as a need for a new stove, quickly made it clear that a new exhaust hood with duct work to the outside of the building was a necessity. Then, the electric wiring in the kitchen was no match for the powerful exhaust system and multiple free standing cooking pots and roasters running when community meals are served.

At the moment all these projects are completed and the community meals and neighborhood cookouts are raising funds to keep the church running. Unfortunately our prayer meetings have not continued. We had one after Pastor Jamie arrived but after that it has become increasingly difficult to set up a date with Pastor Moss for the next one.

Pastor Moss wears many hats, "Mother, Pastor, Army reservist, Doctoral Student and District Superintendent." Our Prayer Group outreach may have been too much for her and we have not been able to have much contact. I still have regular phone calls with Alan Kriesel. He keeps telling me how grateful the church members are for their functional kitchen and what it allows them to do.

Initially our mission was to get to know our Native American brothers and sisters, talking and praying with them and creating awareness and making amends for the historic atrocities Native Americans have had to suffer. I feel grateful for the relationship we have had since 2019. Also, Alan still meets with a Bible Study group, the Silver Feathers, every other week. They and other members of DIMUMC still pray for members of our church that are on our Prayer list and Prayer Chain. If you are so inclined, you can pray for them as well. Their prayer list is printed below...

Thanks to our entire congregation for supporting this Mission and thanks to Pastor Zach, Jen Hopple and all those who organized and participated in our prayer meetings.

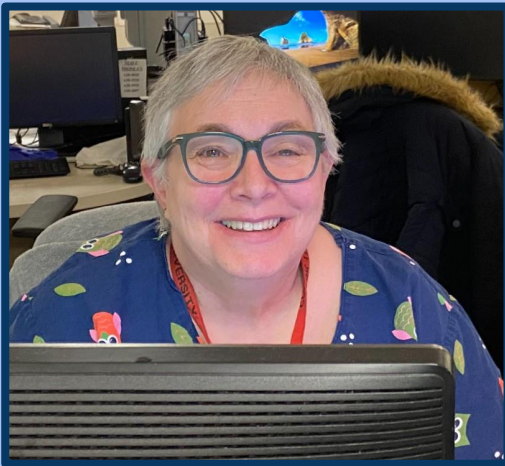
