A WORD FROM THE PASTOR LAURA

Living in the Purple Zone

I recently started reading a book called "Preaching in the Purple Zone: Ministry in the Red-Blue Divide." I'm only in the middle of the first chapter, but I've already discovered plenty of food for thought.

The author is Rev. Dr. Leah Schade, a Lutheran pastor and professor of preaching at Lexington Theological Seminary. She notes that in our public sphere, especially in media and politics, we tend to reinforce a "red-blue" dichotomy. For any given topic, we are presented with 2 (and often only 2) options, and depending on which of the 2 options we prefer, we align with one of the two major political parties. We are either "red" or "blue," and that's that.

We look at maps that show which states and counties are red and which ones are blue. "Of course," Schade writes, "none of us lives in a truly 'red' or 'blue' state. The colors run together in our families, our houses of worship, our schools, our places of employment, and even within our own hearts and minds."

None of us are unfamiliar with the phenomenon of living in a purple zone. As hard as we seem to try to divide our nation into two competing factions, most of us are much more complicated than the tenets of a single political party. And we're familiar with the disagreements that can arise anywhere about what is right and good.

Some may argue that politics has no place in church. And while it's true that we do have a beautiful Constitution that limits the powers of the state regarding the church and limits the powers of the church regarding the state, it is not true that we can't talk about political issues in church. There should be no topic off limits in the church, the place where we come to worship, pray, hear Scripture, and learn more about our faithful God. And of course, my faith and my religion influence how I exercise my civic responsibilities, including voting.

Usually when I preach, I focus on how God's Word is speaking to the struggles and challenges that our congregation may be facing in our day to day lives. I also try to consider the struggles and challenges of our siblings who may not be represented in our congregation, but certainly are our neighbors, whom we are commanded to love. These struggles and challenges are deeply intertwined with policies created by our lawmakers, rulings given by our courts, and how our government assesses and spends our tax dollars.

I am aware that when political topics arise, the divisive and sometimes violent rhetoric that we experience in the public sphere can infiltrate our otherwise respectful, loving congregation. As Schade puts it, "for some, the color purple is not just the blending of red and blue perspectives, but a reminder of the bruising one may suffer when stepping into that place of controversy and divisiveness." It takes intentional work to create an atmosphere of trust, so that otherwise explosive topics can be discussed with honesty and care for the other.

I will keep reading, and I encourage you all to continue praying. Pray for me to have the courage to try some of the methods Schade introduces in her book, so that our congregation can do the hard but very important work of being a place where politics can be discussed without everyone ending up bruised, or angry, or ready to check out, at the end of the conversation. Pray for our congregation as we do this work. Pray for our nation, especially when the flames are fanned by candidates and special interest groups who have agendas to push and power to maintain. And when an opportunity arises for you to discuss an issue that you are passionate about, pray for humility and for the ability to listen to others and to learn from them. Pray for us all as we work at being faithful while living in the purple zone.

Spotlight On...Cover Girls

Each month, we highlight an area of volunteer ministry that has "openings" for additional volunteers. This month is Cover Girls, our quilting group. Pastor Laura interviewed the group one Wednesday in July as they took their 10:00 break. The group that day included Carol Boyd, Patti Boyer, Gail Edwards, Carol Hagberg, Sue Lohse, and Marion Nelson. The newest members of this group have been a part of this ministry for about 2 years. Carol Boyd has been with the group for the longest, at least 4 decades.

1. Why did you decide to volunteer for this ministry? Or, why did you say "yes" when you were asked to serve?

Patti: I was [persistently] invited by Gladys Swanson, and Mary Fuelling before she died, to be a part of the ministry of this congregation.

Gail: I started coming when I worked with donated fabric from Pat Anderson's supplies, and I had so much fun that I just kept coming back!

Carol H: I was looking for something do, enjoy sewing, and was invited by Carol Boyd.

Carol B: I came with my mother at first.

Sue: Carol [Boyd] and Janice Nelson invited me.

Marion: I liked to sew at home, and I wanted to be a part of a group and do something good with my time.

2. How is your faith strengthened by your work in this ministry?

Marion: Supplies show up when we need them – it's a good example that the Lord always supplies what we need.

Patti: When I'm working on projects at home, that is my prayer time.

3. What might you say to encourage someone who is considering joining the team?

Carol B: We have fun.

Sue: We are providing comfort to people all over the world – from local shelters to people on the other side of the world.

Carol H: It's good fellowship – we support one another, and we talk about (and sometimes solve) family problems.

Patti: It's a good way to express creativity.

- 4. How do you get to participate in the work of "Sharing Christ's Love" by serving in this way? All the ladies agreed, there is a great need. (The quilts completed each year are donated to local organizations and Lutheran World Relief, who distributes them internationally to those recovering from natural disasters, fleeing violence and war, or otherwise in need.)
- 5. What do you like best about this work?

Gail: It's a very rewarding experience.

Carol H: It's fun to put different pieces of fabric together, and create something fun.

Patti: And use pieces of fabric that were just sitting around, and put them to good use. We look forward to coming each week.

The Cover Girls want everyone to know:

- You don't have to know how to sew to join our group we can show you how to thread a needle and tie a quilt.
- We can always accept donations of fabric, sheets to use as backing, gently-used blankets to use as filler and spools of thread.
- The Cover Girls meet on the first, second, and third Wednesdays of each month at 9 a.m. in Grace Place. Carol Hagberg coordinates the group.
- For many years, this group was also responsible for assembling kits for Lutheran World Relief (baby care kits, personal care kits, and school kits). They just focus on quilting now, but if there is someone in the congregation who would like to lead the kit ministry, please let Pastor Laura know.

Dear Partner in Ministry:

LSSI's history is strongly rooted at our Nachusa campus, where the Nachusa Lutheran Home was first chartered in 1903 on land donated through the generosity of the Shippert family. On May 12, 1904, the home received the first of many children who lived there over the years. As child welfare services have increasingly become home and community based, the need for residential homes and treatment dramatically decreased. Today, all of LSSI's services at its Nachusa office are provided throughout the surrounding communities.

In June, the LSSI Board of Directors approved the sale of our campus in Nachusa to the Dixon School District. The campus will be used to establish a therapeutic school for the district. As part of the conditions of the sale, LSSI will rent office space on the campus for current staff in our Children's Community Services programming, including foster care and prevention services.

The therapeutic school that the Dixon School District will establish at Nachusa continues the tradition of serving children at the campus. Children with special needs will now have services within their community. Some children have had to travel over an hour to receive these services. The therapeutic school will improve access for children in the district.

LSSI is proud of its 156-year history of serving children in northwest Illinois and beyond. Moreover, we are grateful for the continued support and advocacy we have with our Northern Illinois Synod congregations and individuals who call this region home. Together, you help LSSI fulfill its mission to bring healing, justice and wholeness to people and communities.
